



Ardenode RNG facility proposed

Epcor is proposing a manure processing plant to be located at the Cattleland Feedyards, which they are calling the Ardenode Renewable Natural Gas (RNG) facility.

The project is designed to take livestock manure and subject it to anerobic (without oxygen) digestion to produce biogas, which in turn will be upgraded to natural gas quality and injected into the natural gas grid.

The team hosted an open house for the project at the Nightingale Community Hall on Aug. 23 to introduce locals to the project.

"Epcor has a lot of experience in anaerobic digestion projects in our Edmonton and our Regina facilities and we're looking to expand that into pre-production of renewable natural gas from livestock manure," said Kevin Sonnenberg, senior manager of business development and marketing at Epcor Utilities.

The facility is proposed to be located in Wheatland County, 13 kilometres north of Strathmore, on a 20-acre site adjacent to the Cattleland Feedyard.

Should the project continue, the Ardenode RNG facility would receive manure, as well as other organic materials such as fats, oils and greases from a variety of local sources, which would be broken down into the biogas and digestate.

While the biogas would then be subjected to the removal of carbon dioxide and other impurities before becoming a natural gas, the digestate would be used as fertilizer for agricultural land.

"We're in the the design stage and the development stage of this project and we're really looking to understand how the community feels about this project," said Sonnenberg.

Local housing market remains strained

Strathmore has had a record-breaking year in the housing market, according to realtor Hayley Poirier, but it hasn't been entirely positive chang-

"We've certainly seen that we had an incredible increase in not only units sold in the spring, but also home prices going up in the area," said Poirier. "Especially if we are talking Strathmore right now, there have been significant increases ... from February to the end of June they were record-breaking.'

Currently, available housing stock in Strathmore is extremely low with only 90 residential properties are on the market, according to Remax real estate statistics for the town. Over a third of those houses for sale are occupied by detached homes.

There was already a shortage of available properties in Strathmore this past spring when the housing market explosion really kicked off in ear-

"We already didn't have enough inventory in the springtime and then we had record-breaking sales, so we have not been able to catch up," said Poirier. "Usually, we would like to see what we call six months' worth of product in the markets, and right now we've got (roughly) 1.7 months of inventory. We're really below how much inventory we would like to see in the market."

Between what Poirier and other realtors in the area are seeing, housing prices will not see a drop so long as available inventory remains low.

According to one statistic, the average price for a four-bedroom detached home in Strathmore has increased by 37 per cent over the course of the

"We are still seeing buyers in the market looking for homes, buying homes, and if the inventory doesn't bolster, we will continue to see this crisis stay steady," said Poirier, who added that construction crews remain busy as well, building new properties in town — so much so that many are not taking on many additional builds, and that the materials needed to construct new homes continue to become more and more expensive.


"Roofing materials, appliances, wood, all of those things are a scarcity and so builders are being very cautious about how many new buyers they are taking on to ensure they can satisfy the needs that are out there," said Poirier.

As far as sales are concerned, there has been a slight slow-down that Poirier prefers to call a "stabilization of the market." Ideally, the scenario over the next few months to a year will be that properties for sale will be purchased within 30 days of hitting the market and offers accepted will be within a few thousand dollars of the listing price.

As far as buyer demographic goes, it has become a mix of people from all walks who are looking to pick up property.

Particularly, with Alberta's oil prices being notably lower than much of the rest of the country, families and their elders are moving from other provinces to invest in Alberta.

Chestermere-Strathmore MLA Leela Aheer responds to social media hack

RCMP are investigating a cyber attack that compromised some of Chestermere-Strathmore MLA Leela Aheer's social media platforms last week.

Aheer hosted a press conference on Aug. 24, discussing that her personal and political Facebook pages had been hacked and were being used for sexual exploitation.

Aheer said much of the imagery that had been posted to her pages was extremely graphic in depicting human trafficking and child pornography.

"I'm angry and I'm disgusted (and) I'm also very motivated to find out who did this. But more than that, to be able to continue to stand strong," said Aheer. "These things are done and they're targeted to try and shut people up and to stop them from doing the work that they're doing. And all they've done is motivated me to stand even stronger. And I'm not going anywhere."

Aheer added during the press conference she would be meeting with RCMP and the matter was, and as of publication, still is being investigated.

