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Agreement expands

Strathmore Town Council authorized the mayor to sign the updated Wheatland Regional Emergency Management Partnership (WREMP) Agreement, which annotates the City of Chestermere into the partnership.

The motion was brought forward before council during the May 3 regular meeting, following a presentation made by Strathmore Fire Chief, Dave Sturgeon.

During his presentation, Sturgeon requested that council approve the authorization to sign the document, as it was presented.

"Since the adoption of the partnership, all the parties have recognized the benefits of additional resources. By including the City of Chestermere, it is an excellent opportunity for our partners to expand their network and resources to deal with larger-scale emergencies or disasters," he said. "The larger the event, and the longer the event runs, it can cause significant strain on our local resources. By including the City of Chestermere as a partner, it would increase our capacity and resources available to all parties."

The item was initially brought before the Town of Strathmore Committee of the Whole, Jan. 11, for information. During that meeting, the pros and cons of the agreement were discussed, and it was asked that Strathmore Town Council direct the representative of the committee to vote as per council's direction.

The Committee met again, Jan. 26, with the City of Chestermere in attendance to provide a presentation regarding why they wanted to join the partnership.

Following a question period, the committee voted unanimously to accept the City of Chestermere into the partnership.

Sturgeon explained to council the only changes to the WREMP agreement include adding Chestermere to the agreement and the funding model goes from 50 per cent each from Strathmore and Wheatland County to 33.3 per cent Strathmore, Wheatland County and City of Chestermere, respectively. The overall financial obligation from the town to the agreement does not change, however, with the addition of Chestermere, there is an increase in funding by bringing in the additional partner to match Strathmore's contributions. 
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Award winner

"Additional funds could be saved by not utilizing external contractors and instead utilizing resources of another member," said Sturgeon.

He added to answer a common question which has arisen during the process, Chestermere chose WREMP over their immediate neighbours because the city felt the Wheatland partnership better aligned with their vision and values, and saw a better light for the future of their emergency management program.

Following a motion by Coun. Richard Wegener to accept the revised document as presented, council voted unanimously in favour.

When I was two years old, I ran into the path of a riding lawn mower and lost my right leg below the knee. It all happened so fast: one moment I was playing outside, and the next I was too close to the mower.

Having grown up as part of The War Amps Child Amputee (CHAMP) Program, I am now committed to spreading the Association's PLAYSAFE message. With lawn cutting season upon us, I want everyone to know that kids should not ride, operate or play near lawn mowers. Though I've learned to accept and appreciate who I am today, I want to use my experience to help prevent others from going through what I did. Please make sure children are always at a safe distance from lawn mowers. And don't underestimate the importance of safety when operating any machinery. I urge you to take the necessary precautions to protect yourself and those around you. 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Strathmore fire resources deployed to assist with wildfires

The Strathmore Fire Department has been called to assist with combatting and controlling the wildfires burning west of Edmonton.

Local resources, as well as those from the Chestermere Fire Department were requested through the Alberta Emergency Management Association (AEMA) to be dispatched.

"We are probably almost a week in. We sent up one of our engines and then we helped staff another engine out of Chestermere," said David Sturgeon, Strathmore Fire chief. "You always want to be ready for everything at home, so you have to really think about what you can spare and if you can still operate. You can't worry about all the what ifs because you will never do anything if you are worried about that."

The Strathmore department has dispatched two firefighters, incident management personnel, and several pallets of Emergency Social Service supplies in addition to an engine in order to aid

provincial efforts and evacuees.

Sturgeon added the Strathmore Fire Department has been in regular communication with the AEMA, informing them of what resources are able to be made available to divert north.

The Town of Strathmore released a statement indicating more resources are ready to be dispatched if required, including more personnel and a water tender. Town resources would be sent up in conjunction with the Chestermere Fire Department.

"It is really about being strategic and working with your partners. We are in daily communication with our mutual aid partners, just to make sure everybody has enough staffing and if a bigger call comes in, that we can all support each other," said Sturgeon. "It sounds like the one area our crews are helping in still has pretty large fire activity. The weather helped lay it down a bit, but everyone is worried about the days to come when the temperature spikes back up and dries everything out."


Fire bans, restrictions or advisories have been

put into place across the majority of the province. Strathmore and Wheatland County are currently under an advisory.

