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Wheatland County talks hydrogen development

Wheatland County has opened discussions with its stakeholders regarding the potential to see investments in hydrogen-based energy developed within the local region.

A stakeholder meeting was held with the Canadian Hydrogen Fuel Cell Association (CHFCA) at the Wheatland County Administration Office on Aug. 9 to propose the county as a viable location for industry investment, as well as to better understand how hydrogen fuel will be implemented and why they say it's a good idea.

Jamie Kramble, economic development officer for Wheatland County, explained the County's overall goal within the hydrogen economy is to grow the local economic base, generate tax revenue and create high value employment opportunities.

"Wheatland County is holding a session because we are interested in the hydrogen industry and trying to develop an industry," said Kramble. "We've examined many different sectors and hydrogen seems to be something that we believe is going to grow and become more important."

The County is promoting itself as an attractive location to invest, as it boasts low municipal (non-residential) tax rates, what it refers to as a generous tax incentive for large investors and maintains a close proximity to Calgary and Strathmore.

Farming for Hospice celebrates partners

Farming for Hospice celebrated another year of crops grown and harvested in support of their efforts to raise money for a local hospice building on Aug. 9.

Joni McNeely, chairperson for the Wheatland and Area Hospice Society (WAHS), said the team is well on their way to reaching their goal for the new building and is excited for the prospect of finally having their own walls.

"Currently we're a hospice without walls and we need those walls ... usually, a full quarter section of crop nets us approximately \$100,000 per year," said McNeely. "As well, the contributions from the community when they support us by buying acres, and as well last year we were very fortunate to have an event put on by Drew Gregory, which helped as well to contribute to the total bottom line, which all goes 100 per cent into building our hospice in collaboration with (Wheatland) Lodge."

McNeely said the estimated cost of the new hospice will be in the ballpark of \$2.7 million. Currently, the WAHS has raised roughly \$2.1 million in support of their eventual new building.

If the current fundraising trends continue, it will be another couple of years of fundraising before construction begins.

"The next steps would be collaborating with the municipalities to help with some of the operating funds (and) collaborating with Alberta Health Services to help with the operation and support

of all the hospice services," said Mc-Neely. "We are also looking to increase the knowledge and awareness and ability of our communities to support the hospice, which would entail our community coming in and volunteering to work in the hospice."

Keith Clayton, WAHS director, said the event hosted on Aug. 9, was aimed to celebrate and recognize the folks who gave Farming for Hospice a hand this year in farming the quarter section at the Nutrien plant.

"Nutrien has given us the opportunity to grow crops on the land and raise money for the hospice society," said Clayton. "It's worked out extremely well for the last three years and we appreciate what they've done and hope it continues for as long as life is the way it is."

In the first year of Farming for Hospice's operation, the team worked out of Standard with a quarter section of farmland rented there.

This year marks the third such operation that has been on land donated for the summer by Nutrien, adjacent to their plant.

"Not every farming organization has the ability to give up a quarter section of land that they use for their own income," said Clayton. "So, with Nutrien stepping to the plate like this, has been a very fortunate thing for us."

Strathmore celebrated with new Monopoly board game

Outset Media and Walmart Canada have partnered together and are celebrating Strathmore with a limited-edition version of the Monopoly board game.

Titled "Strathmore-opoly," the game plays near identically to the classic version of Monopoly, however the available properties on the board are themed around the town.

Outset Media public relations coordinator Jared Clarkson said the partnership with Walmart Canada has been ongoing for a few years and Strathmore is one of 200 municipalities across Canada to have been selected for a version of the game.

"They approached us to help them with creating these games for different cities in Canada. There was a similar program that had been going on in the United States previously and they saw the success of that and really wanted to get in and do the same thing for Canadian cities," said Clarkson. "It's been going on for three years and we're close to hitting 200 different cities We'll probably hit that sometime next year would be my guess."

Clarkson said the program began with creating versions of the game for larger cities and urban centres such as Toronto, Montreal, Vancouver, Edmonton and Calgary, but a larger metric of success was found in smaller cities and towns where community was more prevalently celebrated.

