## Ayoungman memorial unveiled

On the third anniversary of Kristian Ayoungman's death, on March 17 during his memorial, the Town of Strathmore and Siksika Nation unveiled the monument which now stands to remember him.

"Today we are honouring Kristian's life and showing how our two communities are moving forward in a good way," said Astokomii Smith, indigenous liaison for the Town of Strathmore. "We are also premiering the Ayoungman documentary, which tells the story of what happened on March 17, 2019 and how we as a community are moving

Smith added the unveiling of the memorial was a long time coming, with delays experienced due to COVID-19, as well as patiently waiting for the completion of the Ayoungman documentary, which also premiered during the memorial.

Town of Strathmore operations manager Donna McCallum said although March 17 honoured Kristian's memory, the Town's efforts are part of a larger program against racism.

Last year, a healing garden containing traditional herbs and medicines was planted and blessed, adjacent to the Strathmore Municipal Building.

"It's been at least a year in the making now. Basically, I started working with Astokomii, we had a similar idea about the Healing Garden," she said. "As part of the anti-racism campaign, we had talked about doing a memorial for Kristian Ayoungman. She introduced me to Melody (Ayoungman) and then Melody and I started talking from there about what she wanted to see in the memorial."

Melody Aoungman, Kristian's mother, said she felt overwhelmed by the amount of support which has come forward from the Town of Strathmore and from Siksika Nation.

Speaking about her late son, Ayoungman described him as being true, genuine and having grown into a fine gentleman.

"My boy was very well known all throughout North America. As a young kid, he was a champion traditional dancer. Everyone knew him all over in Canada and the United States all the way to Arizona," said Ayoungman. "His friends knew him for his rapping, Strathmore knew him for his hockey, he went to high school here, he played for the Okotoks Bisons and he got his certification as a heavy equipment operator."



# Town celebrates 114 years with first in-person Strathmore Day event

The Town of Strathmore celebrated 114 years since its incorporation as a village on March 20, hosting an outdoor event to mark the occasion.

Dubbed, Strathmore Day, the occasion was proclaimed in 2021 by Strathmore town council. Due to COVID-19 restrictions at the time, last year's event was hosted largely online.

According to marketing and communications analyst, Danielle Jensen, the hope for this year, as well as years to come, is to grow Strathmore Day as a community event for people to come together and celebrate their town.

"Celebrating the anniversary of Strathmore's incorporation honours past generations who have built our community," said Jensen. "It's also a great way for us to celebrate what Strathmore is today and the things that make our town so great."

The Town partnered with several community organizations to hold special events throughout the day, including the Strathmore Lions Club who hosted a pancake breakfast in the morning.

Other activities included a cornhole tournament, dog show, square and line dancing, a seed exchange and two petting farms.

"We picture this event growing each year as more community groups come forward to participate," added Jensen. "Celebrating Strathmore has brought excitement to the community and

we've already seen several organizations come forward to get involved this year."

She added there were little to no challenges in getting the event set up this year, as there was a great deal of support from the community.

Taking place in Kinsmen Park, the Strathmore Day festivities occurred simultaneously with a fundraiser for the Strathmore Overnight Shelter.

The hope going forward is for Strathmore Day to continue to grow and attract more residents to participate every year.

While the pancake breakfast took place at 9 a.m. in the Strathmore Centre Parking Lot, the rest of the festivities did not kick off until 1 p.m. and ran until 4 p.m.

If you have not received your tax notice by mid-May, please contact the Wheatland County Office. Taxes are due June 30 and late penalties will be applied on July 1.

Note: Under the Municipal Government Act, Section 337, a tax notice is deemed to have been received seven days after it is sent. Non-receipt of your property tax bill does not exempt you from late payment penalties.

## Town talks MoU with Happy Cat

Happy Cat Sanctuary is discussing terms with the Town of Strathmore regarding a potential Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for \$50,000 towards operational expenses.

A delegation from the non-profit came before Strathmore Town Council during the Mar. 16 regular council meeting to discuss their budget and how the funding would be utilized.

"It is vital for Happy Cat Sanctuary that we continue to receive funding from the Town of Strathmore for us to continue operating and continue doing the great job that we are doing," said Barb Stefanich, cofounder of Happy Cat Sanctuary. "It would be devastating for us, all of our volunteers, the residents of Strathmore and of course, the Town of Strathmore if we had to close."

In 2021, the sanctuary rescued 236 cats, with 117 of them coming into the sanctuary directly from within Strathmore. The remainder were rescued from around Wheatland County and the Calgary area.

Through the Trap, Neuter, Spay and Release (TNR) program, 39 cats were captured through the TNR program and the society reported having adopted out 116 cats over the course of the year.

Should Happy Cat Sanctuary be approved for the \$50,000 in funding from the Town, their operating budget for 2022 would be \$126,000.

As a reference, the sanctuary reported approximately \$70,000 a year in veterinary expenses and roughly \$17,500 annually to maintain their storefront location.

Other expenses included \$26,000 in administration expenses and \$15,000 in other assorted operational costs.

Inversely, the sanctuary averages around \$40,000 a year in received donations and \$16,000 annually in adoption fees.