Sturgeon advised residents to be cognizant of their surroundings and practice safe activity if an individual or group chooses to have fires.

"There is no open burning allowed, no fireworks and no incendiary devices or things like that," he said. "You are still allowed to have backyard fire pits, but when you are having those fire pits, you must follow regulations and ensure that it is supervised and you have something available to extinguish the fire. It does not take long for winds to pick up and for something to happen that you were not expecting."

sales in our community," he said. "This is one of the largest types of seizures and investigations we have had in the recent past, but it is not uncommon to see the types of substances and volumes as what were seized in this investigation when conducting similar types of investigations."

Both suspects were transported to the Strathmore RCMP detachment. The female, a 22-year-old resident of Strathmore, was released to appear in Provincial Court on a future date, which was not disclosed. She will face three counts of Trafficking

The male suspect, identified by police as David Vanderlaan, a 49-year-old resident of Strathmore, was held for a bail hearing and charged with offenses which included: possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking (x3); trafficking in a controlled substance; possession of a controlled substance; possession of a loaded prohibited firearm; knowing possession of a prohibited firearm without a license (x2); possession of a prohibited firearm contrary to prohibition order (x2); careless handling of a prohibited firearm (x2); failure to comply with a condition of a probation order (x3); and failure to comply with a condition of a release order (x5).

The arrests were in connection to an ongoing drug trafficking investigation in the parking lot of a local retail store. Additionally, a search warrant was executed on the individuals' home with assistance from the Southern Alberta RCMP Emergency Response Team in order to safely clear the residence.

A search of the occupants' vehicle and home resulted in the discovery and seizure of the following items: approximately \$8,000 in cash; approximately 17 grams of suspected cocaine with an estimated street value of \$1,700; approximately 70 grams of suspected fentanyl with an estimated street value of \$13,930; approximately 41 grams of suspected methamphetamine with an estimated street value of \$2,490; and two semi-automatic .22 caliber handguns.

"The results of this investigation are a culmination of the dedicated efforts of our Detachment members to keep our community safe from the harms of the illicit drug trade," said Strathmore RCMP Staff Sgt. Mark Wielgosz. "In recent history, it was a larger type of investigation - certainly with the resources we brought in. There was a present emergency response team, commonly known as a SWAT team ... and the reason why they were included in the investigation was based on the information that the targets had possession of firearms."

Wielgosz was unable to comment regarding the specifics of the investigation as the matter is now before the courts, though did disclose that it had been ongoing for several months in order to build the necessary grounds to enter the property with a search warrant, make the arrests, and seize the

He added this type of investigation is uncommon, though a number of similar activities are always active at any given time.

"Ultimately, our goal is to maintain public safety, and in this case, as with any case where there are illicit drugs at play, we want to make sure that we are trying to reduce, if not eliminate illicit drug

was not disclosed.

At the time of his arrest, Vanderlaan was on release for another matter in Calgary on six drug charges and two firearms offences.

According to police, he was also bound by a probation order, resulting from convictions on drug, weapons, and conditions offences.

New album is charming

The husband-and-wife musical duo of Denis Dufresne and Megan Konschuh, known as The Charms, released their first album on April 18 called You Are My Flower, Acoustics Vol. 1.

"The whole thing with that, it was all an accident," said Dufresne. "We never really had any intention of recording an album or a single or anything like that. During the pandemic we started singing."

The pair have a recording studio in their home, which allows them to record from the comfort of their own house and made it feel effortless to begin writing and recording music.

"It's so easy to put music online these days," he said. So, they thought, 'why not?'

The name of the album, Volume 1, indicates listeners can expect more from the duo

"(Volume 1) which translates to more to come," said Dufresne. "The process for this was so easy; we just said it makes no sense to just leave this on our computer and just share with friends and family."

Dufresne and Konschuh are excited to be able to share their music with so many people. The pair is already looking forward to a busy spring and

summer.

"In the fall we are planning to record an official album with Murry Paul in Winnipeg," said Dufresne. "Definitely more music coming."

Konschuh grew up in and around Strathmore; she began playing the violin at the age of four. Her parents would drive her to Mount Royal College (present Mount Royal University) for her lessons where she was able to hone her skills.

Dufresne calls Medicine Hat his hometown. He got into music to combat his shyness at the age of four when he began playing the violin and also took voice and speech lessons.

