Supporting truck drivers

Several hundred people rallied in Kinsmen Park on Jan. 29 in support of the convoys protesting in Ottawa over the mandatory vaccination requirements for shipping truck drivers.

On Nov. 19, 2021, the Minister of Health Jean-Yves Duclos, Minister of Transport Omar Alghabra and the Minister of Public Safety Marco Mendicino issued a statement that as of Jan. 15, 2022, travelers who were at the time exempt from entry requirements, would be required to be fully vaccinated with one of the approved COVID-19 vaccines to enter the country.

Over 10,000 people including travelers who frequently cross the border, as well as many who oppose public health mandates, gathered on Parliament Hill over the weekend to demonstrate.

In Strathmore, though the gathering was much smaller, the message was of support for those protesting on the other side of the country.

"We just wanted to show, because of everybody's division on everything, how your community is there to support you, no matter what it is," said Amanda Bissett, who was one of the organizers of the rally in Strathmore.

With the freedom convoy that's rolling into Ottawa, I saw a post that every town and city around Canada should hold their own little rally on the same day, at the same time that the truckers roll into Ottawa at noon," said Breanna Palmerchuk, who worked with Bissett.

"If Strathmore has a turnout like this, then imagine every other city and town across Canada."

By comparison, the rally in Strathmore was notably less disruptive to public property, local law enforcement, and to town residents.

"People are stronger together in numbers ...





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we are not against everybody else; we're trying to bring people together," said Palmerchuk. Meanwhile from Ottawa, reports and videos have surfaced of vandals urinating on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, assault on local law enforcement and journalists, as well as harassment of shelters and businesses in the vicinity of the demonstration.

Though Boiteau did not get into particular specifics, she said her career was filled with highlights and being able to take students under her wing.

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Kevin Scoble takes over as Strathmore CAO, excited to begin in the position

The Town of Strathmore has welcomed its new Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) Kevin Scoble, who took over the position from the former interim CAO, Doug Lagore.

Scoble officially started in the position on Jan. 10, moving to Strathmore from Saint Albert, where he served as a CAO for the past five years.

"I'm enjoying it ... I selected Strathmore for personal reasons, but also professional reasons. On the professional side of it, Strathmore is doing some really interesting things and it's right on the cusp of some really great opportunities here locally," he said.

Scoble was born and raised in Calgary and since beginning his professional career, was worked all over the province both in the public and private sectors.

"I'm in my 29th year of my professional career now (and) about half of it has been in the private sector, mostly with energy companies, like ATCO gas and Petro Canada and Enbridge and Suncor," explained Scoble.

"(The other) half of it has been in the public sector in management or leadership roles with the City of Medicine Hat (and) Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo."

Scoble added he chose Strathmore in part because it is much closer to friends and family for him, while the town also "punches above its weight class" in terms of leadership, resources and opportunity. He cited specifically the recent launch of the solar farm on leased land and the Town's leadership in working together with Siksika Nation.

Though there are always new challenges that accompany beginning a new position in a new municipality, Scoble does not believe he has hit the ground running, so to speak, as many aspects of municipal government are similar no matter where you go.

"I would say probably 80 or 90 per cent of local government is pretty much the same issues between communities in Alberta. That other 10 or 20 per cent is really custom to the location and the culture and the industry of the community," said Scoble.

"It's a time of change for everybody when a new CAO comes in, but also, of course, we've just had an election this past fall across Alberta."


Regarding the goals and priorities of Strathmore's new town council, he said he looks forward to working with them on the "interesting and progressive things they want to accomplish."

"It's really about council and administration now formulating their plans for the term of council here for the next four years and my job is really to make sure that we're all rowing in the same direction," Scoble explained.

"I think Strathmore is really well positioned to bring in more non-residential revenue, so new investment opportunities in the community, which benefits both existing residents and businesses."

Overall, Scoble added that the nature of the position, being a mix of spontaneous and proactive work is what keeps him excited about local administration.

Locally and according to Bissett, the mindset of demonstrators takes a much more modest and respectful approach.

"Obviously, there are things that we've got to be respectful of ... but this is just showing the community of support that we all have and bringing everybody together to just continue fighting for what you believe in," said Bissett.

"The vaccines are there, everybody can choose to get it or not to get it, that's their own choice. We are not against anybody or any of their choices."

Palmerchuk suggested that until change happens, it is plausible similar demonstrations will continue until the federal government yields their decision.

"I think until a change happens, then there may be more of this, but speaking for myself, I mean (to) just bring the community together. Because of CO-VID-19, people have been so divided, we haven't come together as a community to help each other." Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has issued a public statement, Monday, that he is not intimidated by the demonstrators and has no intention on repealing the mandate.

