Town eyes new doctors

Town of Strathmore council approved the Physician Sponsorship Grant pilot program during the May 15 regular meeting, which aims to attract more doctors to the local community.

The one-year pilot program will offer three grants, each worth up to \$30,000 to support local medical offices in their efforts to attract new physicians to Strathmore, should they choose to take on the role of 'sponsor' through the established College of Physicians and Surgeons of Alberta (CPSA) program.

"Sponsorships are a way to bring internationally trained physicians into Alberta. This pilot program is an innovative initiative that may assist in the recruitment of physicians to Strathmore, easing the physician shortage," said Mayor Pat Fule, via a

Following the year of the program term, the matter will be reviewed and brought back before council for consideration.

In order to be eligible for the grant, an applicant must have a signed sponsorship contract with CPSA prior to their application, agree to commit to sponsoring the internationally trained physician for up to six years, including financially supporting the sponsored physician throughout the registration process, practice readiness assessment, and into independent practice, and agree to pay the grant back to the town should the sponsored physician practice in the town for less than five years.

"This is fantastic, I am just so pleased with Coun. (Denise) Peterson in promoting this with our administration in bringing together this policy. This is going to be a competitive advantage for our municipality that potentially will bring in doctors to this town and so this is something that I have heard loud and clear from residents whether it be door knocking or running into at the grocery store that we have a doctor shortage, and this policy has a potential to make a difference," said Coun. Brent Wiley.

Lady Spartans defend provincial title

The Strathmore Spartans 3A girls rugby team successfully defended their high school Tier 2 provincial championship, May 31 and June 1, at the Calgary Rugby Park.

Head Coach Jerry Flaws explained provincials took on a new format this year, with teams playing three round robin games, which lead to a winner's bracket and a loser's bracket.

"Our goal on Friday was to make sure we qualified for the championship side ... we won our first two games and then in the third one, we played the team we struggled against last year, and we actually had a draw," said Flaws. "We lost in the tie breaking criteria, so we finished second and they finished first, so that set us up for a tougher crossover game on the Saturday."

He explained SHS went up against Drayton Valley, outclassing them with speed in order to take the win and set up for a rematch against Peace River.

"The girls came out super fast, super aggressive and it was actually quite an impressive feat because the other team was bigger and stronger than us," he said. "They really had to use their speed and technique, and the crazy part was even though we were smaller, we were the more aggressive and the more physical team even though we were undersized."

Flaws added his team maintained a goal since the start of the rugby season to get back to the championship game and win it to defend their title as provincial champions.

Similar to last year, Peace River established themselves as




the rival to beat for SHS when it came down to the finals.

Through the regular season, SHS established themselves as able to keep up and play with schools in Alberta's Tier 1 division, playing up from their current Tier 2 seat.

"The biggest tournament in the province ... we finished fourth in the Tier 1 division in that tournament ... the second weekend of May," said Flaws. "We lost to a couple of teams ... they were bigger and stronger and faster and could handle our speed."

SHS will remain in the Tier 2 division next season, as roughly half of their current lineup is graduating. The goal is to further grow the skill of the younger players before attempting to compete at the higher tier.

Flaws said throughout the next season, he will be working with the girls to better their teamwork. Many of them, he explained, are excellent as individual athletes, and he wants to see them continue to improve their teamwork.

If you are a smoker recovering from surgery or a serious wound, you might want to use the event to stop smoking. Smoking delays wound-healing probably due to the constriction of the blood vessels in the skin and adversely affecting certain blood components resulting in longer healing times. Another good reason to stop.

Other products that should be avoided prior to surgery include alcohol, NSAID drugs like ASA and ibuprofen and all vitamin supplements. Your surgeon will advise you as to when to stop drugs like anticoagulants and other prescribed medications.

After we reach our late thirties, our body loses about four ounces (about 110 grams) of muscle each year. So by the time we are 80, we will have lost one-third of our body muscle. This process can be slowed using weight-training. You are never too old to start but get some professional advice before you do.

"Airplane ear" occurs when you are unable to equalize the pressure between your inner ear and outside pressure. If you have a cold and are congested, it can be quite painful. Swallowing or yawning can help. Or you can take a decongestant tablet an hour before the flight. It should help. One can also try the *valsalva maneuver* where you gently blow your nose while pinching your nostrils and keeping your mouth closed.