"I kept doing that until it became a career," he said.

The pair met through their love of music. Konschuh was looking for someone to play wedding gigs with since her aunt, whom she would perform with at the time, wanted to retire from the music scene.

"I reached out on Facebook and asked if you (Denis) would ever be willing to play things like that (weddings). And the rest is history." Konschuh said.

The inspiration for the album and the hit song You Are My Flower came from their life experiences during the pandemic.

Dufresne said they started doing more cover tunes, more popular Canadian music.

We started getting asked for a lot of work and we thought maybe we should do something with this rootsy Canadiania kinda sound," said Dufresne.

Konschuh's mother, Sheila, was an inspiration for the song You Are My Flower.

"She (Sheila) loves blue grass and technically we are blue grass. And we just built on that," Konschuh said. "We love the violin and mandolin together. It was the perfect song to go with the garden (and flower business Blue Eggs and Blooms)."

The music video for You Are My Flower was shot on location in the Blue Eggs and Blooms garden near Cluny.

"The sunsets out there are just so beautiful," said Konschuh. "The lighting around that time is just perfect. Very orange and pink."

Dufresne is the current CCMA Fiddle Player of the Year.

"With music you have to be a jack of all trades," Dufresne said of his musical journey. "I'll do anything from vocal solo guitar things in bars and restaurants to playing music for Gord Bamford and recording with high profile artists."

Strathmore athletes to play for post-secondary teams

Several Strathmore athletes have been recruited from their respective teams to play for post-secondary institutions next year, including Brady Johansen, Effram Hook, and Grace Culshaw.

Johansen will be headed off to the University of Saskatchewan to play football with the Huskies; Hook will be off to Thompson Rivers University to swim with their Wolfpack; and Culshaw, staying a bit closer to home, will play basketball for the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT) Ooks.

Each athlete shared a bit of their stories regarding recruitment, their excitement to play, and what got them involved in their respective sports.

GETTING SCOUTED

"The coaches actually direct-messaged me on Instagram and got me hooked up with the head coach. We just started having little calls ... and I definitely showed interest in going there," said Johansen. "It is extremely exciting for me and my family. It has been my dream to play at that level ever since I started playing when I was about 11 or 12 years old."

"I went to go train with them for a morning practice and it was probably one of the most nerve-wracking experiences I have ever had. It was terrifying at first, and the coach said he could see it and tried his best to make me as comfortable as possible," said Hook. "I just did not perform well that morning, but apparently, he saw a lot in me and then I was given a swim cap and he said, 'see you next season.'" "I am so excited. Playing post-secondary, I have always wanted this since I was a kid and now it is finally here. I am a little nervous though for a whole new team and playing at a whole new level," said Culshaw. "Throughout the season, I had a couple of other offers ... and then NAIT was recruiting me and they offered a spot and a scholarship. I decided to go with NAIT because they had what I wanted most and I wanted to move away from home."

"One of my best friends started playing football in Chestermere and he thought that I would be a good candidate to play out there. I went out and played, and that's where it all started for me," said Johansen. "U of S has got a really good team out there. They have been to the national championship the last two years, so it is a really good program and I am excited to get out there."

"I think it was my brothers, because I think they joined basketball with this little club, and then I was watching them and then I wanted to join too," explained Culshaw. "What keeps me excited is that I just do not know what is coming next. Every year there is something new and I just have the passion for basketball. That will never go away."

"I started when I was 14 ... we have a family friend of ours who was a coach on the Strathmore Silver Sharks and she suggested that I should try swimming. Prior to that, I was training to be a lifeguard and found I quite enjoyed being in the water and meeting new people," said Hook. "Immediately, the competitive atmosphere made it easy to want to be there ... It clears my head. As soon as I am in the water, nothing else matters and I just look forward to that pretty much every day."

ADVICE TO THEIR PEERS

"Chase your dreams and stay committed to it. Coming from smalltown Strathmore, you might not expect to be able to make it to that next level, but I think that if you work towards it and make your way up the ranks, you are going to be able to do whatever you want," said Johansen. "Just be confident. If you want to get offers, you just have to play strong and hard and show your love for the sport and never give up. Always show up to the morning practices and the hard days," said Culshaw. "It is a huge commitment ... it is hard to do, but know what you want to do and have goals, especially in a sport like swimming. You have to have goals and believe in yourself and have a high level of confidence," said Hook.