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BBB Scam Alert: Don't do this friend a favour. It's really a clever scam



If a friend asks for a favor, you do it, no questions asked. Right? Time to rethink that policy. In this new con, a scammer poses as a friend asking for a simple favor. The email is so convincing that BBB staff almost fell for it

How the scam works:

You get an email that appears to be from a friend or family member. The message looks harmless and casual—like something a friend might really write.

Concerned about your friend, you reply and ask for more details. The "friend" quickly responds that they are trying to buy a gift card for their niece's birthday. However, they are traveling and having trouble purchasing the card online. "Could you get it from any local grocery store around you?" reads the email. "I'll pay you back as soon as I am back."

The request sounds reasonable. But if you do buy the gift card, your "friend" will ask you share the card's PIN and/or send a photo of the back of the card. Unfortunately, by doing this you are essentially handing money to the scammer.

Protect yourself from this con

Reach out to your friend directly.

If you get an unusual request, call or text your friend to confirm their story. No matter how harmless the story sounds, always double-check before sending someone money.


Use gift cards wisely.

Never do business with anyone who insists on payment with gift cards. Remember, providing the numbers from the back of a gift card is just like sending cash.

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Wheatland Lodge begins offering temporary residence option

Wheatland Lodge has officially begun offering a short-term stay option for those who need a temporary space to be or who are considering moving into the facility permanently and want to test it out first.

Resident Manager of the lodge, Christi Shworak, said the team has been thinking about offering the service for some time and are now in a convenient position to try it out and gauge local interest.

"What changed for us at this time, is that we had a room that was available to be used for that purpose, so we took the opportunity to convert it into a furnished room," said Shworak.

"We decided that we would offer it to the community to see if there was interest for the short term stay room."

Temporary occupancy of the room will not be considered a respite space, according the Shworak, but will offer the same services to a guest as if they were permanently residing in the facility.

"If seniors are living with their family members and maybe they want to come and try out the lodge for a few days to see if it's something that interests them, or if their family is going on vacation and they need a place to stay ... It really gives them a good feel of what the lodge has to offer ... so if they (become interested) in moving into the lodge, we could talk about that as well."

There is a minimum time of three days stay required to book the room, with a maximum of two months that a person may occupy it. Shworak said by the end of an extended stay, the occupant will have a better idea of whether they wish to move in permanently.

"Right now, we've definitely only put one room up as an availability for that because we do have some other rooms available for seniors to move into and rent on a longer-term basis," said Shworak.

"We have been asked about if we have this type of room, from families in the past. And at the time, even before CO-VID-19, we just didn't have availability, or rooms that didn't

Shworak anticipates many of those who opt to make use of the service will do so for a week or two. She is optimistic to see how the community responds as the service becomes more well known throughout the community.

"It's not something that we've offered in the past, so that's why we've put it out there as a new service offering through the lodge," Shworak added.

"The key thing is to know is that we do still have rooms that people can rent and this is just a side option to see if it's something that they're interested in."

The service was officially announced as being made available to the public on Jan. 27.

"You take them under your wing and you're like a mother hen and you (guide) them as they go through the system."


Going into retirement, Boiteau said she and her husband hope to connect more with their family and hobbies and potentially even travel when the process becomes easier.

Making their debut visit to Strathmore, CANAM Wrestling dropped in to put on a unique and exciting show for residents, while also unveiling new partnerships, during their show on Jan. 29 at the Strathmore Civic Centre.

Otto Gentile, CEO of CANAM wrestling and the Alberta Wrestling Academy, said for fans of television such as the WWE, it was a show they definitely did not want to miss.



Pharmacists are occasionally asked if there is any gluten in medications. 5 for Life book sale returns to supply community with accessible literature

After being unable to host the event last year due to ongoing COVID-19 concerns and safety protocols, 5 for Life brought back their annual community book sale on Jan. 28 - 29.

The event was hosted at the Hope Community Covenant Church and was estimated to have had over 1,000 books available for redistribution within the community.

Debbie Taylor, chair of 5 for Life, said the annual book sale is the organization's one and only fundraiser over the course of the year, with all of the revenue going right back into supporting community programming.

"We used to be funded by the government and then that ceased, so we were just supplementing our grants with this fundraiser," said Taylor.

"Through the grapevine, we heard there was quite a need for a used book sale, so that's how it began. It (started) small and then it has morphed into a pretty big deal."

All the books in the sale were donated by community members. According to Taylor, 5 for Life began collecting books in November via dropoff points at various business locations.

"We're very, very grateful to the community for their support, for donating books and very grateful to ... (local businesses that) had great big bins where they collected books for us."

