The Calgary Hitmen are excited to be

partnering with Siksika Health Services, the Blackfoot Confederacy, and the Aboriginal Friendship Centre of Calgary to host their fourth annual Every Child Matters hockey game, Feb. 10.

"There isn't a day that we don't share with Siksika Nation and our other seven nations that surround us that we don't learn, and that is the essence of this relationship, this game, this partnership, and this friendship," said Mike Moore, Calgary Hitmen vice president. "Daily, we learn, daily we are educated, but more importantly, we – through this game – are enabled to educate as well our fans, the community, the people who do not understand residential schools, do not understand the impact of the past, do not understand the learnings that we get to do every day."

Moore explained the themes surrounding the game this year are hope, opportunity, pathways, and empowerment.

He added the Calgary Sports and Entertainment Corporation (CSEC) now boasts multiple teams representing Indigenous education and celebration including through the Flames, Stampeders and Roughnecks.

"We understand and recognize the problems and the challenges. We want to take hope and now find a pathway forward with that hope," said Moore. "Without the understanding and the partnership and the acknowledgement and acceptance of what we do, it does not happen."

The partnership between Siksika and the Calgary Hitmen began initially in 2018, as options were being explored as to how collaboration could happen, eventually landing on the Every Child Matters hockey game.

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
described the game and the partnership between Siksika Health Services and the Calgary Hitmen as much more than a business arrangement.

Legion awards students for **Remembrance** contest

The Strathmore Legion recognized the winners of 23 student awards, Jan. 27, for creative works submitted under the theme of remembrance.

An awards ceremony was hosted at the Legion building with the public being invited to join. Awards were distributed to students for their submitted essays, poems and posters.

"This is held all across Canada within different Legions and we are all in different zones. Our winners will go on to District - so all the Legions in our district," said Jenny Schuman, treasurer and membership chair for the Strathmore Legion. "The posters, poems, and essays will be judged from there, and the first prize winners will go to provincials. From there, the top two prizes will go to Dominion, which is held in Ottawa. The winners from that will get to go to the National Remembrance Day ceremony in Ottawa."

Schuman added at each level of competition, students who are awarded for their submissions receive monetary prizes, which serves as part of the incentive to make submissions.

"The participation is great, and the thing is, it is so nice to see all the parents come because most of this is done in class. The parents have never seen the posters or poems," said Schuman.

Anna Haynes, poppy chair with the Strathmore Legion, added participation in the contest has been growing over the last three years following students' return to in-classroom learning.

"It is nice to see that kids are now looking at participating a little bit more and getting out and watching others get their prizes, so hopefully that gets them to also participate in the coming year and years ahead," said Haynes.

The Strathmore Legion will be presenting to local students again at the beginning of the 2024-25 school year, encouraging kids to get involved. In the next competition season, the Legion will

also be accepting digital and video presentations as qualifying categories.

"The new categories will be a little bit more of an expansion, so we will have to see how that goes, and whether it attracts more students to participate," said Haynes.

The annual deadline for students to submit their works to the Legion is Dec. 1, so as to give students as much time from the start of their school year as possible to work on their submissions.

Lions Club donates \$5,000 to local exchange program

The Strathmore Lions Club made a contribution of \$5,000 to the Wheatland Leos, Jan. 18, to fund activities for the Lions Youth Exchange this summer.

"The Wheatland Leos, it is a relatively new group that we certainly want to support, but they have undertaken a project that has to do with student debt - the Lions Student Exchange program," said Wayner Herdman, speaking on behalf of the Strathmore Lions Club. "Under this program, international students and local students, they come to the area and what they do when they are here is they will spend roughly one week in a leadership camp where they all meet and they are given some leadership training."

Following this, Herdman said the students are hosted by families around the area for the remaining duration of the program. Host families will take students on excursions around the province during the two-week tenure.

The camp will take place in July, hosting 20 international students and 10 from Alberta.

"What they are trying to do is give them more exposure to Alberta, so they are planning for trips for the students to different areas ... they are basically trying to find certain venues in Alberta that show international students what Alberta has," said Herdman. "In order to support that, we have decided to donate monies to the Leos so that they can carry out this program. They will have to charter busses for example, pay for entrance fees and things like that. That is their goal and we throught that was a worthwhile thing."

In order to function as intended, the Wheatland Leos have to be sponsored by a club. In this case, the Wheatland Leos were sponsored by the Wood Creek Lions Club, which is a virtual Lions Club. With this sponsorship in place, the Wheatland Leos are inducted into the Lions Club system.

Herdman added the way the Strathmore Lions got involved was due to the Wheatland Leos largely operating out of the Strathmore High School, with most of their membership base residing within Wheatland County. It was something the Lions felt was worth supporting.

"We expect that this fund is going to last for a number of years - not a large number, possibly three years I would suggest. Certainly, it is an expensive thing to charter a bus and travel any distance, but it gives a boost to the whole program," said Herdman. "We expect that we might donate funds in the future. We will see how it turns out with the funds that they have ... (and) if we think it is worthwhile for further contributions."

