## **Strathmore Day** moves online

The Town of Strathmore has announced that it will not be hosting in-person activities for Strathmore Day this year, deciding to allocate town funds elsewhere to higher priorities.

According to Johnathan Strathdee, manager of legislative services for the Town of Strathmore, the decision to not host the celebration of the town's incorporation in person was not made lightly.

"Funding for Strathmore Day was considered by council during the 2023 budget deliberations. This was a challenging year to budget for, as there are many economic factors impacting municipalities, including inflation," he said. "Council approved a wholistic budget that balanced economic factors while still maintaining the high service levels that the community expects. Ultimately, administration recommended that Strathmore Day be removed from the budget to support council with limiting the overall tax increase for 2023."

This year will mark 115 years since Strathmore's incorporation, originally as a village. Strathmore Day was first proclaimed in 2021 by Strathmore Town Council, and due to COVID-19 restrictions at the time, was largely hosted online.

The town will continue to recognize Strathmore Day this year, though it will be returning to the online and social media format.

"We recognize Strathmore Day on March 20 because the town was incorporated as a village on March 20, 1908. Strathmore Day is a way for us to celebrate our town's history and honour previous generations," said Strathdee. "We will continue to mark Strathmore Day on March 20 each year. The way the day is recognized could change year to year."

Despite their immediate proximity, Strathdee clarified the Lead By Example Powwow being hosted March 17 to 19 had no impact on the decision to not host Strathmore Day in person, though added it would have been challenging for town staff, as well as external partners to plan for two large events back to back.

# Preparing for the show

The Strathmore Musical Arts Festival (SPAF) is once again preparing for their annual musical festival March 24 to April 2.

This year the event is expected to be the largest one to date, since their start in 2019, with over 400 entries. With performances ranging from vocal solos to group band numbers, there will be something for everyone to take in.

Loralee Laycock is the current president of the SPAF who is excited to see the festival in person again this year.

"Let's hope that's the new trend," said Laycock of the live event.

The festival had to take a brief virtual transition during COVID-19 but it came back stronger than ever for a live event in 2022.

The festival is a huge commitment, but one worth taking on, says Laycock. The board consists of eight members. They begin meeting for the festival planning in October. The actual date for the next year's festival is set nearly a year in advance.

The fundamentals of the SPAF are to encourage the arts in and around Strathmore by providing a safe and positive environment for everyone involved, audience members, adjudicators and performers alike. The festival is primarily for elementary, junior high and high school students from the immediate area.

"One thing that's been really exciting is that we have had an increase in the number of entries; we are at about 400 entries, which is the most we've ever had," Laycock explains "It's very exciting for us, but it does come with additional challenges."

Ensuring there are enough venues and volunteers has been an area that needed extra attention

along with the added task in making sure there are no scheduling conflicts for students who are in multiple disciplines.

"Approximately 60 volunteers are needed for just the running of the festival." Laycock said "Like with any volunteer organization, we could always use more (volunteers)."

If you would like to volunteer and be a part of the festival you can email volunteerspaf@gmail.

Performers will also have an adjudication, where an expert in a specific field watches the performances, takes notes, and at the end gives live feedback of the performance.

"The advantage of this is that they (the performers) not only get feedback from an expert in their field, but they get to watch other people who are doing what they do," said Laycock. "There is a feeling of community and support for other kids who are in the arts in the community."

There will be seven adjudicators attending the week-long festival; Rhonda Sylvester (musical theatre), Dr. Joy Berg (classical voice and speech), Jodi Groenheide (band and instrumental), Jeremy Legault (band), Laurie Syer (strings), Lana Henchell (junior piano) and Dale Wheeler (senior pi-

The full festival schedule and adjudicators bios can be viewed on the SPAF website www.strathmorepaf.com. The festival runs from March 24 to April 1, with the final festival showcase performance and awards night on Tuesday, April 4 at 7 p.m. at the Strathmore Hope Community Covenant Church located at 245 Brent Blvd Strathmore.

"If people wanted a little snippet of everything that was happening during the festival, the final performance is a great way to view that," said Lay-






#### Storm surge

#### Local Journalism Initiative Reporter Over the course of the month, the Strathmore Municipal Library, in partnership with Trellis, has been hosting cultural programming for education

regarding local First Nations. "First, we offered soapstone carving, and we ran six different programs for that ... and that was geared toward certain age groups. Three of them were geared towards homeschool families, one was a youth, one was a teenage, and one was an adult program," said Laura Henderson, library public services coordinator. "This is a partnership with Trellis. It is a grant-funded program, so the idea is to promote Indigenous programming in the community to make it a welcoming space for everyone and to have events that include everybody."

