New Townhouse complex will move forward

Town of Strathmore council passed third reading regarding Bylaw 23-15, being a bylaw to amend Land Use Bylaw 14-11 with respect to the redesignation of 9 Bayside Place.

The matter was discussed during the June 21 regular meeting of council in a public hearing prior to being voted on by council.

The site, prior to the passing of third reading, was classified as M2 – General Industrial District, which is one of Strathmore's heaviest industrial land use districts. The site was formerly the home of a seed cleaning plant, which was decommissioned in 2019 and demolished in 2020.

Suggestions to redesignate the site for the construction of townhouses were originally brought before council in March, which were voted against at the time due to community concerns regarding height and privacy.

Changes to the development plans for the site, which were presented before council, include a building height limit of 12 meters – measured by the eaves of rooves, density reduction from 60 to 50 units, relocation of the three-story buildings within the site plan, addition of a greenspace with playground equipment, and alterations regarding the placement of rear decks in response to privacy concerns from neighbours.

Despite revisions to the site plans, several community members who attended the public hearing still expressed concerns regarding structure height, increased traffic and parking issues, privacy, and lack of promotion for affordable housing.

In response to questions, Mayor Pat Fule clarified during the meeting the development of these units is not intended to be classified as affordable housing for low-income tenants, but rather to increase the availability of living spaces within Strathmore.

Local elementary school goes Eco

Wheatland Elementary School has earned the platinum status, the highest level achievable, for the second time in a row through the EcoSchools initiative program.

The mission of EcoSchools is to nurture student leaders, reduce the environmental impact of schools and build sustainable school communities.

The program allows students, teachers, administrators, custodians and parents to get a larger picture of their environmental impact and offers ways to help reduce their environmental footprint.

Fifth grade teacher Annika Vacey has been leading the program for Wheatland Elementary for the last couple of years. Being relatively new to Wheatland school community she is enjoying her leadership role and the importance of the message this program addresses.

"It's (EcoSchools) a program that engages schools across Canada," said

She explains that schools can achieve different levels of certification. Schools earn points for different sustainability activities they do in their schools. For

example, Wheatland partners with The Town of Strathmore to help with their composting program. This engages not only the school but the whole community, making it an integral part of the EcoSchools pillar.

"Wheatland, in particular, we like to do a whole-school initiative," she said. Vacey explains that the EcoSchools

program has classroom, whole-school and community-minded initiatives.

"We did a great gulp challenge where at an assembly the kids brought their own reusable water bottles to take a sip of tap water to promote less single use plastic and awareness to preserving water, clean water especially," she said. "On a weekly basis we do Waste Less Wednesday to raise awareness to reduce waste in our lunch kits by bringing Tupperware and trying to have as little waste in our lunch kits as possible."

All of the EcoSchools initiatives are part of the schools overall curriculum.

Wheatland is a Leader in Me School that focuses on building leadership and life skills in their students.

Vacey said the EcoSchools program fit perfectly within the schools Leader in Me philosophy and fundamental pillars of excellence.

"It focuses on, how can we be a green



school? How can we raise awareness of climate change and promote a greener future that is clean for all, whether it's human or animals?" she emphasized. "This year there is lots of excitement. Kids love exercising their leadership by getting involved. We have kids in charge of recycling; kids in charge of compost; kids in charge of hot lunch who ensure the pizza boxes go in the compost bin."

As for the future plans with Wheatland EcoSchools pillar, Vacey said, "We plan to continue this program next year and maybe plan to continue to grow the initiatives we've already done and new initiatives too and hopefully gunning for that platinum certification once again."

County Code of Conduct violation complaint remains confidential

Efforts made by Wheatland County Coun. Rick Laursen to make information public regarding a code of conduct violation complaint against him have once again been defeated by council.

During the opening minutes of the June 6 regular meeting of council, Laursen motioned for the in-camera item regarding Mike Kozial of Transitional Solutions Inc. to be moved to open session.

"This matter is about me and I believe that I have that right. There is nothing that can come out of this that I would be uncomfortable having the public and/ or municipal affairs aware of," he said. "What I am being accused of is attending a Wheatland Regional Partnership meeting as a ratepayer and not as a councillor, which is reflected in the minutes of the meeting where I had no voice or vote, (and) is not something that should be hidden from the public."

This is not the first time Laursen has attempted to make information regarding the accusation and investigation to be public knowledge.

A similar motion regarding an in-camera item concerning the FOIP act, section 17 - Disclosure Harmful to Personal Privacy, Councillor Code of Conduct, made during the Nov. 1, 2022 regular meeting of council, was also defeated.