The Outset Media team does not collaborate with or reach out to the selected municipalities in any fashion, though during their development process keys the game versions off notable and popular locations throughout the indicated municipalities.

"A lot of small communities tend to celebrate where you're from and have a lot of hometown pride. So that was kind of one of the reasons ... Strathmore ended up on our radar as one of the (places) that we felt would be a great candidate," said Clarkson. "Obviously, we're not able to include everything, that's just kind of the nature of the game. But, we try to make sure that there's enough included that someone from Strathmore would feel that it's a pretty good reflection of the



"That's one of the benefits to having a set idea that we're working with. It's not something that has to be constantly like reinventing the wheel every time we do a new city," said Clarkson. "It's obviously a very similar game, it's just we've customized it a little bit as far as the properties that are included in that game, so we are able to do a pretty quick turnaround for them."

Copies of Strathmore-opoly are expected to be available on shelves at the Strathmore Walmart location very soon, if not already. Copies had been shipped to the store prior to publication.

Should the game sell out, those who still want a copy do not yet have to stress, as multiple waves of shipments are planned for delivery to the local Walmart location.



hydrogen today as opposed to 20 years from now, or 20 years ago, is that when governments were making targets in terms of emissions reductions, hydrogen wasn't really needed for the first steps," said Klippenstein. "As soon as you have aggressive policies to try and get to net zero emissions, you need an absolutely huge amount of hydrogen." According to Klippenstein, Canada's ultimate goal is to bring its hydrogen capacity up to account for 30 per cent of 3 its fuel usage and demand by 2050. Markus Lehmann, hydrogen specialist 8

for Wheatland County, explained that over the next decade or two, the energy industry is projected to shift dramatically in favour of a hydrogen resource as the infrastructure becomes more prominent and Canada leans into its carbon net-zero goals.

"Over the past 10 to 15 years there has been a trajectory of hydrogen growth of approximately one per cent per annum. That growth from 2022 forward will go into a very Canadian scope and will climb (exponentially) from approximately 100 megatons per year ... up to 600 megatons per year by 2050," said Lehmann. "We are looking at extensive growth and this is not a one-off growth projection by an astute analysis. These are across-the-board analyses that are taking place."

Lehmann added that Wheatland County is in a favourable position to capitalize on the transition to hydrogen power. The next step is to attract and secure local investment.

Strathmore Summer Fest bigger than ever

Heckya Media Group and Royal LePage Benchmark teamed up on Aug. 13 to host the Strathmore Summer Fest in support of the Wheatland Crisis Society.

In an upscale event from previously hosted iterations, the team wanted to host a larger community event in the Lakewood development area with several good intentions at hand.

Royal LePage Benchmark event project manager Amanda Bazant said the multipurpose event was put together both to give locals a good excuse to get out of the house for an evening and to support the community.

"We just wanted to have a community event that let people know that Lakewood is here and that there are lots of opportunities for families to come in and it's just a way to make it more community oriented," said Bazant.

The summer fest consisted of a bouncy castle, beer garden, touch-a-truck, miniature car show and a 50/50 draw, among other festivities, with all proceeds going towards the Wheatland Crisis Society.

According to Bazant, the event kicked off initially during the onset of the CO-VID-19 pandemic on a much smaller scale. Now that provincial health restrictions have largely been lifted, folks were invited to enjoy a community gathering on a larger scale.

"We had a block party last year, so we decided to grow on that. Royal LePage Benchmark does a lot of events with Lakewood so that's why we thought, let's conjoin the two and join forces and

make this a bigger event," said Bazant. "The Fun Runners came to the last block party and then we were there (at their show) serving hot dogs, and we're like, 'Okay, well, how do we make this bigger?"


The hope, added Bazant, is that with a larger event, more people will be attracted to attend as there are plenty of things to enjoy in the location of Lakewood. Although new, is still very accessible to the surrounding community.


Bazant stressed that the event was largely made possible by the contributions of sponsors, and the intent to donate all proceeds is a new addition to the event this year.





Strathmore Venom takes home bronze

The Strathmore Venom Junior B lacrosse team claimed the Tier 2 bronze medal at the Provincial Champioship on the Aug. 7.