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FCSS hosts mental health awareness BBQ

Strathmore Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) hosted a free barbeque for the community in Kinsmen Park on May 13 with a goal of raising awareness for mental health.

A similar event was last hosted in 2019, prior to the onset of COVID-19 restrictions. Kiana Smith, committee member with the Strathmore Wheatland Addictions Team, explained the barbeque is aimed at celebrating and raising awareness for Mental Health Week.

"The Strathmore Wheatland Addictions Team has not been able to do any events yet due to needing more members on the committee, and just having COVID-19 restrictions (formerly) in place," she said. "We have not been able to get into our community yet, but this is our start."

The free barbeque also featured a bouncy castle for the kids, free entertainment, and tables set up by organizations in Strathmore that do work for mental health.

Smith explained the idea to bring back the mental health barbeque was brought up at a recent committee meeting, as something to do to recognize May as mental health month.

"Something like this just hosts an environment to make friends and connections with other people and other organizations that others might not know exist in Strathmore," she said. "It has been really great, especially for youth and older adult populations because there is not much to do on a Saturday in Strathmore. It is really nice for them to get out, which just improves mental health."

Local support services for mental health in attendance at the barbeque included the Wheatland Youth Network, Kiwanis, Wheatland Crisis Society, Trellis, and Alberta Health Services.

Shoppers Drug Mart also set up a table to distribute Naloxone kits and provide education regarding how to use them to any who were interested.

"Strathmore FCSS is a resource hub for all the community partners in Strathmore," said Smith. "If you are needing help with anything, we can point you in the right direction."

Though there is interest in continuing to host the barbeque on an annual basis, Smith explained the ability to do so will depend largely on available grant funding.

"The Strathmore Wheatland Addictions Team funded this ... so it just depends on what kind of grants we get in the future, but it is definitely something that we would love to continue doing."

Information regarding how to access mental health and addictions support is available through the Strathmore FCSS. Resources from any of the attending organizations at the barbeque are also available online.

Calgary Stampeders, Rage football engage with PALS to teach football

Representing the Calgary Stampeders, Julian Howsare visited Strathmore to engage with folks in the PALS (Physical Activity, Leadership and Socializing) community and their supporters.

Howsare was joined by several athletes from the Calgary Rage women's football team to run drills and exercises with those who came out to participate, hosted at the Strathmore Motor Products Sports Centre on May 11.

"We are going to learn about how to play football from people who know how to play football ... a lot of us are fans of the game ... (and) we want to be able to share that and play the game," said Jim Bob Geddes, a support worker who was present for the workshop.

Prior to splitting into teams and learning to play, participants went through several drills to get them warmed up and familiarized with how to move about the playing field.

Though Thursday's event was the first at which the Calgary Stampeders had been present to participate, PALS has collaborated with other organizations to introduce sports to their members.

Geddes explained they had worked with Lacrossing Bridges to learn about lacrosse, as well as the Strathmore RCMP and Fire Department to learn how to play baseball.

"This goes to show the level of commitment upon the organization of the Stampeders to grow in the community," he said. "We are hoping for sure that this could become an annual event. Why not be a yearly event that can actually grow into including the entire community of schools."

The event, according to Geddes, came about as a result of PALS members attending a forum spoken at by Jay McNeil, Dave Dickinson and John Hufnagel. During the forum, the Stampeders made their intentions known to grow their relationships with surrounding communities, and began collaborating with PALS.

Michelle Bishop, support worker and facilitator of PALS said the organization aims to be able to include everyone and allow folks to be able to try things, regardless of ability.

"We started PALS about eight or nine years ago, and it is just to bring our group of friends together once a week to exercise, learn about living healthy, move and learn new sports and activities. This is perfect for us," she said. "PALS is just a group of mostly family management support workers, working with their friends, and we wanted to get together to create a safe place to play sports, learn a healthy lifestyle, socialize and learn leadership."

Since its inception, PALS has grown to roughly five times its original size within the community.

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Strathmore Gymnast takes provincial bronze

Strathmore local athlete, Olivia Jarvis (11) placed third in the province for her category, during a tournament hosted in Calgary last month.

