Students gain cultural experience

The Golden Hills School Division (GHSD) hosted their second annual demonstration powwow at Strathmore High School (SHS) on June 1, hosting schools from across the county.

Originally intended to take place in the field outside the school, SHS' powwow was migrated indoors due to unfavourable weather conditions.

SHS principal, Doug Raycroft, explained the powwow was a little different than a more traditional event, as it took place over a shorter period of time, and focussed more on learning and teaching than ceremony or competition.

"When they do something, our MC would talk about why they do it that way and the importance of it. And when they do the dances, they also talk about the significance of the different dances and the regalia," said Raycroft. "It is a more educational pow wow and a cultural experience for the kids ... I think it is really important because part of being culturally aware is to have the knowledge, which is a big part of the experience. The more you know, the more you are able to understand."

Prior to engaging all of their schools in one large event, schools across the GHSD would put on individual powwows for local students.

According to Raycroft, the switch to a larger, single event was to give some schools that may not have had their own powwows a chance to engage in the culture and learning, as well as to coordinate so students can share in a larger experience together.

"Schools that are a part of the Siksika Service Agreement, and they have students from Siksika in their school. We have been doing it, but some schools, there is no agreement, so there are not as many Siksika students in them," said Raycroft.

Strathmore Aquatic Centre celebrates 20 years of operation

The Strathmore Aquatic Centre hosted its 20th anniversary

in 2015.

"It's so exciting to hit this milestone. Over these years we've worked together to provide recreation, fitness programs, and water safety in our community," said Natasha Barron, who has served as manager of the facility for its entire lifespan. "I'll be celebrating alongside past and present staff and patrons, whose vibrancy and commitment to aquatics makes the Strathmore Aquatic Centre so much more than a pool. We're really a hub for foundational learning, career development, personal growth and inclusive fitness opportunities." First established in 2002, the Strathmore Aquatic Centre is advertised as a leading facility in aquatic safety, swimming education, and community wellness, with a focus on providing a wide range of programs and services for the local community. Brazier added the facility serves as a destination of choice for locals, and serves to aid the town's initiative in promoting community wellness, and to have a variety of recreational options available to residents.

Additionally, the centre has hosted numerous swim-athons, kayaking courses, cardboard boat races, aquasize classes, scuba activities and triathlons. The Strathmore Aquatic Centre proudly boasts having been host to the 55+ Games "The overall impact to the swim community is ... the ability to have convenient public lane swim times for our users, and the amount of swim lessons that are produced and run out of the facility as well," he said.

During the free use event that took place, games, activities and a host of recreational options were made available to the public to enjoy, courtesy of the town for the occasion.


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

As World Hunger Day took place, May 28, Nutrien worked to raise awareness for the occasion and for the rising issue of global food insecurity.

Though Nutrien did not host a specific event for World Hunger Day to fundraise or increase awareness, instead the team is working to actively campaign for the topic.

Huack Miller said in addition to their efforts to increase world hunger awareness, the team is working to reduce the environmental impact of agriculture and their product developments.

"Our team manufactures nitrogen products from natural gas, air and steam. It's amazing that the work we do here is enabling farmers to speed plant growth and aid in animal growth and development," she said. "Across the business, we're focused on reducing GHG emissions during the manufacturing process of low-carbon ammonia, the basic building block of all nitrogen fertilizers, by up to 80 per cent through carbon capture technology and other low-emission production technologies."

According to their release, local talent at the facility just south of Strathmore are using world-class technology to reduce costs and their environmental impact, enabling better yields for farmers to feed the world.

At the Redwater nitrogen facility here in Alberta, approximately 500 tonnes per day of CO2 are captured for use in enhanced oil recovery and permanently sequestered deep underground.

Local facilities are also lowering carbon intensity through N2O abatement technology and the use of low-carbon by-product hydrogen, produced from other processes to create a lower carbon intensity than conventional hydrogen.

Bronc battle

The second annual Gunners Bronc Battle, hosted by the Gleichen & District Ag Society, will take place at the new location beside the Gleichen Arena on June 14.

"A year ago, we moved the Gleichen rodeo grounds into the Village of Gleichen," said Marci Wilson, a volunteer with the Gleichen Ag Society.

Last year was the inaugural saddle bronc riding competition, which had a great turn out and Wilson is hopeful that this year will be just as successful.