Though she does not know the specific reason as to why the attacks occurred, she strongly believes it was a targeted attack meant to damage her campaign for leadership of the United Conservative Party.

"It was frustrating because it (stopped) us from being able to promote and work on our campaign ... I woke up to notifications on my Facebook say-

ing I needed to restore my pages. They went after my public, then my personal page," said Aheer. "These things happen to try and silence people and particularly in the world right now with women in politics and in journalism, and we can't back down from this stuff ... (we) have to collectively come together as a community to end this kind of stuff."

Aheer declined to point fingers as she did not wish to falsely accuse any party of attacking her campaign. The attacks, however, closely follow condemning statements she posted to Twitter regarding bigotry, racism and homophobia.

Similarly, Aheer had previously pulled out from a debate scheduled to be hosted by a pro-independence group, the Alberta Prosperity Project (APP) and Rebel News, a right-wing media group.

"White supremacy, homophobia and racism have been supported and encouraged for too long in politics," Aheer wrote on Twitter. "Anyone participating in the Prosperity Project / Rebel Media debate should be held accountable for supporting this toxic culture."

Aheer described that she will never forget the imagery that was perpetuated using her account.

The hacked pages have since been re-established and details of the attack have been submitted to the RCMP. Aheer has taken a stance affirming that she will not back down and intends to continue discussions to raise awareness regarding human trafficking and sexual exploitation.

Used cars are in high demand, and scammers know it. Con artists are taking advantage of shoppers who turn to online platforms in search of a reasonably priced used vehicle. Be good-to-be-true prices.

You are shopping for a used vehicle on Craigslist, Facebook Marketplace, eBay, or another online platform. You find the make and model you want at an excellent price. Amazing

platform. You find the make and model you want at an excellent price. Amazing! However, when you contact the seller, you find out that the vehicle is in another city. Fortunately, the seller knows a transport company that can deliver it to you. All you need to do is pay the transport company, which will hold the funds in escrow until the vehicle is delivered. Many scammers will add a sad story meant to tug on your heartstrings. For example, they may claim the car belonged to a relative who has passed away. In one example recent report, the scammer claimed to be selling a car on behalf of their aunt, who inherited it from her recently deceased father. "The 'Auntie' claimed she was a nurse and worked shifts, and that my daughter's original email had fallen into her junk folder. The 'Auntie' had moved to another province thousands of miles from us. But if my daughter wanted to purchase the car for the stated price (which was well under the going price for a vehicle of this type, year and mileage), the Auntie had a contract with an automotive transport company."

Once you've paid the third-party company, usually by a wire transfer or prepaid debit card, your vehicle won't be delivered. The sale was a scam, and the con artist was in cahoots with the third-party transport company. Unfortunately, your money is gone for good.

How to avoid scam works

- Watch out for prices that are too good to be true. It's probably a scam. Scammers know that used cars are in high demand, and they will tempt shoppers with great deals.

 Contact the seller by phone. As early as possible, speak to the seller on the phone and ask plenty of questions. If you get very vague answers, if the seller gets defensive or aggressive, or if they can't confirm their location or the location of the vehicle, you're probably dealing with a scanner.
- See the car before you buy it. Always make an in-person inspection and take a test drive before
- Don't give in to threats or pressure. Resist the urge to act immediately. Always take time to consider a purchase, especially if it's a vehicle that costs thousands of dollars.

Wheatland County awards broadband development contract to Shaw Communications

Wheatland County has announced a partnership with Shaw Communications to bring broadband connectivity into the County's West Highway 1 and Goldfinch Industrial areas.

The contract is for Shaw to provide a fibre-optic network solution to the West Hwy 1 and Goldfinch industrial areas, connect fibre to homes for residents in Cheadle and construct a connection point with Carseland for potential future residential services.

Cory Adamson, manager of information services with Wheatland County, said that the contract will, among other benefits, help to attract more industrial investment into the

"Council wanted to bring rural broadband to our industrial areas there on the west side ... and the reason for that is obviously for investment interaction, for enterprising corporate investors," said Adamson.

According to a release, the County has stated its intent to provide a reliable and scalable high-speed network to county residents and industry. Once complete, the network will be capable of supporting a host of diverse business needs, as well as providing modern connectivity to residential areas.