"We host a family night for our school community every year, and we have a Grade 8 entrepreneurship class in our school so they start little businesses and they are running their market that night," said Jill McDonald, associate principal at George Freeman School. "Our eco club is running a thrift shop of Falcons gear - so school logoed hoodies and t-shirts and stuff that kids have outgrown, they have donated them to the thrift shop and will be resold at a pretty great price."

An assortment of movies was shown in eight classrooms for families at the conclusion of the evening.

McDonald described the event as something students have been looking forward to, being an opportunity to spend time with their friends and families, and be at the school in a more relaxed manner than normal.

"The entrepreneurship market is something the

Each group of students, or each business, was responsible for selecting a local charity for which they wanted the proceeds of their endeavor to go towards supporting. Each student group has selected a different local charity.


"It is nice that they get to choose something that is personal to them that impacts themselves or their families in some way, so that is a nice thing for them to be able to do," said McDonald.

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




Major Crimes Unit investigates fatal shooting

Strathmore RCMP and the Alberta RCMP Major Crimes Unit are investigating after shots were fired resulting in the death of a man at the Mountain View Campground near Conrich.

Shortly after midnight on Sunday, Jan. 28, Strathmore RCMP responded to a 911 call reporting that gunshots had been fired at the Mountain View Campground on Range Road 284 and Highway 1. Investigators arrived and found an adult male in the campground suffering from gunshot wounds. EMS provided care; however, the man was pronounced dead at the scene.

Westmount Elementary supports local animal shelter

Grade 5-6 students at Westmount Elementary School raised a donation of \$2,465.90 during their annual Christmas Marketplace for the Happy Cat Sanctuary in Strathmore.

The event, which took place Dec. 21, was the 17th annual occurrence of the market, which is meant to teach students about setting up a business, profits, losses, floats, and money management.

"All our Grade 5-6 students set up businesses and they make Christmas decorations, or trinkets, bookmarks, anything that they can make themselves - soap, cards, bath bombs, candles, and they sell them to all the other kids in the school," said Marie Cooke, a Grade 5 teacher with Westmount School. "The kids take them and use them as Christmas presents for their families. Then, all the money that we raise, we donate to a charity every year. This year, we donated \$2,465 to the Happy Cat Pet Sanctuary."

Cooke added this total is a pretty typical amount to see raised through the annual Christmas market. The school generally anticipates raising between \$2,500 and \$2,600 every year for the charity selected to benefit from the activity.

"In the past, we have let the kids decide where they want their money to go to. In the past, we have donated to the Wheatland County Food Bank, to the Christmas Hamper Society - last year we did to the Strathmore Overnight Shelter," explained Cooke. "We have done Project Hope, we also did fish farming in Haiti one year. The kids always pick and this year, they picked Happy Cat Pet Sanctuary."

She explained last year, half of the funds raised through the Christmas market were sent to the Overnight Shelter, and half were sent to Happy Cat. This year, all of the proceeds went to the pet sanctuary.

The event took place over the course of a school afternoon, which serves as the culmination of the business lesson taught to the students, and allows for the sale of all their wares to their peers.

"It is one afternoon and they sell all their stuff and all the other students in the school, like all the kindergarten to Grade 4s come around and buy things," said Cooke. "Parents

come in, the community comes in and spends the money and buys all the little trinkets.'

The Happy Cat Sanctuary itself currently supports roughly 75 cats, with their maximum capacity being roughly 100 animals. This cap, however, is taxing on staff and volunteers and stretches resources thin.

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Natural products sometime hit the news especially when there is a promise of weightloss or diabetes associated with it. Berberine is one such product. There is some evidence from a few small studies saying it can reduce blood glucose and reduce weight. Berberine has some side gastrointestinal side effects like abdominal pain and nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. Also it is also unsafe in women who are pregnant or breastfeeding. Caution must also be used in patients who are already taking medication for type 2 diabetes. Check with your doctor first.








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Subdivision and Development Appeal Board Call for Members

Roughly 100 players are anticipated to attend, coming from branches across Alberta and the Northwest Territories, all competing for the opportunity to represent the region at the Dominion National Tournament at Branch 33 in New Brunswick.

"You have to have a branch playoff and a district playoff in order to advance to the command level," said Sylvia Westgard, speaking on behalf of the Strathmore Legion.

Westgard explained legions within each respective region must bid for the opportunity every year to host the annual event. This will be the eighth time she has been involved in hosting this particular event.

The annual Dominion Cribbage Championships were introduced in 1989 in an effort to bring together players from across the country.

Whether it's this court decision, or their defeat on plastics or the Impact Assessment Act, it is clear the Trudeau Liberal government simply does not understand or respect the Constitution of Canada.

But where they don't, we will be unrelenting in protecting our people and province from harm. While we are willing to work as constructive partners, we will never let Ottawa harm our people or province. Ted was predeceased by his wife Donna, sister Ruth Dann, and brother James Farthing. He is survived by his brother Albert Farthing.