READING AND REFLECTING Often people dismiss the Bible as an irrelevant artifact of history of no useful application to today's fast paced, hitech world. I think that might indicate that they haven't spent much time reading or reflecting on the stories within it.

For example, in the first chapter of the Gospel of Mark we read of a very busy Jesus leading an action-packed life. Even though it is only the first chapter about Jesus' life we can learn something about living life and relating to people.

What we can discover is a Jesus who doesn't go about lecturing people about how to get into heaven. He had a different approach to both God and people. Jesus saw people as people, not sinners. He saw through whatever fears, defenses to their humanity. He was able to talk to demons because he addressed them in the same manner as he taught, one to one, person to person. Not with dogma, not with threats, not with drama.

Jesus acted in this caring respectful way even though, according to Mark, was a very busy guy! We also learn that he balanced busy-ness with retreat. After a presumably spiritually traumatic baptism, he undertook 40 days of recovery in the wilderness. discerning the meaning of his call from God. He also moderated his stress by having time with companions over food, bread and wine. Ath the end of an exhausting day and evening, he took an early walk alone for solitary morning prayer.

Jesus knew he was on a long, difficult, dangerous journey. His disciples had a better idea. They wanted him to stay near the hometown and settle down. They knew there were many sick, wounded, and possessed people there. There was a real possibility of a career as a local healer, with all the comforts of town life instead of the road ahead. They didn't ask if they were there yet but acted as if they thought they were. Jesus knew a road trip was needed to dispel their notions of comfortable faith life.

So, what can this say to churches and followers of Christ today? We aren't there yet. We will always be tempted to settle down and be comfortable in our faith, our churches, our convictions. Yet we have a message, the kin-dom of God is at hand, close enough to touch, close enough to engage, close enough to plug into. Close enough to live as if it were already here. We have the invitation and opportunity to unplug from the idols of the world, a little each day. We have the invitation

and opportunity to plug into God's great, inclusive, non-violent healing mission to the whole fearful and fractured, God-loved planet. We have the assurance that whether we accept the invitation or not, we are not alone. Look around within and outside the church. Don't look for sinners, look for hurting, desperate people and treat them with the respect they deserve as children of God. God is with us. Thanks be to God.

"When I hear about how hard other municipalities are working at attracting doctors and how much they are spending - this amount of money at \$90,000 is very reasonable, again with the payoff potentially being three doctors."

Coun. Richard Wegener suggested approaching the county and other municipalities to potentially also get other municipal governments in on the sponsorship.

"I think this is a good example of council putting money where our mouth is. We have all sat here ... and spoken about how we understand that the shortage of doctors in our community is dire, and you have heard us all say that, and now you are hearing us commit some money behind that to try and make a difference here and to bring additional medical services to our community," said Coun. Melissa Langmaid.

"I am really grateful to the doctors in the community who expend a huge amount of their own resources and their own energies to taking new doctors on, and prior to this, doing it at their own costs. I am very proud of a council that will help to share that burden and bring added value to our community," said Coun. Peterson.

The town opened the application window for the program beginning June 1, and will allocate the grants on a first come, first served basis.

WHMB application for provincial grant funding unsuccessful

The Province of Alberta has released that the application for grant funding submitted by the Wheatland Housing Management Board (WHMB) and Wheatland and Area Hospice Society (WAHS) was unsuccessful during this intake.

The application for the project proposed to the province the 120-bed congregate living space, which is to include three to six dedicated hospice areas.

A statement attributed to Jason Nixon, minister of seniors, community and social services, said funding applications to the Affordable Housing Partnership Program (AHPP) have seen a strong uptake, and were thus, highly competitive.

"I have had an opportunity to talk to the minister, and I have talked to Erica Washington, I think she is the head of finance, and Robert Craig, he is part of the buildings team ... and they told us we had a very strong application, they had just run out of money," said Glenn Koester, chair of the WHMB. "Our application is still in, we do not have to resubmit, it is still in (and) the next go round, there is going to be more money in the pot. That is what we were

Since receiving the notice of their unsuccessful application, Koester said the WHMB has made efforts to further improve the application for grant funding, including the addition of a Class B budget.

Further, Koester explained the WHMB will be striving to add letters of support from municipalities surrounding Strathmore that would benefit from the existence of a facility such as the proposed new lodge.


"I am thinking unless we can find some more money, we will do a Class A (budget), but we do not have enough money to do a Class A yet. But, a Class A is not required to more ahead," he said. "They (the province) mentioned there might be some more money this summer, depending on things on their end, (and) if not, in the fall, and I think they are in constant talks with the (federal government) too in how they can streamline the process."