Regarding the soapstone carvings, the first session was hosted Jan. 28, and the final program was held in mid-February, according to Henderson.

Through the grant program with Trellis, the library also hosted a two-night event for creating ribbon skirts, and a "Seven Sacred Teachings

The ribbon skirt session, though not attended by as many as the soapstone carving, according to Henderson still attracted a very excited audience and was hosted at the Trellis Commons, with sewing machines having been provided for attendees to use.

Another Yoga session is scheduled to take place on March 4, and a Kairos Blanket exercise will occur on March 10.

"All of the events were registration required, just to make sure that we had the right amounts of materials and the instructors were prepared," said Henderson. "The soapstone ones filled up very quickly and were very well attended. They were very popular; the feedback suggested people wanted to do it again."

The hope, she added, is to give locals an opportunity to experience First Nations culture, to understand it, and to provide a unique way for people to be immersed in a cultural experience.

At the conclusion of its programming in March, the library will be at the end of its programming grant with Trellis, though there are hopes to engage in a similar partnership in the future to continue hosting First Nations programming.

"We partner with Trellis on a number of different things and if the grant works with another organization, then we are happy to partner with somebody. This one really naturally fit with Trellis," said Henderson. "I think this is a great oppor tunity. The feedback leading up to it was really positive ... people have said they want another option to engage with Indigenous culture."

The Kairos blanket exercise will be hosted at the Strathmore Civic Centre on March 10 beginning at 6 p.m.

**BBB Scam Alert: Bored? Think twice before taking** 



that Facebook quiz

Social media is used as a fun distraction for some people, and taking a Facebook quiz may seem like a harmless way to pass the time. But are you giving away more information than you think?

A fun quiz pops up on your Facebook feed or another social media platform. A few questions are answered to prove how well you know a friend. Or a short personality test is offered to match with a character from a favorite TV show.



These quizzes appear to be meaningless, but the intent behind them is to collect information. For example, questions like: "What was the first car you owned?" "What is yo mother's maiden name?" or "What is the name of the street you grew up on?" These are common security questions for insurance, banking and credit card accounts. Sharing this information can lead to accounts being hacked, and personal and financial information being stolen.

Not all social media quizzes are data collection scams; however, BBB cautions users to be careful about what they share online and to check the privacy settings on the account. Social media data and quiz answers can be used to steal identity or enable a scammer to impersonate you to your friends and family


#### Tips to avoid social media scams:

- Be skeptical: Before answering a guiz, figure out who created it. Is it a brand you trust? Just because something appears to be fun and innocent, doesn't mean there isn't an
- · Adjust privacy settings: Review the social media account's privacy settings and be strict about any information that is shared - and be mindful of who you are sharing it wit
- Remove personal details from your profile: Don't share information like phone number or home address on social media accounts.
- · Don't give answers to common security questions: Be cautious if the questions in a quiz ask for things like your mother's maiden name, street you grew up on, previously ow vehicles, favorite foods, or the name of your high school.
- · Monitor friend requests. Don't accept friend requests from people you don't know. Also be wary of a second friend request from someone you are already connected with, the second profile may be an imposter trying to access your data and your Friends list.

Well, 2022 saw the highest inflation rates in 40 years.

Come April 1 when the new rates kick in, the automatic alcohol escalator tax will rise by 6.3 per cent. You might see some reports saying that will amount to less than one cent per can of beer, but those defending these tax increases without scrutiny, debate in Parliament, or even conversation, are missing the point entirely. According to the Canadian Taxpayers Federation "taxes already account for about half of the price of beer, 65 per cent of the price of wine and more than three quarters of the price of spirits."

This is another example of the Liberal government raising taxes on Canadians and making life unaffordable. Canadians are paying more for less, and this government's spending has caused hardship for too many families. Over 1.5 million Canadians are visiting food banks per month according to a recent statistic - that is unacceptable.

Canadians deserve a government that works for them, not one that taxes them to death. Conservatives are committed to not introducing any new taxes on Canadians, and we will implement a pay-as-you-go policy for government that requires a dollar of savings for every new dollar spent.

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Library hosts programming for Golden Hills reading week

The Strathmore Municipal Library offered a variety of programs for kids and families, while Golden Hills students were off for their reading week.

"We were running programs all week. (Wednesday's) program was a makerspace, which ... we ended up with about 55 kits that we made full of all sorts of different craft items and an assortment of things," said Laura Henderson, library public services coordinator. "We put them out and kids could come in, grab a package and go to a table and there would be glue and scissors and colouring materials and they could just make something."