That, at the time had prompted Laursen to seek legal advice about the investigation into him re-

"The investigator has refused on more than one occasion to provide his qualifications as an investigator, and the public has a right to know this. I have this refusal both in writing and verbally to prove this," added Laursen. "The investigation is complete, so no new information will be presented. The ratepayers of Wheatland County deserve to know what is going on. I am willing to have this discussed in public, and unless some councillors do not want the public to know what is happening, there is no reason to have this matter in camera.'

Deputy Reeve Scott Klassen disagreed with the motion, insisting the matter remain confidential and in camera, as is standard procedure according to county bylaws.

County administration cited bylaw 202205 that should code of conduct violation complaints arise, it "always has been" and remains standard procedure for the information to be presented in camera prior to council deliberation as to whether the complaint and investigation should be made

No further justification nor discussion was made on the motion prior to council's vote, ultimately defeating the motion.

The matter remains in camera and confidential, and no information regarding the complaint, investigation or presented report to council has been made to be available publicly.

CGC land use amendment application successful

Wheatland County council has passed third reading on bylaws 2023-08 and 2023-10, which both relate to the amending of the Goldfinch Industrial Area Structure plans.

The former such bylaw, was to revise the development concept and transportation network relating to the site, as well as to append the CGC Wallboard Manufacturing Plant Area Concept Plan.

The latter, is for the purpose of amending the land use bylaw 2016-01, to redesignate plots NE-10-22-26-W4M and a portion of SE10-22-26-W4M from Agricultural General District to Intensive Industrial District as presented to council.

County administration presented the application to council, June 20 during the regular meeting as part of a public hearing which addressed both

The purpose of the application was to amend the Goldfinch Industrial Area Structure Plan to facilitate the development of a wallboard manufacturing facility.

Subject lands identified in the plans are approximately 214 acres in size, and are located west of Carseland, bounded by Township Road 222, Range Road 262, the Canadian Pacific Railway, and an agricultural parcel.

Neighbouring plots are largely agricultural use, with commercial and industrial uses to the southwest of the area.

CGC is proposing the development of a 200,000 square foot manufacturing facility, a raw product processing mill, and an enclosed raw product storage facility.

The manufacturing plant aims to create over 100 fulltime jobs within the county, as it will operate 24-hours per day.

"The subject lands are currently designated Agricultural General District, which does not consider the development of the proposed uses, whereas the Intensive Industrial District does," said Taylor Phelps, who presented to council on behalf of the County Planning and Development Services Team. "The proposed wall board facility is considered a heavy industrial use due to the scope and scale of the operation and the off-site impacts such as noise appearance and increased traffic that (it) is anticipated to generate."

The application by the CGC, which was demonstrated to council during the June 20 public hearing, was contested by neighbouring residents, who expressed concerns regarding the industrial facility's potential impact on their properties and

Coun. Rick Laursen acknowledged the concerns of the constituents who contested the application, though sided with the CGC and supported the bylaw amendment.

"Just looking at the presentation from these folks, they have done a pretty decent job of mitigation. I do not have heavy industrial in my area, but we have a lot of oil and gas activity that is far more impactful than what this looks to be," he said. "It would seem to me that they have done their due diligence on this one."

Town looks to help rental rates

"We have such a low inventory of rental places for people struggling to live in Strathmore that this option - which has not been approved yet - this option is to help with the affordability of finding places to rent," he said. "Strictly from the fact that if you have more inventory of units, that can help the price of rentals in the town for people looking. This is not low-income housing."

Town of Strathmore Development Services currently maintains active goals regarding municipal development to increase the availability of housing options within Strathmore, as local vacancy rates are currently extremely low.

Concerns were also expressed that once construction of the site is under way, developers would not honour agreements established with the town and violate pre-established terms with no consequence or recourse.

Town of Strathmore Manager of Development Services Chuck Proctor said the town would have full authority to halt construction, should developers attempt to work outside of their agreements and approved blueprints.

Council voted in favour of third reading 5-1, with Coun. Debbie Mitzner being the sole opposition to second reading. Coun. Richard Wegener abstained from participation in the vote due to a previous engagement prior to the land use bylaw. He disqualified himself from the vote, being not fully aware of the details surrounding the discussion.

No exact date regarding when development of the 9 Bayside Place site will begin was determined or discussed during the meeting of council.

Siksika Nation has officially broken ground and construction has begun on the new Crowfoot Public Safety building, located on the east side of the reserve.

A sod turning ceremony was hosted June 9 to formalize the start of development and acknowledge the project, despite construction having already begun.

Intentions regarding the facility are to be operated and utilized as a safe haven for reserve members regardless of where within the nation they reside.

Once completed, the structure will be home to the operations of Siksika Nation's peace officers and security programs.

The Crowfoot Public Safety building will also serve to provide a security presence to a segment of Siksika Nation which is not currently supported by adequate policing or protections.

currently dispatch from a facility near Highway 547 on the west side of the reserve boundary.