The saddle bronc riding competition is a major fundraising event for the ag society; not only can people see some professional bronc riding, but they can also purchase tickets for a pre-show barbecue beef dinner. The money raised will stay within the Gleichen area to help local organizations.

While the evening won't feature other typical rodeo events, the solely saddle bronc format will feature 30 or so of the top riders in Canada and the US.

The stock for the saddle bronc riding will also be some of the top in the country, coming from the Calgary Stampede, Big Stone Rodeo and Northcott Yule Rodeo.

"It's a PRCA (Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association) and CPRA (Canadian Professional Rodeo Association) (event) ... approved by both associations," said Wilson. "(We've) doubled our prize money - doubled it from last year. It's one of the Top 5 paid (saddle bronc events) in all of Canada."

Besides the pros, there will also be novice bronc riding, a Calcutta event and wild pony races.

Thirteen-year-old trick rider Piper Yule, who has performed at the Calgary Stampede and the Canadian Finals Rodeo, will also provide exhilarating entertainment.

"That particular week there is another very big bronc riding competition up in Wild Wood, Alta," said Wilson of the weekday event. "So, we wanted to play off of that, hoping to draw more of the top guys up here so they could come to both of the bronc riding events.

'We had a fantastic crowd last year; the word has been pretty positive."

UFA continues its \$100,000 community grant

Are increasing costs making it harder to reach your fundraising goal?

Inflation and lingering supply-chain issues have pushed building costs higher, but there is a way to help rural communities reach their dreams.

For the fifth year, the UFA Rural Communities Foundation (RCF) is offering up to \$100,000 to ensure rural Alberta remains strong.

"Five years ago, we made the commitment to give away \$100,000 a year for five years and we have seen the positive impact of these grants. Our goal is to help keep rural Alberta communities sustainable." The UFA Rural Communities Foundation has committed to invest \$500,000 over five years in rural communities. The mandate of the foundation is to improve the sustainability of farmers and ranchers in Alberta by improving access to funding

for educational, recreational and cultural facilities and programs in Alberta.

Groups who are eligible to apply include registered charities under the Canada Revenue Agency, registered non-profit organizations who are registered with either their provincial or municipal government and community service co-operatives. The project must be located within 200 kilometres of a UFA location and must be completed within two years.

Application forms are available online now from our website www.rcfufa.com. The application can be submitted until August 31 of this year. Winners will be announced in October, during Co-operative week.




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

The Strathmore High School (SHS) girls rugby team concluded an undefeated season, bringing home the gold from their provincial tournament, May 26 and 27.

According to Head Coach, Jerry Flaws, though the girls team has medaled at provincials before, becoming champions and running an undefeated season were both school firsts.

"The tournament went really well. The first game against Peace River from the North Zone ended up being our closest game. We scored with about 30 seconds left to secure victory in that one," he said. "They played super physical and just slowed down the game where our team prefers to run and keep it wide open. We got a couple of lucky breaks and scored."

After Peace River, the Spartans took on Vulcan, who Flaws said brought a star player of sorts who was a particularly challenging opponent.

"In that game, they had this one really amazing player and in the first half; she got away from us a couple of times and scored," he said. "In the second half, the girls were able to hold her back and then we took over. All weekend, we would take over in the second half."



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

The Strathmore Stampede Royalty Committee has announced they will be hosting a fashion show on the Agricultural Society grounds and will be introducing their royalty candidates for this year.

Program Coordinator Nikki Peltzer said the Miss Strathmore Stampede competition will be kicking off June 8, the same day of the fashion show, and will run until June 11.

"We have a few events going on in the morning, and then the evening ends off with the fashion show," she said.

The competition to claim the title of Stampede Royalty for Strathmore consists of a written test, personal interview, speech, and horsemanship competitions. Contestants will be evaluated in each category before a winner is crowned.

Three young women have thrown their hats into the ring this year, including Breanna Correia, Kailyn Simpson, and Ellen Van Noordenburg.

Last year, Martina Holtkamp was crowned Miss Strathmore Stampede, and represented the organization throughout the rodeo season. She, as well as Miss Rodeo Canada, Mackenzie Skeels, will both be attending the Strathmore fashion show.

"It is definitely a job. Martina had a very busy schedule this last year. I asked her to summarize how many events she has been to, but pretty much every weekend she has been to at least one, if not two or more things," said Peltzer. "It is a lot of travelling around the province and attending not just rodeos, but community events and fundraisers - all kinds of different promotional things put on by our community."

