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### Meadowlark closing its doors

After 22 years of serving the community, Meadowlark Senior Care Home has closed its doors for good, as owner and operator, Debbie Wakelam, retires.

Coming into her retirement, Wakelam said she decided not to sell the business and to simply close it down, as another operator would not continue the practices she main-

"I do not want my name associated with it if it's not going to continue the way I've run it. If (somebody) wanted to buy my business but changed it all, then my model would no longer exist, so it just needed to be closed by myself," she said.

Wakelam explained that Meadowlark was a business born out of necessity after her grandmother was diagnosed with dementia.

Following the diagnosis along with having a background in caring for seniors, Wakelam created Meadowlark and decided to take care, not just for her grandmother but for other local seniors, into her own hands.

"Over 20 years ago, how it got started was, my grandma had dementia and I had been working at the Strathmore Hospital (in) longterm care and I really wasn't happy with the work," said Wakelam.

"I loved the seniors, but I didn't like that environment, so when my grandma was diagnosed with dementia, my family said, 'what are we going to do?""

Deciding she was not a particular fan of other senior care options in the area, Wakelam wanted to take a different approach that was, as she said, geared more towards focusing on individuals in a small group environment.

"When I first started, it was a new idea for many, many people. It was something that they do in England and they have care homes all throughout Europe, but it was new for this area," she said.

"Some people immediately liked the idea and (for) others, it was a bit challenging for them. Once I got started taking care of some seniors, then word spread rapidly that there was a different option."

After a hiatus due to COVID-19 concerns, Furfest returned to Strathmore on Feb. 12 for its third iteration and according to Kyla Janes, it's here to stay.

Janes, who owns Alpine View Pet Spa, organized the market for vendors catering to both bipedal and quadrupedal audiences.

"Furfest basically is just something fun to get out with your dogs and be social. We've got a play yard set up so that if your dog is social, they can come in and play. It's just a fun outing for in the middle of winter," said Janes.

"I just thought it would be really fun to have a local shopping market. I went to a playfest in the city and you could bring your dog and there were dog vendors and I thought that was great. There was nothing (like that) out here, so I just jumped on it."

Janes explained the market had been busy since it opened on the day of its operation. The Alberta Farmer Pesticide Certification Course is a tool intended to help farmers to reduce risks associated with pesticide use. This course is recommended under the Alberta Environmental Farm Plan but is also mandatory for farmers who wish to use restricted pesticides that require certification such as Aluminum Phosphide.

The Certificate Course is a 1-day course. Study manuals are provided in addition to instruction with lectures and Power Point presentation on the seven modules plus the grain storage module. A proctored 2-hour 70 question exam is provided at 2:30 pm. We will also provide training and exam for the Grain Bin Storage with Phostoxin in the late afternoon of this day. If you already have your certificate and it is about to **expire after 5 years** (all certificates issued before 2017 have now expired) then this course will provide you recertification credentials (no EXAM) for another 5 years.

## **Library More Stuff** collections at capacity

The Strathmore Municipal Library has utilized a grant they received from United Way to bolster their "More Stuff" collection.

According to the Assistant Director of Library Services, Carmen Erison, the additions have been about a year in the making and has allowed the library to offer pretty much everything that somebody might need.

"We've been building these collections for roughly about three years and in (time), we've seen it heavily used and we really wanted to bring more items into the collection, especially with us going (to) free memberships," said Erison.

"The types of items that we have added to the collection are focused on helping patrons around the house, as well as for family members to get outside, enjoy the outdoors and just try something new."

The collections include things from metal detectors to ghost hunting kits to karaoke machines.

Erison said there's something for everyone within the collections, both for hobbyists and for folks who may need a specific tool for a unique project.

"For those people who are at home and those hobbyists as well, we're helping people out at home as well by adding things like an automotive scanner to track all of the codes on your vehicle," said Erison.

"(We have) items that you may not want to invest the money to purchase on a one-off basis to use them, you can now come to the library and borrow them for free."

She added the availability of tools, projects and even instruments has made a positive impact for the local community.

"I think it's had a great impact. I think when it comes to investing in that, sometimes families just don't have that spare money to purchase additional items," said Erison.

"Being able to have those kinds of items readily available from your local library is quite valuable and it definitely is time saving and money saving."

There are currently no further plans to expand the collection, as there is currently no additional grant funding to do so and the library storage is at

For the time being, the collections will simply be available for public use, to residents of Strathmore, Wheatland County, Siksika Nation and Rockyview

Anything that is borrowed from the Strathmore Municipal Library must be returned to the facility after its use.

