## County eyes partnership

Wheatland County is looking to start rejoining regional collaboration meetings with municipalities throughout the local area.

During the Nov. 4 meeting, council voted to rescind three previous motions which had barred participation in regional collaboration meetings.

“When I went around campaigning, (this) probably hit the top of the charts. Get along with our neighbouring municipalities within Wheatland County borders,” said Coun. Glenn Koester. “I won’t use any of the expletive words I have been told, but it was very important to people in my area that we get along with everybody, and I said I would bring it up at the earliest opportunity I could.”

Koester explained his concern stemmed from previous interactions between municipalities taking place every three months to discuss the interests of every municipality, and how best to cooperate.

The idea was to explore mutual interests, share ideas and resources, and pass cost savings to each municipality within the local region.

“Council made these motions and stopped going to partnership meetings ... what I understood is if everybody does not go to partnership meetings, you can’t call it a partnership meeting,” said Koester. “I’m thinking as a region, we are suffering immensely from not talking to our neighbors in any sort of situation, formally or informally.”

While participation in partnership meetings had been barred, Coun. Rick Laursen had been noted to have attended such a meeting regardless, without professionally representing the county.

Instead, he was noted to have attended the meeting as an interested citizen. Despite this, he was subject by the previous county council to a code of conduct violation complaint.

# County soon to wrap initial involvements in hydrogen development

Wheatland County's contribution to the Calgary regional hydrogen hub is anticipated to wrap up in the early months of the new year.

The Chief Administrative Officer's report, presented to council on Nov. 4, noted that ongoing recommendations from a report, dated Feb. 21, 2023, continue to be implemented.

Discussions have been ongoing with PrairiesCan on Wheatland County's participation and funding in the Calgary Hydrogen Hub.

"Our general manager of community development services, Sherry [Baers], has been working with the hydrogen hub. It is ongoing," said CAO Brian Henderson, noting via his report that a decision is expected soon.

Baers noted that council should anticipate seeing a final draft in the new year, and to conduct a stakeholder meeting sometime also in early 2026. She

suggested the county's involvement is likely to come to a conclusion within the first quarter.

"We are working through a grant that we received through PrairiesCan and are working with the Calgary economic group for the Calgary regional hydrogen hub, and out of that, there is a portion for Wheatland alone to look at our own opportunities as a producer of hydrogen and Calgary as a recipient," she said. "We are in the final stages; we will be holding a stakeholder meeting and we are required under the task that we do a local stakeholder meeting at the end of November for all of the producers that might have had interviews with Transition Accelerator, who is writing the document for the county."

Hydrogen-based energy investments have been under discussion locally since August 2022. At the time, a stakeholder meeting with the Canadian Hydrogen Fuel Cell Association introduced the idea of hydrogen as a viable investment.

Alberta was previously noted to produce slightly upwards of four million tonnes of hydrogen per year,

being the largest producer of hydrogen in Canada.

This production, however, was in 2023, noted to be almost exclusively steam-methane reforming, which has a very high carbon footprint.

Wheatland County made its mark on the hydrogen industry in March, with the official opening of the new low-carbon hydrogen energy hub in Calgary.

The hub follows the same model which had been implemented first in Edmonton for its own regional hydrogen hub.

A presentation made to county council in October had presented the initial findings from the Calgary regional hub and discussed long-term viability.

At the time, it was emphasized during the report that hydrogen utilizations include heating, blending into natural gas systems, and for fuel.

Reeve Scott Klassen suggested revisiting the topic of the hydrogen hub during a future committee of the whole meeting in order to allow for more time to discuss the county's next steps in more detail.

# Travelling Mabels to make stop in Strathmore

The Travelling Mabels are returning to Strathmore this month to share their signature harmonies, humour, and holiday warmth.

The beloved Alberta group will perform at the Strathmore United Church on Nov. 28 at 7 p.m. as part of the Arts on 817 Concert Series.

"This isn't our first time in Strathmore," said Keith Floen of The Travelling Mabels. "We've been there before, a few different venues, wonderful Strathmore."

"There will be obviously Christmas music, a little bit of original written Christmas music, but a lot of classics and a lot of deep dive songs that you may not expect."

The creative process for putting together a seasonal show is a team effort.

"We all individually have a wide range of material that we can choose from," he said. "We look for music that might suit our voices individually and that we can put a Mabel's harmony spin on – and there it is. Maybe a little bit of humour, definitely some humour."