Tickets for the June 8 event have been made available at The Rack on Third, Lammle's, Maggie's Nest, and at the Strathmore Agricultural Society office.

Doors to the event are scheduled to open at 6 p.m. to a cash bar, trade show, food, and prize tables. The fashion show is slated to begin at 7 p.m.

"Last year, because it was our first year of getting the program up and running again, we just did a small fashion show at a boutique ... we probably had 150 people come. We have 225 tickets available this year," said Peltzer. "We have been so thrilled with how much the community has supported this ... we have got a great number of supporters, and then we have got a lot of other businesses that are kicking in and helping with the door prizes and raffle table."

The new Miss Strathmore Stampede will be crowned as the competition comes to a close on June 11.

SHS student wins Scotts Canada Young Gardener Award

Strathmore High School (SHS) Student, Beth Ostrowski, has been awarded the Scotts Canada Young Gardener Award for her work and contributions to the SHS greenhouse project.

Ostrowski was nominated for the award by her instructor, Cole Hintz, who felt she should be recognized for the work she has put into local horticulture over her time at SHS.

"She has been with us from the beginning when we started to take on a lot of these projects, including doing some work experience with our aquaponic system and doing a couple courses through Lethbridge College," said Hintz.

The Scotts Canada Young Gardener Award hosted an open nomination process that aims to recognize young Canadian community leaders who show a keen interest in gardening.

Ostrowski said she started gardening at a young age with her family, though found an interest in agriculture are horticulture as she entered high school.

"I like the ground, I like sustainable ways to grow things like aquaponics and hydroponics, they are all very cool," she said. "My dad started me out on this journey and Mr. Hintz helped me immensely to grow, so it was awesome."

Ostrowski added when she was informed by Hintz that she had been nominated for the award, she initially did not think much of it.

Hintz said Ostrowski has often been willing to jump in and help out in regards to the greenhouse, regardless of what needed to be done for it.

"She is always willing to chip in ... she gave up her time to be there and help with big jobs, small jobs, whatever needed to get done," he said. "She can usually be found out there on her spare and is always asking if it is open so she can pop in and water things or do a little bit of weeding."

As a part of the award, Ostrowski will receive recognition through Nutrients for Life and Scotts Canada, as well as receive a swag bag as a prize.

Ostrowski explained she has plans to continue her learning in the fields of agriculture and horticulture as she looks to post-secondary education.

"I am looking at Olds College to take mainly technician classes to learn more about things like watering and fertilizer in all sorts of stuff," she said.

This summer, Hintz said Ostrowski will also be working with the Junior Forest Rangers to complete a seven-week program in northern Alberta.

SHS will be hosting a grand opening of the greenhouse, June 27 from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. to showcase the development.



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

The organization is aiming to provide local kids, aged four to 14, with proper safety instruction, and to ensure that both their bikes and their helmets are fit to ride.

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With contributions from the Town of Strathmore, local RCMP, Canadian Tire, and The Joker Bicycle Company, this event will be the first annually of its kind hosted by Kiwanis in Strathmore.

"I do not think this is a novel idea. The Bike Safety Rodeo has been held in Strathmore a few times previously ... but basically this is an effort by Kiwanis to bring some level of awareness to safety issues amongst our youth for the upcoming summer," said Bob Sobol, who spoke on behalf of Kiwanis. "There will first be a bit of a discussion in regards to general safety issues, and that will be presented by a peace officer either from the RCMP or from municipal enforcement ... then there will be a track course complete with road signs."

Technicians will be on hand during the event

Kiwanis has stated they will host a maximum capacity of 40 kids for the event, broken up into two groups of 20 for an assigned period to make their way through the event stations.

We want to emphasize that there has to be a respect for vehicles and that, especially in crosswalks, that is one of the most important areas bicyclists have to learn that when they are on their bike, they are considered a vehicle," said Sobol. "Cyclists have to dismount in order to be treated as a pedestrian, so if you are in a crosswalk and are zipping across, you should not expect to necessarily have vehicles stop for you ... dismounting your bike really is the way to do it, and is the legal way to do it."

For the kids who are in need of new helmets, they will be granted a gift certificate for the Strathmore Canadian Tire to get their helmet replaced free of charge.

The event will take place from noon until 4 p.m. June 11, hosted outside at the Kinsmen Park pavilion, regardless of weather conditions.