"I think it'll have a great impact, especially for businesses and things that are already in the area. And as well as any

other investment that that is looking to come into the county as well," added Adamson. "Our target was just industrial areas but there's obviously potential benefits for residents in the future."

Wheatland County has budgeted \$2.625 million for the contract, which is scheduled to be completed in the summer of 2024.

Once constructed the network will be scalable, with broadband speeds and capacity capable of supporting industrial growth in the indicated areas, as opposed to being simply designed for existing facilities.

Epcor seeking public opinions for potential new natural gas facility

"Where are some potential areas of concern and how can we address those concerns in a way that would make this project acceptable."

Some residents of Nightingale and other locals to the area approached the open house and the Ardenode RNG project with hesitance and skepticism, remembering the adverse impacts to their community caused by a previously operational natural gas power plant in the same location during the 2000's, run by EarthRenew.

While EarthRenew's facility was in operation, many county residents complained about the debilitating smell caused by the facility, which caused some to be sick, and the value of properties in the area to decline.

"From what I understand, the EarthRenew process was basically burning manure to create a fertilizer and that was a much more open-to-air process and that was a unique process they were exploring," said Sonnenberg. "Our project is very different in that we are putting manure into anaerobic digesters, which are environmentally sealed and do not generate any odors as part of the digestion process."

He added Epcor understands and acknowledges the challenges residents have faced from the previous facility and has taken those concerns into designing the Ardenode RNG facility.

According to Sonnenberg, the project is still in the design stages and no paperwork regarding its development has yet been submitted to Wheatland County.

Capital Power celebrates one year of solar power in Strathmore

Capital Power celebrated one year of being a part of the Strathmore community, with a free pancake breakfast at the Strathmore Legion branch #10 on Aug. 26

Michael Sheeham, senior advisor for stakeholder engagement, said the team is excited to see the results coming in from their first solar project in Canada and are optimistic about its continued operation.

"We're quite excited about it ... it's our first solar facility (in Canada) and we have another facility that's currently under construction in southern Alberta. We hope it's just the first to come," said Sheeham. "The community has been very welcoming, they've been really easy to deal with and to work with and it's been a real cooperative effort to get the project up and running with the Town of Strathmore."

The pancake breakfast ran over the course of the morning, attracting dozens of residents who were awake early enough to drop by.

By the end of the celebration, Sheeham said turnout was much higher than expected which the team was happy to host and to feed.

The solar facility is sized to produce 40 megawatts of electricity, with the panels in place designed to last for roughly 30

years

The electricity generated through the facility is sold to the grid, thus the largest impact for the community generated by the solar farm is through its tax payments to the Town of Strathmore.

Following the initial success of Strathmore's facility, Senior vice president of construction and engineering for Capital Power, Steve Owens said the team has no intent of slowing down.

"We will continue to look at development opportunities within Alberta ... we have a portfolio of locations where we're planning on developing both solar and wind," said Owens.

The project was not developed without its kinks. Over the course of construction, it became slightly over budget for the company due to supply chain issues resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. Otherwise, Owens said the project was ultimately completed on time.

Strathmore's solar farm also engages Whispering Cedars Ranch, a local farm that has provided sheep to keep the grass around the solar panels short.

"They obviously take care of the grass for us and the weeds, which of course, helps with safety from a fire prevention perspective," said Sheeham.

Over 600 sheep currently reside at the solar farm to maintain the property, as opposed to Capital Power having to rely on traditional grass-cutting methods.

Capital Power hosted a pancake breakfast at the Strathmore Legion Branch #10 on Aug. 26 to celebrate the first anniversary of their operations in Strathmore. The 40MW solar farm is fully complete and operational, while sheep from Whispering Cedars Ranch reside on site to maintain the grass levels.

Rockyford rallies to support local family in need

The Rockyford community is rallying to support a man who was injured at his place of work, and to help support his family.

Ward Drydale was helping to fix a roof when he fell off it, dropping more than 20 feet to the ground, landing on gravel.

According to Ward's wife, Kim Drydale, he suffered several broken bones in his right hand, a compound fracture in his right arm and humerus, four broken ribs and a dislocated pelvis.