Koester added feedback had been provided to the WHMB by the province regarding their application, requesting a few clarifications, though nothing more was noted to be required in terms of numbers or project information.

The WHMB will be discussing their next steps with respect to the project during their next board meeting.

Senior's Week returns

Senior's Week is once again being recognized across Alberta, June 3-9, serving as an outlet to show appreciation for older adults and their contributions to local communities.

Megan Williams, communication specialist for Alzheimer Calgary explained this year's theme for Senior's Week is "aging more," encouraging everyone to spend more time with the older adults in their lives.

"For us at Alzheimer Calgary that is including those with Alzheimer's and dementia, because we know that a common myth around dementia is that once you have a diagnosis, your life is over," said Williams. "We know, and we really want people to know that you can still spend a lot of great quality time with your person living with dementia and they still love to do many of their preferred activities and the things that they have always liked to do, and eat, and places that they like to visit."

In Strathmore, Bridging the Gap is hosting a series of events each day throughout Senior's Week. These include workshops, swimming, artistic ac-

These, as well as the associated times each event will be taking place are listed via the Bridging the Gap website.

"Alzheimer Calgary is really committed to redu-

cing stigma and raising awareness about Alzheimer's disease and other dementias in the community. Last year, we launched our 'stillme.ca' website which has a lot of great tips, tricks, tools, and a whole section on myth busting," added Williams. "We really encourage people to go and visit the website so they can find some of those resources and tips around having a great visit, tips around body language, tips around what you can expect (and) living with someone post diagnosis."

Also made available are resources about activities which can reduce the risk of dementia for seniors.

These include activities which are good for the heart as well as the brain such as not smoking, limiting alcohol consumption, getting good sleep and making healthy eating choices.

"The mandate of Seniors Week really is to just encourage (people) to spend time with older adults in their lives. We know that all of those relationships can have great benefits for seniors and older adults," said Williams. "We want to share the message to not be intimidated or afraid to spend time with your loved one post diagnosis. They may have some unexpected behaviors, ask a lot of questions or have you repeat things, or seem confused at times, but that does not mean that they do not still enjoy spending time with





Strathmore High School victorious in new Golden Hills eSports tournament

A new eSports tournament made its debut at Three Hills School, May 22 for students at the junior high and high school levels.

"A few months ago at the (Golden Hills) school division, there was quite a push to develop some eSports in our area, in our division," said Ed Eberts, a teacher at Strathmore High School. "My school has been competing in eSports for a few years with what is called the High School eSports League – it is kind of an international competition; schools enter a team and they have a number of games available, but it is a play-at-home type thing and students use their own equipment."

Eberts explained Golden Hills had a desire to see eSports competition in a more organized environment, established in person.

Personnel from a host of schools that were interested in participating were gathered to establish coaches, organizers and tournament staff. The school division provided the equipment to operate the tournament.

"They chose the game for this first time and that was Rocket League ... that was organized back in February-March, and they received some equipment just after Easter break," said Eberts. "Every school that was interested had to organize and get a team or two, or even more at the junior high and high school levels."

Rocket League is a team-based multiplayer indie game where teams play soccer with rocket-powered cars. The object of the game is to score as many points as possible within the five-minute round time.

He added, around Alberta, there are not yet very many events or organized competitions in the realm of eSports available to students.

Further, Eberts said there has been a big push to develop eSports as an extracurricular activity to help kids learn sportsmanship, to compete, and to come together.

"They are doing it so much on their own time, this is another way to get kids to get together



and build that community and find people that they want to play with and learn some skills like sportsmanship and organizing," he said. "The gym up in Three Hills was completely full. They had way more teams and schools interested than they thought; we ended up with 14 teams at the high school level, and I forget how many there ended up being at the junior high level."

Discussions are already underway at the school division to potentially host two more tournaments next school year – one being in the fall, and the second being in the spring.

In future competitions, Golden Hills is looking to expand the number of games offered for students, such as titles potentially including League of Legends, Valorant, Mario Kart, and Super Smash Bros.

Additionally, once local teams are formed, Eberts said the idea will also be to entertain the possibility of competition outside of the Golden Hills School Division, such as throughout the province, or across the country.

Strathmore High School claimed first and third places with two of their competing teams in the high school division.