As it stands, Erison said there are over 150 items within the library's collections that patrons may borrow and make use of at their leisure.

These quizzes appear to be meaningless, but the intent behind them is to collect information. For example, questions like: "What was the first car you owned?" "What is your mother's maiden name?" or "What is the name of the street you grew up on?" These are common security questions for insurance, banking and credit card accounts. Sharing this information can lead to accounts being backed, and personal and financial information being stolen.


Not all social media quizzes are data collection scams; however, BBB cautions users to be careful about what they share online and to check the privacy settings on the account. Social media data and quiz answers can be used to steal identity or enable a scammer to impersonate you to your

#### Tips to avoid social media scams:

- Be skeptical: Before answering a guiz, figure out who created it. Is it a brand you trust? Just because something appears to be fun and innocent, doesn't mean there isn't an inhere
- · Adjust privacy settings: Review the social media account's privacy settings and be strict about any information that is shared - and be mindful of who you are sharing it with
- Remove personal details from your profile: Don't share information like phone number or home
- Don't give answers to common security questions: Be cautious if the questions in a quiz ask for things like your mother's maiden name, street you grew up on, previously owned vehicles, favorite
- · Monitor friend requests. Don't accept friend requests from people you don't know. Also be wary of a second friend request from someone you are already conr an imposter trying to access your data and your Friends list.

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## CTR schools celebrating work of NCCS staff

Christ the Redeemer (CTR) Catholic schools are celebrating the Non-Certified Classroom Supervisors (NCCS) who have become a valuable asset to keeping schools open and students

The NCCS were highlighted during the CTR board meeting near the end of January, as having helped to fill a significant need for substitute teachers due to staff shortages.

According to Vincent Behm, deputy superintendent of schools, NCCS have been utilized by the school board for nearly five years, though prior to the pandemic, the extent was not nearly as prolific.

"They're not teachers, so they're not able to teach, instruct, or assess, but they're able to make sure that it's a safe, positive learning environment and hand out materials that the teacher has left for the class," said Behm.

"The teachers leave really self-directed learning plans for the students, so the NCCS will hand out those materials. Because they work in our schools often, they understand the rules, the routines, the positive classroom and school culture."

A NCCS is brought in to oversee a classroom environment when no substitute teacher is available to direct the class while the regular teacher is away.

Generally, when an NCCS is called in to supervise a class, the students will be reviewing content or completing independent learning.

We always prefer to have a substitute teacher when they're available, because they're able to fulfil all the roles of a teacher, but from time to time, and especially in some of our communities where there's not a lot of substitute teachers who live there, we rely on (NCCS) more often," said Behm.

"Using our NCCS's is a way that we've been able to keep our schools open and operational, because we've not faced the staffing shortages that we were perhaps concerned that we would."

He added NCCS have been utilized more often over the

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last several months due to many regular staff being out of the building for varying purposes. Behm did not specify the reasons for regular staff absences.

CTR utilizes both internal and external NCCS's. Internal NCCS's are often staff and educational assistants who work within the facility but usually in other capacities and an external NCCS are generally people who have experience and education working with youth in other capacities.

"It's really a celebration that we've been able to keep our schools open without asking our teachers or administrators to cover too many classes and keep our schools operational," said Behm.

"All of our schools have NCCS's available to them. Before the pandemic, only some of them would rely on them occasionally, but especially since the last wave of the pandemic, most, if not all have relied on NCCS's."

Though he specified there is no replacement for a substitute teacher, having the NCCS available as a resource allows schools to remain open in person along with filling staffing gaps when necessary.

## Town introduces non-residential tax incentive bylaw

During the regular Town of Strathmore council meeting on Feb. 9, council passed Bylaw 22-03, the non-residential municipal tax incentive bylaw that is designed to attract business investment to

In late 2021, administration prepared a business case to develop initiatives, support economic growth and encourage non-residential investment in and around the town.

On Dec. 15, 2021, council gave first reading to Bylaw 21-31, the non-residential municipal tax incentive bylaw. Following the first reading, though subsequent changes were made that did not alter the purpose nor intent of the bylaw, they were substantial enough to warrant drafting a new bylaw that incorporated the changes.

Bylaw 22-03, as now passed by council, requires that a development or expansion must increase the total assessment of a venture by at least \$10 million, create employment for a minimum of 25 individuals and comprise at least 2,800 square meters of area in order to be eligible for the benefit.

The then applicable tax redemption is calculated by first determining the total increase to a business or enterprise's tax assessment created by the new development, then taking a percentage of the corresponding tax increase.