Stefanich said the majority of the food and litter used by the sanctuary is donated and deals have been established with local vets to reduce expenses, which greatly impacts operational costs.

"When we first started Happy Cat Sanctuary in 2003, there were cats and kittens roaming the streets in large numbers. The work that we have done in the last 17 years has made the town almost free of feral and stray cats," said Stefanich. "When we got the original funding from the town at \$33,000 a year, we were ecstatic. Strathmore is one of the few towns that has actually taken the initiative to help a cat rescue take care of a cat problem within their town."

Since their inception, over 2,000 cats and kittens have been rescued by the sanctuary. In 2018 and 2019, 100 cats were taken in from the town and found them new homes. In 2021, 236 cats in total were rescued, with 50 per cent coming directly from the town.


The fear is that if the sanctuary was no longer able to sustainably operate, local vet clinics and bylaw services would be overrun and bogged down with calls about stray cats.

Councilor Brent Wiley said although he went into the meeting skeptical of the sanctuary's request, his mind was swayed towards supporting the idea.

"I went into this wanting to be a grumpy old man, wanting to cut money, and your data has completely shown me - I don't think there is possibly a cheaper alternative to this," said Wiley. "There are probably people in the community who think, why don't we euthanize them all - that's not cheaper. It actually would not be cheaper, even if you were heartless and said to just kill them all."

Administration will provide a report for council on April 6 for further discussion and will work with Happy Cat Sanctuary as to whether or not the requested MoU would be a multi-year agreement.

The Strathmore Performing Arts Festival (SPAF) is returning to in-person performances beginning this weekend and running into the beginning of April, after a turbulent first few years of operation.

Carolyn Steeves, president of SPAF, said students, instructors and board members alike are excited to be returning to in-person performances after having to cancel one festival and host last year's festival online.

"SPAF is a festival for children who play piano, voice, string instruments, woodwind instruments, bands, choirs and where they enter classes and are given a chance to perform," said Steeves.

Launched in 2019, the festival offers local music students in a variety of genres and mediums an opportunity to perform in front of their community and be evaluated by a professional adjudicator.

Students may be awarded based on their performances, with a surplus of scholarship opportunities available.

"We're very excited, this year we have 276 entries form students ages five to 18 and we're going to be awarding approximately 73 scholarships valued at almost \$6,000. We're very excited to support all the young musicians of Strathmore and area," explained Steeves. "It's a very big festival, we have an amazing artistic community in Strathmore. These children have been waiting since 2019 for a live festival so they're very excited."

The idea is for this year's festival to go off very similarly to the pilot festival held in 2019. According to Steeves, a similar number of students and age groups are performing.

Due to the timing of the pilot and last year's festival being online, for many students it will be their first time performing in front of live audiences.

Steeves added it will be a boon for the festival that local COVID-19 restrictions have, for the most part lifted, as it eliminates many of the potential challenges associated with set-

We were planning for two scenarios – a live festival if everything worked out well, which it has now, or possibly another virtual festival like we ran last year," said Steeves. "Either way, we were going to do the festival again, it was just which way it happened. We're very thrilled the pandemic has eased off and we're able to offer the children a live festival experience again this year."

Steves added that for music students, a festival like this is a sort of equivalent to a hockey or ringette tournament for athletes, in the sense that it exposes young musicians to their peers, builds community and gives them an opportunity to



### **RCMP** investigate series of fraud

STRATHMORE RCMP

Strathmore RCMP has received calls for service on March 15, in which an unknown person posing as an RCMP officer calls elderly people stating they need bail money to release a grandchild from RCMP custody, requesting \$10,000 in cash.

The suspect uses the name of the grandchild who they are telling the victim is in custody and is being held on charges. The suspect then instructs the unsuspecting victim to go to a bank and withdraw the large sum of money from their bank and not to let the bank teller know the reason that the money is being withdrawn.

The suspect then makes arrangements to pick up the money in person near the victim's residence. The suspect is described as being approximately 6 feet tall with a stocky build and dressed mostly in black.

Strathmore RCMP would like to remind the public that the RCMP will not attend any residence to collect bail money. Bail money can only be paid at a courthouse or at your local police station. If a member of the public is not sure whether someone is a member of the RCMP, they can contact their local detachment to ensure the legitimacy of an RCMP member's identity.

Strathmore RCMP continue to investigate these occurrences.

Here are a few safety tips to assist:

- If you receive a call from someone claiming they are with the RCMP, get as much information from them as possible and tell them you will call them back. Find the government agencies' phone number through a trusted source (phone book, or official website) and call the department back. Don't trust the phone number or email from the caller until you have verified that they are who they say they are.
- Do not share any personal information with the caller, such as confirming name, social insurance number, address, etc.
- The best protection from scammers is to learn how to resist being pushed into a decision regardless of how persuasive or aggressive the scammer may be. Arm yourself and the vulnerable people in your life by learning how to recognize and protect yourself from fraud at Canada's Anti-Fraud Centre. www.antifraudcentre.ca and http:// www.cra-arc.gc.ca/scrty/frdprvntn/ menu-eng.html.