Particularly for Wednesday's program, the library team was not expecting the attendance levels observed, due to the adverse weather conditions. According to Henderson, the team had created roughly 35 kits for kids to use, and were making more on the fly as more people dropped in.


Other activities hosted at the library included a putt and play on Tuesday – which ran for the first time in four years, yoga for kids on Thursday, a fun film on Friday, and a board game day on Saturday.

"We always try to run programs when the kids are off school ... the putt and play was also very well attended. I printed 50 scorecards and I think there were five left at the end of the day. I would say we easily had 80 people show up for that program," said Henderson. "We had nine little putting greens that we set up through the library, we decorated and families could come and just play a little round of mini golf in the library."

Larger games were also hosted in the program room during the mini putt and play as the library ran out of golf clubs to accommodate everyone who dropped in.

Though the library regularly hosts programming for reading week every year, the team makes an effort to offer new activities for each occasion.

"We do expect high attendance when the schools are closed," she said. "People depend on our programs in a way ... but I have to say we were surprised at how well attended our programs were with the way the weather was."



Did you know, Wheatland County residents are able to purchase crushed gravel and pitrun at a reduced cost? Please purchase gravel sales tickets at the main administration office prior to hauling.

Residents are able to redeem gravel tickets between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. on the set days and locations as outlined below:

- June 14th and 15th, 2023 Goldsmith Pit (Cluny) located at NE-8-22-21W4 (7/8" Crush & Pit Run)
- July 5th and 6th, 2023 Christensen Pit (Carseland) located at NE-03-22-25W4m (3/4" Crush & Pit Run)
- August 9th and 10th, 2023 Fish Lake Pit (Dalum) located at NE-28-26-18W4M (7/8" Crush & Pit Run)

To collect gravel on the dates and at the locations noted above, please park at the gravel sales sign and stay in your vehicle until the loader operator notifies you to proceed.

#### Not sure how much you need?

- Crush: 1 tonne = 0.79 cubic yards or 1 cubic yard = 1.27 tonnes
- Pitrun: 1 tonne = 0.67 cubic yards or 1 cubic yard = 1.49 tonnes12 tonnes fit into a truck and 12 tonnes fit into a pup

## New concert comes to town

The Arts on 817 Concert Series is excited to host Dave Gunning and J.P. Cormier on March 17 for a special evening to celebrate the release of the duos newest album titled Leather and Dust.

Their first album together titled Two was released in 2017. It was a collaboration dreamt about for years, something the duo talked about almost from the first time they

Gunning released an album before Christmas and Cormier has a YouTube channel that he's been heavily invested in for the past two years.

"I could just stay home and do that if I wanted," said Cormier of his YouTube

channel (@JPCormier) that keeps him extremely busy with over 27,000 subscribers. "I enjoy being out on the

road. Not so much by myself but with Dave I'd go to the ends of the world to have him sing with me." The two met in the mid 90's and have had very successful

solo careers. Cormier began playing when he was 13 years

"I'm 41 years in," he says with a laugh.

Cormier has over 17 albums under his belt. He's won many East Coast Music Association (ECMA) Awards and he's been nominated twice for Junos. In 2005, the Bravo Network aired J.P Cormier - The Man and His Music, a one-hour documentary that explores his life.

Gunning was born in Pictou County, N.S. and credits his passion for music to when he attended his first concert in 1981 when he saw John Allen Carmen and Stan Rogers.

He has released 13 albums and has collected numerous Canadian Folk Music Awards, ECMA's and Juno nominations to say the least. Gunning's shows are particularly special because he incorporates storytelling, anecdotes and even throws in some musical impressions of musicians he's worked with. Gunning also has a YouTube channel where you can watch him singing Gunning originals and follow along on his daily life adventures (@DaveGunningSingerSon-

"It's fun getting together to hang out and do these shows," said Gunning.

The tour began on Feb. 19 and will conclude on March 31 with very few rest days in between shows.

"(We) feel pretty fortunate to be doing this," said Gunning. "We miss home, but it feels good to be on a big tour like this after not being for so long. Something we aren't taking for grated for sure."

The concert stop in Strathmore falls on St. Patrick's Day.

"We're going to have written almost all of the material," he said. "We do a few covers of people who are obscure and nobody else does. A couple of Stompin' Tom songs that nobody knows. A bit of the old traditional stuff. There's a bit of guitar pickin' a bit of stories and songs."