The rebate, as outlined by Town administration, is set at 100 per cent for the first year that the new development is complete and operational, then is reduced by 20 per cent each year for the following

Taxes will be expected to be paid normally and in full with no rebates or redemptions following the five-year period allotted by the bylaw.

In shifting from the previous bylaw draft of 21-31 to 22-03, none of the eligibility thresholds: investment amount, total of people employed or square footage requirements, were changed.

According to the bylaw, all non-residential properties located within the Town of Strathmore are eligible for the program. However, properties licensed under the Alberta Gaming, Liquor and Cannabis Act are not eligible for the tax incentive.

"We wanted to be pretty focused in terms of the types of businesses that we attract here," said Jamie Dugdale, a member of the Town administra-



## Strathmore raises 682 shoeboxes for children in need through Operation Christmas Child

Of the nearly 414,000 shoeboxes donated by Canadians through Operation Christmas Child at the end of 2021, Strathmore put together 682 boxes - an increase of 130 per cent over the previous year.

News Media Relations Manager, Frank King, with Samaritan's Purse International Relief, said it's an exciting development to see that despite concerns regarding the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, Strathmore didn't let that stop them from showing their support.

"We are ecstatic and grateful to the folks in Strathmore who said, 'we don't care about a pandemic, there are children in need and we're going to help them,' and that's what they did," said

Operation Christmas Child has been operating in Canada since 1993 and gathers shoe boxes full of school supplies, hygiene items and toys to send off to partner organizations in Central America and French-speaking West Af-

Boxes are distributed amongst local children in recipient countries. According to a release, since 2009, more than 23 million children have received

"I hear about these children in El Salvador and Nicaragua and Costa Rica and Senegal and places like that (where) this may be the only gift (a child has) ever received and it really shows the impact and the value of this program," said King.

"The other neat thing too, is that oftentimes, the shoeboxes open up the doors for us to work with community leaders with some of their other needs like getting safe water, or literacy programs, or hygiene, or agricultural tools and training."

Boxes packed by Canadians will be distributed throughout the partner countries throughout the year. Distribution of the boxes gathered this past Christmas season has been ongoing since the beginning of 2022.

Worldwide, a total of 10.5 million boxes were collected in participating nations to support Operation Christmas

"In a year filled with uncertainty, we praise God for the opportunity to continue reaching children around the world with gift-filled shoeboxes that bring so much joy," said Franklin Graham, president of Samaritan's Purse.

"These gifts provide a tangible expression of love and open doors for sharing the life-changing hope of Jesus Christ.'

The typical collection period of boxes is from early November until mid-December. Online options now allow donations of shoeboxes to be made yearround. Anyone who is interested in the program is able to find more information at packabox.ca

## Provincial CFEP grant sees \$383,100 allocated for local food bank

The government of Alberta has invested over \$383,000 to support the Wheatland County Food Bank through the Community Facility Enhancement Program (CFEP).

The program itself is intended to help foster healthy communities across Alberta by working in partnership with nonprofit organizations.

CFEP provides matching funding to aid non-profits in leveraging their other sources of funding to acquire, build, update and maintain public use facilities. In this particular use case, the funding was intended to help the food bank purchase a new facility.

By the time the funding was approved and distributed, the food bank had already relocated into its new, current warehouse, and so the funding will be used to support the use of the facility instead.

Chestermere-Strathmore MLA Leela Aheer said she was proud that the government was signaling their support for the organization, as it is a critical part of the local commu-

"This project will help many individuals within our communities and help to foster a stronger sense of community and togetherness," said Aheer.

"When we're talking about our facilities that are around our area, it's one thing to build them, it's a whole other ball game to maintain those things."

CFEP supports two classifications of funding streams. Small Stream funding is matched up to \$125,000 and an applicant organization may be considered for up to \$10,000 in non-matching funding.

A Large Stream fund supports a successful applicant between \$125,000 and \$1 million. An organization may only apply for one grant stream per year.

"Municipalities and for-profit organizations cannot apply for these funds. These are dedicated to nonprofits and First Nations and Metis settlement organizations," said Aheer.

"As we come out of this now, we're going to be seeing a lot of need in the communities for these services to keep people's heads above water until they can get back into the workforce.'

She added, regarding the food bank in particular, it is important to break down any potential stigma associated with making use of the facility, particularly if anyone needs help, as well as highlighted the importance of supporting the or-

"Everybody is going to need help at some point, it's just the way that it is, so this expansion is going to help them be able to really broaden their ability to hold food, to be able to maintain the services that they've been providing, to potentially put more staff into place," said Aheer.