"He was transported from Foothills Hospital to Strathmore now and he seems to be in pretty good spirits for the most part, just really bored. He really wants to get out and be able to go and walk around, which is hard right now," said Drydale, who added that she was told it would take several months for her husband to recover completely.

Seeing their situation and wanting to help, a long-time family friend Jacquelyn LaMarche, started a GoFundMe campaign to allow the Drydale family to pay bills and spend more time together during Ward's recovery.


"Kim is a best friend of mine, I grew up with her and they

are like family to me ... at the time, we didn't know the extent of the injuries but we know very well that he wouldn't be able to work for a while and they might need a little bit of help," said LaMarche. "I just jumped into it and decided to organize something for them and get them as much help as we could to take some of the stress off of everything going on with them. Rockyford is a great little community ... we know pretty much everyone, and they are fantastic when it comes to anybody in need. Everybody's willing to jump in and be involved."

Aside from the online GoFundMe campaign, according to LaMarche, folks have also taken to delivering cash and premade meals to the Drydale's door. The Rockyford Lions Club also took notice and jumped in to help the family.

LaMarche added she will likely continue the GoFundMe campaign for roughly a month for people to donate to. With the aid the Drydale's have received, it has allowed Kim to not worry about work and take the time to be with her husband.

"It was very overwhelming for her, she is beside herself (and) very grateful of the support," said LaMarche. "Of course, there has been a lot of support from family and friends. But you know, from everybody near and far has been tremendous."

Medical dictionary: *Anhedonia*. This a symptom that refers to not taking pleasure from the things that a person normally enjoys. This can be one of the symptoms of depression. One's interest in everyday things falls off. It can involve anything like food, sex and hobbies. If you feel anhedonia applies to you right now, see your doctor.

It's a misconception that only women get osteoporosis, a disease that slowly weakens the bones. Men do get it too. Of the 30,000 hip fractures caused by osteoporosis in Canada, 25% are in men. Your risk of a bone fracture can be assessed by combining a Bone Mineral Density test with clinical risk factors like being a smoker, high alcohol intake (more than 3 drinks per day), history of falls in the past 12 month and parents who had hip fractures.

With all the talk about the Covid vaccine over the past two years, seniors are reminded to not forget to get their pneumonia vaccine. The risk of pneumonia rises with age in those over the age of 65. Your heart pushes blood to the rest of your body with every beat. When your blood pressure is consistently too high, your heart is working too hard. Have you had your blood pressure checked lately?



AHS warns of cyanobacteria in Eagle Lake

Alberta Health Services (AHS) officically declared a cyanobacteria bloom advisory over Eagle Lake on Aug. 19, suggesting the public and their pets steer clear of the water body.

Cyanobacteria, also known as bluegreen algae, is a naturally occurring bacteria that, when forming in excess, poses a health risk to humans and domestic animals.

Alyssa Ness, AHS spokesperson, said the best thing for people to do in instances such as this is to simply avoid the body of water entirely and not risk contact with it.

"The harms that we can see in humans specifically results from contact with algal blooms," said Ness. "People can experience skin irritation, rashes, sore red eyes and if they happen to ingest some of the water, they can have a sore throat, nausea and vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal cramping, or headache."

For pets and domestic animals, ingesting significant quantities of contaminated water can result in the death of the animal.

Similarly, AHS is recommending people to avoid consuming anything from the lake, such as fish unless they are properly prepared, and to not water edible plants with water from the affected lake.

"We generally advise against people

using contaminated lake water for their gardens because it's near impossible to be sure how much of the toxin is taken up into edible forms," said Ness. "We particularly advise against watering plants that may come into contact directly with the water – so things like cabbage and lettuce, where the leaves will be touching the contaminated water."

If people do decide to consume fish caught from Eagle Lake, it is advised to only eat the fillets, and properly dispose of anything else, such as entrails, carcasses and skin.

Cyanobacterial blooms are relatively commonplace in Alberta, as they tend to show up on slow moving or stagnant bodies of water across the province.

An excess of heat and sunlight will also encourage the growth of cyanobacteria blooms in a given body of water, of which Alberta has gotten lots of over the course of the summer.

If a person has comes in contact with a contaminated water body, Ness explained symptoms will typically occur within three hours of contamination and will resolve on their own over the course of a few days.