That humour, he said with a laugh, is part of what makes their shows memorable.

"I mean, I'm a knucklehead in my own right," he joked.

The group will be joined by a guest electric guitar player for this show.

"His name is John," Floen shared. "All the Christmas shows will have John on them for the most part."

The Mabels' Christmas performances are quickly becoming a fan favourite.

"It's busy, it's good, you know, it's picking up steam," Floen said. "They're becoming popular."

The dates are starting to sell out already. And it's just been so much fun. We love doing the Christmas shows. Creatively, they're so much fun and it's great for the audience."

Performing in small communities is something the group treasures.

"We absolutely love the small communities," Floen said. "You just meet such wonderful people, you know, and that's the heartbeat of the country, the people that you don't realize are the glue that's keeping everything together."

That sense of community connection will be highlighted even more this year with a special opening act: Santa's Songbirds, seven students from local music teacher Ally Brigley Music Studio, who will take the stage ahead of the Mabels.

For Brigley, it's an exciting first.

"No, I've never done anything like this with Arts on 817 before," she said. "Carolyn Steeves (Artistic Director of the Arts on 817) asked if I would have any students who might be interested in opening for the show. They like to have local musicians be the opening act, and I was really enthusiastic to be a part of it."

Brigley will bring seven students, ranging in age from 12 to 23.

"We've had a fun range of girls that I know would feel confident and prepared," she said. "I thought it would be cool to showcase all ages of students who are passionate about music in Strathmore."

The group is preparing a diverse Christmas-themed set.

"We're doing some rock, we're doing some country, we're doing some traditional, and we're doing some Michael Bublé versions of traditional," Brigley said. "We have a really cool variety."

# CGC announces update regarding new wallboard manufacturing plant

CGC is now only months away from the official grand opening of their new wallboard manufacturing plant northwest of Carseland.

Duane Van Duuren, plant manager for the facility, explained once operational, it will supply sheet rock gypsum wallboard products to the western Canadian market.

"This plant is going to be a game changer for the western Canadian market, and not only the builders, but the families and the building owners across western Canada," he said. "I'm super excited to be part of this team and writing history for CGC in western Canada. As far as where we are at, the build is coming along very quickly and we are progressing as far as the site goes, as well as our people and training and how we are preparing for our start up next year."

Construction of the 220,000 square foot facility is nearly complete, and the automated equipment has begun to be installed inside.

CGC is emphasizing their commitment to zero waste to landfill, water recirculation, and heat recovery in order to make the facility not only efficient, but also as environmentally friendly as possible.

"We are investing in green energy and offsetting demand from the grid. That's one example of why

this plant is the most sustainable gypsum plant in our network," said Van Duuren. "We have upgraded our equipment, and the design of our plant was built from the ground up. We are not retrofitting or rebuilding an existing location. We want to be efficient, sustainable, and we can probably say that this is the most sustainable plant we have."

The first round of onboarding for full-time positions was completed earlier this year, hiring greater than 95 per cent of current staff from the local region.

Van Duuren explained approximately two thirds of the facility's full staff are currently being onboarded.

"We are drawing the right talent that is going to help grow not only our plan for today, but for future generations, and so we are really excited about that," he said. "The next step is a lot of preparation. Finish the building, finish our construction of the new equipment, and then with our new team on site, we are starting to build a lot of our standard work and a lot of our practices that are going to make us successful and align with the building and equipment completions."


A release from CGC indicated the plant is scheduled to open in June 2026, though Van Duuren suggested he hopes to see it open and operational ahead of schedule. An exact date has yet to be provided.

"Collaborating with our neighbours is part of the government's mandate on municipalities to share information, share infrastructure – there are regional collaboration grants that are easier to get than grants just for a municipality," added

Koester. "We are missing out on both money, but the important thing, we are missing out on collaborating with our neighbours."

Coun. Keith Clayton supported the motion to rescind the previous council resolutions, citing several conversations with local ratepayers who had desired to see the county once again engaging in more active cooperation with its neighbours.

Coun. Donna Biggar added she would support going forward with returning to regional collaboration meetings, however reminded council that any decisions regarding what takes place at such times would have to happen in council and not at the collaboration meetings.

Wheatland County will be writing a letter to neighbouring municipalities offering to host a regional collaboration meeting.



"People will be able to vote on their favourite hot chocolates, and we will be giving away prizes at the end of the day for those who did vote. What's really great is it is all for a great local cause."