The exact amount allocated to the Wheatland County Food Bank from the CFEP grant was \$383,100.






#### Silversharks mini meet

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## Wheatland Kings advance to Round 2 of playoffs

The Wheatland Kings officially grounded the High River Flyers during their second game of the bestof-three series on Feb. 11, knocking them out of the playoffs and advancing to the second round.

Ron West, head coach for the Kings, said he was excited to see his team finally bring home a win from High River's arena and keep themselves in the season.

"It was excellent. It was a good feeling, it was something that the boys deserved and it was nice to actually be able to push forward and accomplish the goal, which was getting through the first round of the playoffs," said West.

"We scored a couple of quick goals and then basically after that, we just kept pushing the momentum. We kept the forecheck going the whole time."

The Kings ended the best-of-three series with the Flyers 2-0, after defeating them in Game 1 of the series at the Strathmore Arena 5-1, then winning again 6-2 in High River.

West said he went into the second game with a plan for his team and was ready to play the same hand they used to clip the Flyer's wings on home ice.

'We had the two-man forecheck going and we kept pushing the momentum and made it tough for them to get out of their zone," West explained.

"They continued to cough up the puck and they gave us opportunities to score. They only had a couple of times where they had stretch passes where they had shots on net, or we made a small error, maybe in the (defensive zone)."

Despite the score suggesting what looks like an overwhelming victory for the Kings, West said it does not reflect in any sense how the game actually went.

"6-2 doesn't really show what the score was. It was 3-2 in the third with about 10 minutes left. We had a time out, they were starting to push and I just told the boys to settle down, keep pushing on the forecheck and keep creating opportunities," he said.

West commended the Flyer's goaltender before noting that once the Kings scored their fourth goal, pulling ahead by two points with less than half of the third remaining, it was plain to see the wind had been stripped from the Flyer's sails.

"Their goaltender was really good. (When) we got the one to make it 4-2, it just kind of deflated that team (and) they kind of knew where they were at and we just put the hammer down on them."

This season marks the second playoff that West has led his team to compete in. The first year he coached the Kings, the boys made it to the first round, but were knocked out by Medicine Hat.

Following that season, were the interruptions to their seasons caused by COVID-19. Now, West said he's playing for keeps. During the upcoming round, however, the Kings will be put through the ringer.

"This is the first time in, I don't know how long it's been, since we've gotten through the first round and get to go to the second round," said West.

"We're up against Okotoks and they are top 10 in the nation. Not in Alberta, in the nation. So basically, it's David versus Goliath is where we're at."

His plan going in is to keep the boys out of the penalty box and on the ice, cautious of having to potentially suffer the Bisons in a 4v5.

Round two of the playoffs will be a best-of-seven series, with game one played on Feb. 15 in Okotoks and game two scheduled for Feb. 18 again at the Murray & Piper Arena. Games three and four will be played on Feb. 19 and Feb. 22 in Strathmore.

4. Consider increasing health spending account contributions. Lisa Greene-Lewis, a blog editor at TurboTax, says HSAs are triple tax-advantaged, meaning you get an "above-the-line" deduction for contributing, and the growth in these accounts as well as withdrawals are tax-free if used for qualified health expenses. If you need to lower your tax burden, HSAs may be a safe and legal way to do so.

5. Utilize tax software. If you're not using an accountant and have a relatively cut-and-dry financial situation, modern tax software can be an easy and inexpensive way to do your taxes. These sophisticated programs ask a series of detailed questions and the entire process can be completed in relatively little time.

## RCMP warn public of online gift card scam

RCMP are warning the public about an online scam involving hiring people to purchase gift cards.

RCMP recently investigated an incident wherein a person was offered an online job which required them to pur-

chase gift cards in exchange for payment. The person was told to purchase gift cards for clients, which would then be reimbursed via cheque. However, when the individual deposited the cheques, the bank determined them to be fraudulent. To avoid detection, the scammers used real business informa-

tion from a business in B.C., including a logo from their website.

RCMP are offering the following tips to assist identifying fraudulent online job opportunities:

- First and foremost, if it sounds too good to be true, it typically is.
- Try to confirm that the job truly exists from a real company. Search for the company's website and find the job posting. Call the company directly to confirm the job opportunity.
- Be wary of jobs in which you are asked to transfer money to a 'client' through Bitcoin or another crypto currency, gift card, e-transfer or direct deposit into a third-party bank account provided to you.
- Other red flags for fraudulent jobs include emails that are sent from free, insecure accounts such as Gmail, Yahoo or Hotmail; you are required to supply credit card or bank information; or you are required to pay money to get the job.