Strathmore's podium teams consisted of Seth Hook, Amari Hudson and Ian Toews (first place), and Chris Bullivant, Preston Davies, and Tyler Worthington (third place).

Council Approves Physician Sponsorship Grant Pilot Program | Pilot Program Aims to Help Ease Physician Shortages

Council approved the Physician Sponsorship Grant pilot program at the Wednesday, May 15, Town Council meeting.

The one-year pilot program will offer three (3) grants, each worth up to \$30,000, to support local medical offices in their efforts to attract physicians to Strathmore, should they choose to take on the role of Sponsor through the established College of Physicians & Surgeons of Alberta (CPSA) program. After the one-year term, the program will be reviewed and brought back to Council for consider-

"Sponsorships are a way to bring internationally trained physicians into Alberta. This pilot program is an innovative initiative that may assist in the recruitment of physicians to Strathmore, easing the physician shortage," shared Mayor Pat Fule.

To be eligible for the grant, applicants must have signed a sponsorship contract with CPSA before applying, agree to commit to sponsoring the internationally trained physician for up to six (6) years, including financially supporting the sponsored physician throughout the registration process, practice readiness assessment, and into independent practice, and agree to pay the grant back to the Town should the sponsored physician practice in the Town for less

The Town will start accepting applications on June 1, 2024, and will allocate them on a first-come, first-served basis.

Council Approves Strathmore Property Tax Rates | Property tax rate increase set at 5.6%

Council approved the Property Tax Rate Bylaw at the Wednesday, May 15 Town Council meeting.

Each year, Council approves the budget required to support Town services. The Town's 2024 Operating and Capital Budgets guide the Property Tax Rate Bylaw and the tax rates reflect the amount of tax to be paid for every dollar of assessed property value. Funds collected through property tax are split between the Town of Strathmore, the Government of Alberta, and Wheatland Housing.

Property assessments are prepared annually using mass appraisal techniques, which determine property values by grouping similar properties at a specific point in time. Assessments do not reflect a single sale price; they show the typical market value on the same date each year. This year, the average residential single-family assessment increased by 16.3%, up from

\$368,600 in 2023 to \$428,700 in 2024. To support the Town's essential municipal services, including community safety, roads and infrastructure, and essential programming, while continuing to minimize inflationary impacts on the community, Town Council has voted to set the property tax rate increase at 5.6 %. From the property taxes collected, the Town of Strathmore retains 73 % to support municipal operations, while 26 % is transferred to the Government of Alberta to support education, and 1% is used to support Wheatland Housing. In order to offset the higher than expected requisitions from the Government of Alberta and Wheatland Housing Management Body, Council amended the 2024 Operating by increasing the transfer from the Financial Stabilization Reserve by \$202,100.


"Property taxes enable the Town to continue to deliver quality services to the community," shared Mayor Pat Fule. "During deliberations, Council was focused on balancing our need to invest in our infrastructure and fund the programs and services that our residents rely on, with our desire to minimize the financial burden on residents and businesses."

With the passing of the Property Tax Rate Bylaw, Administration will prepare the 2024 property tax bills to be mailed to property owners during the last week of May, with payments due June 30, 2024. Along with

the tax bills, information will be provided to property owners regarding the 2024 Operating and Capital Budgets. The property tax notices will also provide information on the Town's monthly Tax Installment Payment Program (TIPPS) and the Town's new Tax Arrears Payment Plan (TAPP).

New permanent laboratory services open in Strathmore

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has announced the local Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL) in Strathmore has moved to a larger, permanent location.

The new lab is located at 299 Edgefield Place, and officially opened its doors as the operational local lab, June 3.

In a release, AHS detailed the new lab boasts nine patient rooms, and greater access to parking than previously available. Similarly, the temporary Country Lane Mall location only hosted five patient rooms.

"Planning for the current permanent lab location in Strathmore began approximately two years ago. The location at Country Lane Mall was always intended to be temporary until the new building was ready for occupancy," said Yolanda Lackie, executive director, community services for Alberta Precision Laboratories. "This expansion will enhance our capacity to serve the community more efficiently. Additionally, the new site offers ample parking, which we believe will make visits more convenient for both patients and visitors. Starting in July, we will offer Electrocardiogram (ECG) services at the new location, a service that was not available at the previous site."

The operating hours for the lab will remain unchanged, being Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. as well as Saturday from 8 a.m. until noon.