Anyone who comes by is encouraged to bring a non-perishable donation to the food bank, with the ultimate goal of filling a show home garage.

Silva explained the idea was brought forward by the team over at Kelly Kustom Homes and they jumped in to take the lead organizing the project.

"The builders are all going to be bringing some of their own recipes, so whether it's from grandma or mom or even just something they found onli-

ne, and they will be trying their own blends of marshmallow, cinnamon, whatever they have an interest in," he said. "For the builders that don't have their show home available, they will probably be working with a local partner like Baldwin Barbeque to set up in one of the trailers ... so they will still have a chance to be voted on."

The event is scheduled to operate from 2- 5 p.m. Nov. 29 in Lakewood.

Far from being the first time Lakewood of Strathmore has partnered with the Wheatland County Food Bank, Silva added it will also be a far cry from the last, as the team aims to make the event an annual occurrence.

We want to bring awareness to the food bank because there are a lot of people who do need that assistance," said Silva. # Lakewood of Strathmore completes Phase 2B

Lakewood of Strathmore is announcing the completion of Phase 2B, representing significant growth for the neighborhood both in terms of residential opportunities and public spaces.

The development area is consistent of 106 residential lots, as well as sidewalks and pathways, and the associated servicing required for new developments.

"We even built a new community entrance on the west side, so you are going to see street lights going up right away, you'll see new signage, there is a brand new fence that's already up; it really goes to show how big Lakewood is now," said Scott Silva, director of sales and marketing for Lakewood of Strathmore. "It's quite a large community but now you can see it. I know the builders are excited ... there are a lot of different home styles that we have been hearing people both locally and from Calgary and abroad have been looking for."

Phase 2B previously experienced delays due to adverse weather conditions over the summer months, particularly due to the surplus of rain.

To date, all of the pathways around the nine-acre storm pond have been set in place, as well as accessory pathways, trees, benches, and garbage cans for community members to enjoy being outdoors.

"All of the lots in Phase 2B are ready

for home construction and we have got six homes that will be starting in the next week and they are already all sold, and then I think a couple more are lining up after that," added Silva. "The next step on the radar is we want to get the homes built for Phase 2B, so that is part of what you will be seeing in the present sense. The builders will be very active building there with new home sales and different home types. For us though, we are planning and working through the next phase, which involves more lots, another community entrance, and the final design work for the recreational lake."

With respect to the development of the recreational lake, dirt has already begun to be moved in order to carve out the hole in the ground. Excavation has also been shaping what will become islands within the lake.

Ultimately, the goal for the team will be to complete as much of the digging as possible before the ground freezes and halts progress until spring.

"Home construction can go all throughout the year; there is no stopping that unless you get below -30 Celsius. Earthworks are dependent on moisture and overnight cold because that is what penetrates into the ground and gives you your overnight frost," said Silva.

He added further developments will be announced as Phase 3 of the community comes to fruition in the new year.



# County management of water meters, billing, under scrutiny

Wheatland County's process for addressing ratepayers' broken water meters is being challenged following over \$6,000 in rebates advised to be refunded to ratepayers.

Two resolutions brought before council, Nov. 4, recommended the refund of \$2,360.22 to one utility account, \$1,251.22 to another, and a total of \$3,283.66 between five additional utility accounts.

Joel Chiasson, manager of financial services, explained broken water meters are typically not added to the county's repair list until after three months, to ensure a given meter is actually broken as opposed to experiencing a temporary malfunction.

Once a broken meter is on the repair list, it is prioritized based on "other criteria." In the meantime, the structure or household associated with the broken water meter is billed based on average water use within the county.

Glenn Koester, addressing a correspondence received from a ratepayer, who he did not name, indicated a desire for the person to be allowed to address council at the earliest opportunity.

CAO Brian Henderson noted during the council meeting, the ratepayer in question made a claim to the Alberta Utilities Commission, the result of which was sent back to council.

Scott Wade, who identified himself as the ratepayer indicated by council, said he waited over two years before his water meter was repaired.

"My water meter broke in June of 2022, and unbeknownst to me, everything just showed up on my bill as being a special estimate. After about six months of getting the same bill for three [cubic] meters a month, I went down to look at my meter to see what was going on, and it wasn't working," he said.

The county's water estimation policy, which was updated in 2024 to establish the community average system, changed the estimated use of Wade's water from three to 12 cubic meters every month.