Coun. Samuel Crowfoot said there is a need for a public safety building of this type in the area, as some Siksika Nation communities and residential areas are more spread out than others, requiring more ground to be covered when responding to calls for aid.

"We want to make sure that the only people within the Gleichen area aren't the only ones who have law enforcement close by," he said. "This satellite police station is meant to bring a 24-hour presence of public safety to that part of the reserve."

In the future, though currently unconfirmed, it is anticipated the Siksika Nation Police Service will begin operations out of the facility in order to create a stronger presence in the area.

Construction of the facility is in partnership between Siksika Nation, and MODUS, an offsite construction company hailing from Crossfield


"Not having enough security is a problem that all reservations face on both sides of the border, and we wanted to make sure that doesn't apply here on Siksika. We want to make sure our people are safe," said Crowfoot.


The estimated budget of the facility is \$1 million, with officials from MO-DUS suggesting the project is roughly 40 per cent complete, and in a pre-fabrication process.

Siksika Nation has also partnered with Werkz Inc., which in a statement are said to have been instrumental in this project.

Once completed, the Crowfoot Public Safety building will be a one-story, 3,600 square-foot facility.

Doors to the Crowfoot Public Safety building are expected to open both to the public, as well as for officers to begin operations in October of this year.





Legacy Barn hosts open house

An open house was hosted at the Legacy Barn in Strathmore, June 15, with the intent to update the public on what exactly was going on with the project regarding development ti-

melines, and what the future would look like.
Scott Silva, director of business de-

velopment for the Legacy Farm Project, said the open house was a great success, and the team was very excited to showcase what was in store for the project.

"We had a lot of people come through, a lot of interest; we started to foster some of our relationships with everyone from different people who want to be in our industrial park, people who want to be on the highway commercial, and our relationships with our future advanced education centre around agriculture," he said.

The Legacy Farm Project received an area structure plan approval in 2022 from the Town of Strathmore, which indicated five distinct phases and five distinct zones which the project consists of.

The first, being the historical barn site, which aims to see development begin this fall. This phase will see the construction of a new, modern barn built in the same image of the original historical structure currently standing.

"The second phase that ties in with

the project is the Green Horizon Industrial Park. This park is going to effectively be working off grid by using systems such as co-generation ... that provide electricity for our tenants," said Silva. "Beyond that though, is really using everything from closed-loop systems and solar power, and everything else we can with respect to sustainability."

Phase 3 will cater to the commercial highway frontage of the project, appealing to businesses with a focus on outdoor living and agriculture. Following that will be a focus on the RV resort and seniors' village.

The final phase of the project, Silva explained, will be for the Institute of Advanced Agriculture, for which the Legacy Farm Project team is working

towards partnering with Olds College to develop.

"We have been working closely with them and hopefully we will be looking at some other opportunities to bring this out to other levels of advanced education ... for not only the vouth but for different demonstration and learning programs," he said. "This is not only a huge commerce opportunity, but a central point for agritourism and agri-innovation. What you are going to start to see is the Institute of Advanced Agriculture is going to be fostering graduates who will then have the opportunity to go into real-world practical situations, possibly even working inside the Green Horizon Park or some other aspect of the Legacy Farm Project."

Amber Scarlett featured for June as artist of the month at library

"It has been a dream of mine to become a fulltime artist where all I do is enjoy painting and doing art all day long, and just to show people that they can become better and learn more about it, as well as trying to just have people imagi-

Safely storing off-road toys

With summer comes the increased use of recreational off-highway vehicles (OHVs) such as quads, dirt bikes and side-by-sides. Alberta RCMP reminds citizens to safely store and protect their recreational vehicles to deter opportunistic thieves. The more difficult you make it for thieves, the less likely they are to take what's not theirs.

Here are some tips to keep your recreational vehicles safe:

- Do not leave keys in or near the vehicle when left unattended.
- When you're done riding, store your vehicle in a locked garage or shed.
- Park larger vehicles in front of your OHV to block it from being easily moved
- Secure OHVs outside with a lock and chain. Cover vehicles with a tarp, and keep them away from the main roads. Out of sight, out of mind!
- For extra protection, keep outdoor lights on at night.
- If you are storing your OHV for a long period of time, consider removing the fuse, deflating the tires, and emptying

the gas tank.

- Keep track of serial numbers, along with photos, of your recreational vehicles should a theft occur.
- If you're OHV doesn't already have one, consider installing a GPS tracking system.

Reminder, OHVs are not permitted for use during fire bans. Exhaust systems can heat up to temperatures over 200 degrees Celsius. Debris falling from OHVs can heat up and smoulder, eventually igniting and creating a wildfire.






Derby time