The all-ages show is on Friday, March 17 at 7:30 p.m. at the Strathmore United Church. Tickets are \$35 for adults and just

# Capsule Comments

One of the oldest pharmacy preparations in the world was Singleton's Eye Ointment. It was first made for Queen Elizabeth I in 1596. It was packaged in small, quaint, round pots with an information sheet wrapped around it saying it was "an absolute specific for all Eye Troubles and Diseases." It contained a mercury compound and continued to be sold until 1974 when it fell out of favour for more modern products.

The B-vitamins like thiamine (B1), riboflavin (B2), niacin (B3), pyridoxine (B6), folic acid (B9) and B12 are water-soluble vitamins like vitamin C. So when taking megadoses of B vitamins, your body will excrete the excess and keep only what it needs. The body doesn't store these vitamins but for smokers, illness and in conditions of stress, the body may need a bit more.

Pregnant ladies need at least 0.4mg of folic acid daily to prevent birth abnormalities. This amount can be found in a good prenatal vitamin tablet.

Hydrogen peroxide (3%) is an older disinfectant still used today. It can be diluted 1:1 to treat mouth sores. (spit out after rinsing). It can loosen ear wax when used full-strength (3%). It can be used for cleaning dentures and mouth guards. Don't ingest it. Using stronger peroxide like 35% should NOT be used internally for any purpose.

The human body is amazing. Each square inch of skin contains about 200 blood and lymph vessels, 28 motor nerves, 100 oil glands, 650 sweat glands, 13 sense receptors for cold and 78 for heat and 1300 for touch and 65 hairs. Quite a design!



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## Kings eliminated from post season

The Wheatland Kings saw their playoff run come to an abrupt end with their fourth straight loss to the Okotoks Bisons on Feb. 26

Game 4 of the best-of-seven series ended with a score of 7-3 in favour of the Bisons, though Kings head coach Doug Raycroft said he was happy with how hard his team battled until the end.

"We are a little disappointed, but we played better today. It is always tough to lose, but Okotoks is a good team and anytime there was a mistake it was in the back of the net," said Raycroft. "Today we really battled. I thought we outbattled and outplayed them and this was the first game of the series we out shot them."

Raycroft added he was very dissatisfied with the calls made by the attending referees throughout the game.

"I think we, a lot of times seemed to be getting on the wrong side of a lot of the calls. I don't know if that is just from the history of this team or what, but we seem to always be taking a lot of penalties that are pretty soft," he said. "They don't seem to be called on the other side and against a team like Okotoks, you can't do that. They just have too many weapons and they know how to make you pay."

Summarizing the series overall, Raycroft said he believed the Kings had their best shot during Game 1 of the series, where the score was tight to even all game, and only swung into the Bisons favour within the final minute.

Raycroft described Games 2-3 as be-

ing extremely tough and disappointing for the Kings, losing 5-2, and 5-1 respectively.

Over the course of the season, The Kings have been slowly changing their playstyle since Raycroft took over as head coach.

"I think we started to define ourselves as, you know, instead of being an undisciplined team, we were starting to become more disciplined," he said. "We moved the puck really well, we did have trouble scoring, but we were a much better team towards the end of the year than we were early on. I think a lot of the teams knew that it's hard to play against us a lot of times."

Raycroft also attributed many of the team's struggles to having several players injured at any one time and being unable to muster their full roster to the ice.

Chase Clayton, Jacob Masciangelo, Landon Brassard and Kyle Feick have now retired from the team, as they have aged out of the junior league.

Going into next season, Raycroft said he is looking forward to spending the entire season with the team and continuing to refine the habits the team used since he became coach.

## Helping families through tough times

Hello Chestermere-Strathmore readers. I wanted to share a personal story with you this week. As with all families, we go through our ups and downs, and I find myself in that intersection where many of us are helping our parents. As we become caregivers, we require exceptional amounts of the grace, love, and compassion. My mom is a rockstar and has been a caregiver for over 22 years. My mom has done so much to keep her family healthy, from my grandma to my sister, who passed away on Dec. 22. This last week my parents endured a bad bout of COVID, my father fell badly, and he is also potentially losing a toe due to his diabetes. Even with all of that, the smiles and resilience of these two are remarkable, and the doctors, nurses, specialists, and all involved are quite frankly amazing. We are so lucky to have our healthcare system; the much-needed improvements will improve our system if we are willing to do that work together. I wanted to highlight The Limb Preservation Centre at the Peter Lougheed hospital, which opened to patients in October 2016 and now provides care to approximately 8,000 patients annually. This clinic is funded through Alberta Health Care and incredibly generous donations. A portion of funds raised purchased state-of-the-art technology that helps with the early detection and assessment of vascular issues, a major risk factor in limb loss. My father has benefited from this technology and has had minor amputations versus losing his foot be-

On their website, "the Centre continues to be active in multiple research initiatives to improve care further. After a career in Podiatric Surgery in Alberta, Dr. Mark Zivot left the practice several years ago. However, he has maintained close con-

cause of these talented doctors.

tact with his Podiatric colleagues, watching the program grow to meet patient needs."