This year's tournament was particularly exciting for the team as it is the first time Strathmore had a representative at provincials since 2010.

The team's head coach Lucas Bobbitt said despite the tournament getting off to a rocky start for the Venom, the boys were able to make a significant comeback to play for third.

'We ended up having to play the only team that we knew out of the tournament - Cranbrook, who was undefeated going in," said Bobbitt. "We had a very hard-fought game between them and us that resulted in us losing 9-6. However, during that game, we also lost our captain and leading scorer, Riley Gallant, to a broken hand, so that kind of set the rest of the tournament off on a bit of a low note?

Despite his injury, Gallant was kept on the bench to help encourage the team and see them through to the end.

"The boys, they went into the next game against Sylvan Lake and there was a bit of a negative energy in the room. The boys were a little bit beat up because we had to put so much into that game against Cranbrook the night before that we didn't have a ton left in the tank the next morning," said Bobbitt.

Strathmore's Venom Junior B began to turn things around in their third game of the round robin, taking on Lloydminster - a team that had just previously dethroned Cranbrook.

The boys defeated Lloydminster 8-5. Bobbitt said it was exactly the pick-meup his team needed to get their heads back into it.

"That just kind of reiterated to the boys that when they play a complete game, they can beat any team in that league," said Bobbitt. "Going into it, it was honestly a mean-nothing game. We already knew we were playing for bronze; they already knew they were playing for gold. I told the boys going in, I said, 'let's just have fun, remember why you love this game."

Bobbitt added he feels strongly about his team going into next season, as none of his players are going to be graduating into the next age bracket.

"The first thing I said to these guys after the bronze medal game was, 'next year, we're turning this into gold,' because you can't take a group this good, this tight-knit and not (go for gold)," said Bobbitt. "They're coming back with another year's experience, they've been to the dance, they've battled it out and they're going to come back next year and work even harder now that they know what it feels like to lose. They want to know what it feels like to win."

Is it a trusted source or is it from someone who is selling something? Check what the public health authorities, government or your doctor and pharmacist say on the topic. 

Senior Barrel Racer returns to the ring after life-threatening accident

After her near-death experience during last year's Strathmore Senior Pro Rodeo, Julie Bland is back in the saddle to complete her unfinished barrel race.

During her run at the 2021 rodeo, Bland's horse fell on top of her before she was able to complete her run. She suffered a concussion, four broken ribs, a broken sternum and a collapsed lung.

"I don't actually remember any of the wreck, but I have pictures that show me what happened," said Bland. "I have to thank everybody who jumped into action and took care of my horse and I in the arena. I had stopped breathing ... I think if it wasn't for them, I would not have survived the

Bland spent five days recovering in hospital before she was released, to which she added it was roughly three months before the was truly moving around and six months before she was able to lift anything of substance.

Despite this, however, she said she was up and riding again two weeks following the wreck.

"They can't really do physiotherapy for injuries like that. It was just 'take it easy and take it slow' ... (but) I grew up riding horses and I'd be lost without the ability to ride."

Bland's father, John Bland, said it's an emotional event

seeing his daughter get back up on her horse to finish her race after the wreck last year.

Despite not being in town during the Strathmore Senior Pro Rodeo to be able to see his daughter race, the elder Bland added he will be supporting her through and through.

"She could have been killed, she could have been brain injured, she could have been made a quadriplegic. We're just so thankful for her recovery," said John. "The sight of her laying there, unconscious, will never leave. It's huge that she is back in the saddle."

For Bland, she said she feels a need to conquer the Strathmore arena for her own sake and to move past a fear of repeating the wreck.

Her run at the Strathmore Senior Pro Rodeo was not timed and was scheduled after all the official competitors had completed their runs.

"It's just, to finish the run I couldn't complete last year, I'm scared out of my mind, but to conquer the fear I have to conquer that same arena," said Bland. "Everybody understands that I've got to conquer that fear to come back, so they are really cheering me on. I've been barrel racing since I was 16-years-old and I'm 52 now. I don't do it for the money, I don't do it for the glory. I do it just for the fun of doing it."

The Strathmore Senior Pro Rodeo took place Aug. 13-14, with Bland's run being on the former date.