Olivia competes in Women's Artistic Gymnastics (WAG) and currently occupies the Junior Olympian 6 (JO6) performance category.

"She does ... beam, vault, floor and bars ... so basically in WAG there are five levels. There is JO6 to JO10, which is the highest you can go and that is what national athletes and Olympians compete at," said Laura Jarvis, Olivia's mother. "Right now, Olivia is JO6, which is the lowest level, and then as she gets skills, then she can move up depending on what she learns."

Athletes are expected to demonstrate certain sets of skills on each apparatus at a competition. The skill and performance expectations are defined by the JO level the athlete is competing at.

"For instance, on floor, Olivia's routine has to have two tumbling lines, which includes a front and a back tuck, she has to have certain jumps included in her floor routine, (and so on). On beam, she has to do a certain dismount which is a back tuck off the beam," Jarvis explained.

The April 14 competition was Olivia's first time competing at the JO6 level, though has previously competed provincially.

Jarvis explained she went to provincials last year, but competed in compulsory gymnastics, which is designated separately from WAG. During that competition, Olivia placed second overall.

Introduced to gymnastics at the age of three, Olivia was enrolled in a recreational class taken in Strathmore.

"On her first day, we noticed that the coach had the kids walk across a beam and they were all too scared to do it and they all held their coach's hand. Olivia yelled, said 'No,' ran across the beam and did a front tuck off of it," said Jarvis. "From that day on, we knew that she was our little gymnast, and she has been doing flips ever since."

Though Olivia said she was excited about her podium finish, she felt as though she could have done better.

"At the time, she was quite mad ... she is always gunning for first. She had done her floor and her vault, and going into bars, she was sitting second and then she fell, which knocked her down to eighth place," explained Jarvis. "She got back up and she did her beam and she got a super high score on that, which bumped her back up to third."

Olivia added she is excited to continue competing at the provincial, if not national level and has large aspirations for herself.

"I was really nervous, but excited ... I get to learn new things and try out different levels," said Olivia. "I am thinking about wanting to go to the Olympics."

Olivia trains four days of the week in Calgary, and will continue to do so over the summer. Jarvis explained the demanding nature of the sport requires constant physical conditioning in order to maintain an athlete's abilities.







After a string of vandalisms appeared around town, local Chris Fuchs resident and his daughters decided to do something about it.

Fuchs explained after coming across some of the vandalism on their local elementary school, his daughter felt very strongly about wanting to clean up the markings.

"My oldest daughter, Vanessa (10), goes to Grade 5 at Brentwood. We took a bike ride as a test because she wanted to start riding her bike to school and we saw the vandalism right away. It was pretty upsetting," he said. "It was a good opportunity to talk to her about racism, because she didn't understand until I pointed out what was sprayed there was a bad word. Her best friend is African American, so she felt pretty passionate about going back and cleaning that up."

After the Tom Saddler Bridge sign was also vandalized, Fuchs said he had seen a great amount of people complaining about the markings, but nobody was jumping in to do anything about it.

Having everything already ready to go, Fuchs said he and his daughters jumped in to also clean up the sign.

"We had the perfect cleaner, we had everything ready and we were going for a bike ride that day anyway. We just changed our route and stopped there quick," he said. "We have had lots of good talks about giving back to our community. The girls do not want any reward for this, they just want donations put back into the community."

Though Fuchs said he is regularly collecting food and clothing donations for the homeless, this is the first time his girls have really stepped up and wanted to make a difference themselves.

He added the impact of their actions has already been visible around their community and throughout the town.

"When we went to go clean up Brentwood school, two of her classmates saw what we were doing and they stopped to help us right away. My daughter has already encouraged her friends to also step up and do the right thing," he said. "Every day, they go to school excited to spread some positivity and they come home telling me they did a good thing. It's an everyday encouragement with us. This was just the first time they stepped up big like this and I was very impressed."

Strathmore Mayor Pat Fule said he was extremely pleased to see someone from the community stepping up to help eliminate vandalism from the town.

"I am pretty proud of Chris. He is a young man who I taught years ago and he is working hard to teach his kids the right way to do things in life and the way to stand up to things that have been done," he said. "He is teaching them valuable lessons as far as what it looks like to be good community people, and they were quick to react and undo the damage that was done by some people who obviously don't have much better to do."