# March for Shelter hosted in Kinsmen Park

The Strathmore Overnight Shelter (SOS) ran one of its largest fundraisers of the year in tandem with the Town of Strathmore's Strathmore Day.

The March for Shelter has been hosted for four years now and the SOS Executive Director Elizabeth Karp said she was hoping the event would be bigger than ever.

"We walk two-to-five kilometers and people sponsor us to walk and all the money goes towards our bills at the shelter," said Karp. "It's a great fundraiser and its great community support usually, and we can't do it without community. We'd like to hit \$10,000 at some point."

Karp added the fundraiser typically brings in between \$5,000 and \$7,000 for the SOS, which helps to pay for expenses such as food, utilities, wages and even some of the costs associated with getting clients settled into homes.

The hope, Karp said, was that in partnering with the Town of Strathmore, it would encourage more people to come out and participate.

"We're just coming off of the restrictions with COVID-19, so we were hoping that would be (cause for) a greater turnout for us this year. With the weather not being great, we'll see what happens," said Karp.

The ask was that participants complete two laps around Kinsmen Lake as part of the walk. Additionally, the

SOS was selling goods made by some of their clients at a table in Kinsmen Park. All proceeds would go directly to the shelter.

Karp explained the inspiration for the March for Shelter was actually inspired by a similar event which occurs on a much larger scale.

"There is a national one – the Cold Walk, that is done Nationally, but they take a percentage and we're not big enough to take part in that," said Karp. "This way, everything goes directly to the (SOS and) we don't have to worry about administration costs or anything like that, so that's what gave us the idea."

Though the SOS does always accept and is grateful for any donations sent their way, Karp added at the moment, monetary donations are the most helpful.

Now that COVID-19 restrictions are largely lifted, the shelter is looking at more ways to host fundraisers and continue to help its clients.

"We are looking at several different events to see how we can raise some more funds and keep the shelter going. We have some government grants that are available for us that we have but it isn't enough in the long run," said Karp. "The clients at the shelter, the amount of people has increased. We're feeding 16-plus people every night and that takes a fair bit of coin."

According to McCallum, the original plan with Ayoungman was to have a singular large stone for Kristian's memorial.

Barring that and after much deliberation, it was decided to have three stones settled upright behind the memorial to represent pillars of change in the community.

McCallum added the hope is that the

monument will spread the message that Strathmore cares and racism will not be tolerated within the community.

"My message from this is to the world to learn about each other and for people to learn about First Nations so that this doesn't ever happen again," said Ayoungman. "My biggest thing is for everyone to learn from Kristian Ayoungman, my baby boy. To lead by example. To change the world."

"It makes me reflect and appreciate what we have here in Canada and how lucky we are to have what we have. It's not perfect, but it

does hit close to home and I just wish we could wave a magic wand and have everything be okay."

Displaying solidarity and celebrating Ukraine, Bodkin decided to organize a lunch for Strathmore's branch and introduce her coworkers to Ukrainian food.

Sunflowers have also been hung around the branch and are likely to remain over the course of the year.

"I haven't talked to (Bodkin) as of late, but I've heard the stories about how passionate she is about the cause. My wife is also of Ukrainian descent and it seems to be the supper hour conversation in our house every day," added Holbrook. "The (second) largest (population of) Ukrainians in the world outside of Ukraine is right here in Canada and it's incredible to see hundreds of thousands of people with Ukrainian descent here in Alberta who either can relate to it through their family members or who have family living there."

Though Connect First Credit Union is not actively running any programs or specific fundraisers beyond their donation, they encourage their clients and partners to think about donating to the Red Cross in support of relief efforts for

"Our donation has been made (and) we know that (the Red Cross) is still actively fundraising. As you can see on TV every night, it's a pretty terrible scenario that the Ukrainian people are dealing with," said Holbrook. If you are thinking of trying cannabis, it's best to start slowly. This applies to all forms of marijuana but especially edibles and oils. These forms of cannabis take longer for the effects to be felt, perhaps up to 1&1/2 hours. For the oils, start with 0.5ml at bedtime and increase gradually over three or four days. Once the required effective dose is achieved, doses can given in divided doses throughout the day.

Nearly half of all Canadians will develop cancer during their lifetime and about one-quarter are expected to die from the disease. There are ways to prevent cancer. Be a non-smoker, maintain a healthy body weight, eat a well-balanced diet, keep active and exercise often and use alcohol moderately (or not at all). Three other ways include getting vaccinated against HPV and Hepatitis B, use sunscreens and avoid tanning beds.

Regarding vitamin D, The Canadian Cancer Society recommends that adults living in Canada should consider taking 1000 IU of vitamin D supplement per day, especially during the winter months. Although the vitamin does not seem to reduce heart attack risk, there is some positive evidence of its usefulness in cancer.

Vaping with e-cigarettes is sometimes used as a method of quitting tobacco smoking. As knowledge and experience with vaping increases, it has been found that men who used e-cigarettes are twice as likely to have erectile dysfunction than those men who never vaped. So vaping is not a risk-free alternative to smoking tobacco.