Saturday bookings, however, will be by appointment only as opposed to drop in availability. Patients are able to book an appointment over the phone or online. The lab's contact information will remain unchanged.

All staff who will be operating the new facility are those who are being transferred over from the temporary lab site.

"The lab will continue to provide the same services currently offered including: blood collections, urine collection, drop off of other samples and (of course) ECGs," said Lackie. "We expect the community will appreciate the larger space and the ample parking, which we believe will make visits more convenient for both patients and visitors."

Lackie added AHS and APL did not experience any notable hurdles or roadblocks in establishing the new facility outside of standard local development procedures.

APL is a wholly owned subsidiary of AHS, responsible for delivering diagnostic lab services to Albertans across the provincial health care system.

"Originally, Strathmore did not have a community collection site. All laboratory work was done at the Strathmore District Health Services in an outpatient setting," said Lackie. "When the temporary location opened on Dec. 5, 2022, it provided the community with a dedicated laboratory collection site making it more convenient for the community."





Library speaks to June programming

The Strathmore Municipal Library is hosting a collection of art pieces created by Strathmore High School students throughout the months of June and July

"There are about six different artists who we are featuring. Anybody was given the opportunity to display, and it just depended on who wanted to have their work up in the gallery," said Laura Henderson, public services manager with the library. "We have 15 pieces from the students ... there is some really neat work, they are all very different, there is a lot of mixed media that is very different from other artists that we feature, and the talent is just incredible. I am just blown away at these high school students."

For this gallery, there was no set or preestablished theme or criteria, instead consisting of pieces that the students were proud of or felt like they simply wished to have on display.

This marks the second year the library has hosted a student showcase, as Henderson had approached the school in 2023 to assemble the gallery during a similar time of the year.

"I just thought it was a really fun way to highlight artists who maybe do not have a full exhibit but want to highlight some of their work," she said. "When we removed the gallery last year, I asked them (the school) if this was something they would want to do every year and they said as long as it was near the end of the year when they have had a chance to work on their art through the

The library is shifting gears in regards to their regular art galleries, opting to give artists the option to have a one or two-month display instead of switching on a month-by-month basis.

Henderson explained this is because of the time-consuming process required to set up the gallery, which then also lends more time to showcased artists to have their work on display, be recognized, and to potentially sell some of their pieces.

Some of the showcased students have also listed their work as for sale through the library, which is indicated next to the respective pieces.

The library is also hosting an Indigenous Histories presentation June 12 as part of their regular adult programming before programs slow down for the summer.

Town of Strathmore Indigenous Liaison Astokomii Smith, and Tiffany Carlson will be speaking on behalf of Family and Community Support Services (FCSS), highlighting Blackfoot and Metis heritage.

 - Oncoming commercial vehicles can create strong wind gusts, large splashes in wet conditions, or sprays of debris. Practice defensive driving and brace when they are passing.
 - Leave extra space when passing or changing lanes in front of commercial vehicles as they require more time to slow down or come to a stop.
 - Stay back when large vehicles are indicating right or left, as they require a wide turning radius.

Reflecting on progress: A year in review

On May 29, 2023, Albertans entrusted the United Conservative Party with the responsibility to lead this remarkable province. Since then, our government has remained steadfast in its commitment to fulfill promises, propel Alberta forward, and ensure fiscal responsibility. With pride, I share some highlights of our collective achievements and my endeavors as your dedicated MLA.

LEGISLATIVE PROGRESS AND COMMITMENT TO ACCOUNTABILITY

Throughout the past year, we've seen a comprehensive legislative agenda spanning two Sessions, which saw the passage of 22 Bills in Session 1 and 13 Bills in Session 2. We've fulfilled key platform commitments, and upheld our pledge to balance the budget for the third consecutive year, a milestone indicative of our prudent fiscal stewardship.

Advocacy and Engagement: Amplifying Constituent Voices In my capacity as Parliamentary Secretary for Affordability and Utilities, I've been working with Minister Neudorf and been advocating for policies that enhance affordable and reliable electricity. I had the honour of joining Premier Smith and Minister Neudorf for two recent podium announcements in April on our work to make electricity more affordable.