The books collected at the end of 2021 supplemented the collection from last year which amounted to the larger than normal accumulation.

Though ideally, the goal was to empty the tables and



shelves back to community member who would make good use of the books, Taylor said there was no specific fundraising goal over the course of the weekend.

'We're just happy if, ideally, we could sell it all, but there's not a target. Rounded up there's probably about 1,100 books here."

Prices were set at \$1 a book for adults and \$0.50 for kids, with a selection of shelved items being marked as free to claim.

For teachers who dropped by on the last day of the sale, 5 for Life encouraged them to fill a bag with books to take for free.

"We're trying to get the books back out into the community and not have to store them," said Taylor.

She estimated several hundred people visited the book sale over the course of its duration.

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CORE childcare service prepares to begin operations in downtown Strathmore

There's a new childcare center opening its doors in downtown Strathmore after nearly a year of renovations and preparation.

The CORE hosted an open house on Jan. 26 to show off the newly completed facility and to answer questions from parents curious about how the service will work as it comes into operation.

Paula Beekman, the owner and operator of the CORE, said the process has been a long time coming and hasn't been without its challenges, but will be a welcome addition to local childcare operations.

"In the spring, we were eligible to apply for an EOI (Expression of Interest), which was a government grant. When we got the EOI, the government gave us quite a bit of money and it was to start a daycare," explained Beekman.

"(The government) saw areas in the province that were in need of care and (so) we applied and got that funding which was great ... through that process, we found this building."

Beekman added she had been eyeing up the former postal office for quite some time prior to acquiring the lease and when it was up for grabs, she didn't hesitate to jump at the opportunity.

"I took the lease over from another company that wasn't going to be here. I think in April we started tearing it all down, because this used to be the old Canada Post office."

"This is our 17th year doing childcare in Strathmore ... and we do have another center in the north end of town in Strathaven, which is just out of school care."

The CORE program, which is being offered through the center, is designed around emergent learning and developing children's skillsets to prepare them for primary education.

The idea, as Beekman explained, is to look at the individual strengths and weaknesses of the children in their care and address them, as well as preparing to send them into classroom environments.

"It's a program that was custom built for them and not something I went into a building and had to kind of work

around," said Beekman.

Ideally, the facility will support up to 56 kids who are preparing to enter Kindergarten, with the potential for the facility to eventually begin offering overnight care options.

For parents who may be worried about potential COV-ID-19 outbreaks, Beekman said each room is set up to operate as its own cohort, such that if a positive case was confirmed among the kids, it would be easy to contain.

Strathmore U15 Spurs champions of Okotoks Anthem Community Cup

The Strathmore U15 Spurs have returned victorious from the Okotoks United Football Club's Anthem Community Cup tournament, bringing gold medals home with them.

The team's Coach, Ryan Parkins, who also serves as the Strathmore Soccer Association Technical Director, said despite a host of challenges, the team pulled through and are proud of their achievement.

"I think the team was pretty happy with what they were able to deliver at the end. They took a few injuries but still fought through it and banded together as a team and showed a lot of depth," said Parkins.

The Anthem Community Cup was, according to Parkins, the first competition the team has competed in that used a tournament format, as with the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, other opportunities to compete have not been made readily available to the team.

Though the Spurs competes in the boys' league, they are a mixed team and include a few young women on their team.

"I think the team came in feeling pretty confident, we've had a strong year and they've really found a resource in one another. They played well as a team, not just as individuals which is really nice to see," said Parkins.

"I think we're definitely a defensive-minded team. We have some really goalkeeping strong in the back and a well-



structured defensive line."

Despite their defensive focus, Parkins said the Spurs are beginning to fill the gaps in their offence and are starting to better pressure the other teams they compete against.

As of Jan. 26, Parkins added the Spurs were sitting at second place within their regular division. Over the course of the tournament, the Spurs rampaged their way up the ladder undefeated, but that isn't to say there weren't any close calls.

"We did come through undefeated, but we were trailing in both our first game and in the gold medal match and we were able to come back from that and pull ahead," explained Parkins.

"(Okotoks was) a skilled group, so it was quite a good battle between the two teams. They were able to put away a goal on us a little bit earlier in the game ... but they were under a lot of pressure from us."

Ultimately the final game came down to the latter portion of the second half, when the Spurs managed to score their second goal to pull ahead and shut out the hosting team for the remainder of the game.

'We had a lot of opportunities that just found their way outside, or in a few instances, their keeper made some excellent saves, then our team was able to respond quite quickly and get it evened up," said Parkins.

The team is not scheduled to compete in any more tournaments prior to the provincials bracket, for which the progression format has yet to be decided.

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



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