"Philanthropy has played an important part in my life, and I wanted to provide a substantial donation with direct purpose and passion. Not just a gift of dollars, but a gift of my knowledge, experience, and time," Dr. Zivot explains. "The naming of the Zivot Limb Preservation Center is a great honour, and I am most gracious for the opportunity to give back to health care."

This Centre is now regarded as a centre of excellence showing that lower extremity amputation rate in the Calgary Zone has been reduced by 45 per cent. There has been a 30 per cent reduction in hospitalizations and a reduced length of stay for diabetes related foot complication. The savings to Alberta Health are currently \$19M per

As a daughter who has watched my dad go through this, I want to thank Dr Zivot, Dr. Manji, Dr. Harton and the nurses, specialists and staff of the Zivot Limb Preservation Centre, my dad's family doctor, and the emergency doctor - Dr. Bhardwaj, and Nurse Lauren who stitched him up after he fell. I wanted to share this with all of you because advocacy from family and community are key in our healthcare outcomes, mental health outcomes, and honestly investigates our institutions as to where we are successful as much as where we are failing. I write this not as a politician, but as a family member, a member of the community, and hopefully as a friend to many of you, so that we can talk about these things and find solutions. The doctors that do limb preservation are some of the best people I have met, and their value cannot be underestimated. Please take good care of yourself.

## Keeping vehicles safe

With the cold winter temperatures, the Alberta RCMP and our partners in law enforcement are reminding everyone to ensure their vehicle is never unattended or unlocked with keys nearby or in the ignition.

Approximately 50 per cent of stolen vehicles in Alberta are stolen while idling and these thefts are far more prevalent in the cold winter months. Vehicles can be stolen in seconds by thieves lying

Often times, thieves will look for people who start their vehicles and then leave them unattended as they return in their houses or into a

To help keep your property safe, Alberta police services took action through Operation Cold Start earlier this month. This is the second year this initiative has been implemented with partnering police agencies across Alberta.

The goal of Operation Cold Start is to educate Albertans and work with the public to reduce auto theft, ultimately by making it tougher on wouldbe thieves. The initiative will see police officers across the province patrolling for unattended idling vehicles to determine if they are locked and/ or have the keys in the ignition. Officers will work to educate owners on the various ways they may keep their property safe. But, we can't do it alone and it is critical that the public help in preventing

these crimes of opportunity.

"Alberta has the highest per capita auto theft rate in the country, and approximately 25 per cent of those vehicles are stolen while idling with the keys left in the vehicle," said RCMP Superintendent Mike McCauley of the Community Safety and Wellbeing Branch. "This drives up insurance rates for Albertans and these files take a great deal of time to investigate. This project will prevent some of these crimes during the project, and ideally, thanks to the educational component of the project, will change Albertan's habits. It is a small investment tackling one of the root causes of this

We would like to offer Albertans some tips to help keep their vehicles safe:

- If possible, look into command start options as a means to warm your vehicle.
- · Steering wheel locking devices are effective options that can help mitigate theft.
- When starting your car, or allowing the engine to warm up prior to driving, ensure that you are in the vehicle.
- Never leave valuable items like purses, wallets, keys or change in an unoccupied vehicle.
- Always place keys to vehicles in a safe place, out of plain sight and in a secure location.
- Lock vehicle doors all the time, even if you are parked in your driveway or garage at home.
- · Never leave your vehicle unattended if it is running or the keys are in it.

The warmth and love he brought into every aspect of his life will be greatly missed.



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

#### Bylaw 23-01

The Town of Strathmore has received an application for a redesignation of Lot 9, Block 1, Plan 781 0935 (9 Bayside Place, the old seed cleaning plant) from M2 – General Industrial District to R3M Direct Control District Overlay.

The Town of Strathmore is proposing to amend Land Use Bylaw No. 14-11, specifically regarding sea cans. Some of the proposed changes include defining what a 'temporary' sea can is, deleting the section on sea can ventilation, amending the storage restrictions, and requiring sea cans be registered with the fire department.