"Some people have described the symptoms as being similar to hay fever or an allergic reaction and it runs its course," said Ness.

The advisory over the lake will remain in place until the end of the summer when the weather cools enough for the algae bloom to die off.


For participating stores, it's an effectively zero cost promotion to participate in. All business owners have to do is hand out and sign the bingo cards.

GRAY, Harrison

Longtime Strathmore citizen and businessman Harrison Gray passed away in Strathmore on August 19, 2022 at the age of 80 surrounded by his family.

Harrison had his childhood and early schooling in Strathmore. His mother, Phyllis, was a legendary schoolteacher whose career spanned decades. His father, Elmer, started Gray's Ltd. in 1947, a gravel products and excavation business. Harrison would leave home in the fall and winter to pursue his education and his hockey career but, come summer, would return to Strathmore to work for his dad. Harrison took over Gray's Ltd. In the early 1970s and expanded it considerably. It is the oldest family business in Strathmore.

Before becoming the head of Gray's Ltd., Harrison's career was hockey. He was a goalie who turned professional in the age before the mask. Proudly displayed at home was a small white mask that was made for Harrison by the man who had just finished making hockey legend Terry Sawchuk's mask (the same day). The two masks were identical. While affiliated with the Detroit Red Wings organization in the original six-team NHL, Harrison played the majority of his pro games for AHL teams including Knoxville, Jacksonville, Indianapolis, Cincinnati and New Haven. One of his coaches was tough-nut Hall-of-Famer Eddie Shore. To keep his goalies in shape, Shore made them run up and down the grandstand in full gear.

Strathmore's Grays are a community family. Harrison's father was mayor for so long he joked of being the "old gray mayor." After years of teaching, Phyllis served as chair or member of many school boards. Harrison was a founding member of the Strathmore Kinsmen Club, and, as such, contributed machinery, workmen and his own time to building the lake parks that give Strathmore its distinct appearance. In his hockey travels. Harrison had often admired the lake-and-fountain parks in American city downtowns. Strathmore's original Kinsmen Park was built adjacent to downtown. The Kinsmen dug a depression and sold the fill to housing developers to raise money to complete the project. They planted trees that are now giants providing summer shade. Harrison and his brother-in-law, Peter McLean, built the fountain. Gray Park, beside Wheatland Trail, followed: a lake and wetland complex that is a boon to migrating waterfowl. Harrison was a long-time board member of the Strathmore Golf Club and contributed to the expansion from nine to eighteen holes.

Harrison met his wife Marie in 1991, when she was teaching school in Strathmore. They were married in 1997 and bought a home close to Tucson that same year. Harrison's nephew Greg McLean took charge of Gray's while Marie and Harrison wintered down south. The Tucson winters were a great success. They made close friends and Harrison's days often began on the patio chatting with next-door friends and watching desert birds and animals parade through a strip of arroyo that divided his yard from the nearest fairway. Harrison swam in the community's outdoor pool most every day, enjoyable exercise when golf was no longer an option. Harrison and Marie had a new home built in Strathmore's Hillview area in 2009.

There was no better guy with whom to watch a hockey game than Harrison Gray. There was always some player or coach or on-ice situation that reminded him of a story, and the stories were laugh-out-loud funny most of the time. The analysis of what the Flames were doing wrong was always spot on.

Besides his wife Marie, Harrison is survived by his sister Peggy McLean and his brother Earl (Dianne) Gray, and by his daughters Kellie Gray and Stacey Woods (Jeremiah); also by his grandchildren Erika, Dean, Jeremy, Taylor, Rachel, Ryann and Alli. He is also survived by his step-daughter Nancy McPhee (Dan Gibbons) and step-grandchildren Pippa and Nell.

Harrison was predeceased by his parents, Elmer and Phyllis; by his brother-in-law, Peter McLean; and by the mother of his daughters, Lyn Abra (Gwen).

Harrison was a generous man, a family man, a community man. As a boss, he helped a lot of men become solid dependable workers. He had friends from all over his life and his careers, and he kept in touch with everyone. When his friends were going through tough times, he was there for them. He knew his town down to the smallest detail and there will likely be no replacing that extent of knowledge. His family and his town will miss him.