I have also been appointed as one of Alberta's Pacific North-

West Economic Region (PNWER) Delegate Council members and sit on The Energy Council's Executive Committee and the Centre for Legislative Energy and Environmental Research (CLEER) Board of Directors. I also sit on the Standing Committee on Public Accounts (PAC), the Standing Committee on Alberta's Economic Future, and the Alberta First Cabinet Policy Committee.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT: AMPLIFYING CONSTITUENT VOICES

Integral to effective representation is active engagement with constituents, community stakeholders, schools, healthcare providers, local organizations, and our municipalities. I have had hundreds of discussions and group meetings to address individual case work, listen to concerns, and celebrate the remarkable achievements in the constituency.

I was also pleased to attend in person over a hundred community events and celebrations and met some of the most incredible people that work and live in our constituency. Additionally, I hosted a series of five 'Coffee Meet & Greets' across Strathmore, Carseland, Lyalta, Langdon, and Chestermere, providing more opportunities for meaningful dialogue and feedback.

LOCAL WINS: INVESTING IN EDUCATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Budget 2024 heralded significant victories for our community, with notable investments in education and infrastructure projects. Noteworthy achievements include full construction funding for a K-9 Catholic School in Chestermere, design funding for a K-9 Rocky View Public School in Chestermere, and final funding for the completion of the new Langdon 7-12 High School which will be opening this fall.

Moreover, infrastructure funding has been allocated to vital projects, highway, and water management initiatives. This includes the Strathmore Courthouse renovation and expansion, totaling over \$4.5 million dollars. Under the Alberta Community Partnership Strategic Initiatives funding stream, the Ministry of Transportation and Economic Corridors provided grant funding of \$1,048,125 for the Lyalta Wastewater Lagoon and Force Main Detailed Design Engineering.

Nearly \$14 million dollars has been provided for design funds for bridge work on CPR overpass on Hwy 1, 11 km East of Chestermere at Inverlake Overpass, planning funding for Hwy. 1 and Range Road 264 De Havilland interchange, planning funding for Hwy. 1 and Garden/Conrich Road interchange and for Hwy. 1 and Range Road 791 interchange, design funding for streetlights at Hwy. 817 and 564, funds for repaving between 1 km South of Hwy. 1 and three km north of the Town of Strathmore and upgrade of the Wastewater Treatment Plant PLC SCADA in the Town of Strathmore.

I have heard your concerns regarding the high levels of traffic on Glenmore Trail and have been advocating for its improvement to accommodate both residential and industrial growth to the east of Calgary. Please note that Traffic Impact Assessments are underway on Glenmore Trail to determine necessary infrastructure improvements and ensure taxpayers' dollars are being respected.


LOOKING AHEAD: CONTINUING THE JOURNEY TOGETHER

Legacy Farm Project moving to next development stage

The Legacy Farm Project is moving into the next stage of its development, which includes the planning stages for the new barn, and the occupation of their highway commercial land.

"This new barn will house the permanent and dedicated classrooms for legacy farm educational programming. It will also house our museum and living archives in partnership with the Western District Historical Society," said Scott Silva, director of business development for the Legacy Farm Project. "What is really great is we are going to have a full service kitchen ... we are going to have a creamery set up ... and then of course, we are going to have a (nearly) 7,000 square foot programmable event space that will allow us to bring in our schools during the week, (and) also any large functions that really require an event space."

Silva explained the space will be easily able to accommodate anything from corporate events to weddings, to performing arts inside the new barn.

The new space will have a seated capacity of 150, with space enough to host live music and performances.

According to Silva, as the Legacy Barn is experiencing a high volume of bookings this year. No site work for the new historical barn will begin until, by estimate, the end of October or into early November.

"That is all pending permits, approvals and submissions, but that is the timeline that we are working with and ... we will not disrupt the summer events that are planned," said Silva. "It should only take a couple of months for Remuda (Building Ltd) to do their work and then starting early 2025 is when we would be doing the interior buildout because that will take several months."

Silva added a primary focus of the project continues to be addressing the classroom and educational components for the Legacy Farm. This is reflected in the memorandums of understanding established with Golden Hills and Christ the Redeemer school divisions, Olds College, and other associated learning centers.

The Legacy Farm Project will also maintain 25 acres of highway commercial frontage along the TransCanada highway, directly south of the local Walmart in Strathmore.

"That is the highway frontage land of the Legacy Farm Project, it is off market, and it is remaining off market, but we have some interested parties already at the table, and we are entertaining others from interested parties," said Silva. "The reason why we say that is because it is key that whoever is to come into that development space aligns with the legacy vision and that means an agricultural focus - everything from potential tractor dealerships, service equipment, to agricultural supply companies."