Chiasson is credited with explaining to the Alberta Utilities Commission in January, the county's repair priorities criteria are based on repair list status, length of time the meter has been

unreadable for, by customer request, change in ownership, and by customer availability to be contacted.

A letter dated Nov. 3, from Henderson to Wade did not approve Wade's request to speak before the Public Presentation Committee regarding the matter, as it pertained to a concluded appeal to the Alberta Utilities Commission and was deemed outside of the county's jurisdiction to consider by the committee.

"I didn't understand what the county was doing at all. I was under the impression I was paying a fixed rate because nobody ever explained anything to me," said Wade.

"Paying an extra \$200 or whatever it was for the water bill wasn't a big deal, but I imagine it's a big deal to some people in this county for an unexpected bill, but it's no fault of their own – it's all because the county won't come and read your meter."

Wade described that for an account holder such as those approved by the county for refunds to wait as long as 51 months before their water meters are fixed is unacceptable.

In January, the county was aware of 86 utility accounts with water meters requiring repair. As of September, there still remained 43 accounts to be addressed. Wade suggested at least half of the remaining accounts have been waiting for over a year for their meter to be addressed.

"They are there because of no fault of their own and the county hasn't even bothered to contact them. There's no excuse for this. I contacted the meter supply company in Calgary in February; they had more than enough meters in stock to facilitate repairs," said Wade. "The county is just being lazy and not doing it, meanwhile the rate payer is stuck paying a ridiculous estimate that will get refunded later."

During the Nov. 4 meeting, the two resolutions recommended by administration to refund ratepayers were both approved. Council also acknowledged the 51-month time frame which saw the required rebate accumulated to this extent.

Chiasson confirmed that the community average tool employed by the county as a long-term estimate tool aims to encourage the changing of meters when they malfunction or become inoperable.

# County considering consolidation of hamlet bylaw

Wheatland County is discussing the potential to consolidate hamlet designations into a single bylaw, as well as establishing a community engagement plan.

The Municipal Government Act does not mandate a specific process for establishing a hamlet specifically, however it does state a designated region must have a defined name and boundaries.

"Administration did do a report last term that compared certain criteria of the MGA of all of the named communities in Wheatland County, so a named community can be a hamlet, but a hamlet may not be a named community," said CAO Brian Henderson. "A smaller one like Leveland, for example, that is a named community within Wheatland County, however it would not come close to meeting the definition of a hamlet."

County administration has proposed

to consolidate the hamlets using the land redesignation process in order to allow for public engagement through public hearings.

The purpose of the consolidation will be to identify and formally establish hamlets which meet the definition outlined in the Municipal Government Act. This would allow the county to access alternate funding streams for these communities than what is currently available.

Under the Municipal Government Act, the council of a municipal district or specialized municipality can designate an unincorporated community as a hamlet.

A community may be considered a hamlet if it consists of five or more residential dwellings, a majority of which are on parcels smaller than 1,850 meters, has generally accepted boundaries, and contains land utilized for non-residential purposes.

## Are your rights at risk?

What message is the UCP government sending to all of those thousands of needed teachers and support staff to even look at a job opportunity in Alberta given the use of the notwithstanding clause, that imposed what seems like a Trumpian style of collective agreement on teachers, which prohibits them from striking until Aug. 31, 2028. As has been reported, there were other democratic ways to continue in respecting Albertans' rights, but this action appears to demonstrate that Smith's UCP government doesn't have time or respect for that. An online search shows 45 UCP MLA's - including our MLA - voted for the notwithstanding clause in taking away Albertans' rights. ## Disinformation is not a pathway to a fairly negotiated settlement

To the Editor

As Alberta inches closer to another union-versus-government negotiation, the UCP "tactical misinformation machine" is revving up and shifting to high gear. I speak of course of the looming dispute between AUPE's nursing care union and the Alberta government, including the erroneous statements made by Finance Minister Nate Horner. To provide context, this is a very different situation than that of the teachers; these nurses and health care aides (HCA) have not received a pay hike in several years. Further, the union's desire is to reach an 84 per cent LPN-to-RN pay ratio which is a normal parity comparable that every other province already pays, respecting both LPN and RN communities.

The LPN membership, (and union) are very clear - this is about money and work hours; kudos to them for not hiding behind petty quibbles and inuendo. They got straight to the point - "They want a raise, and they want parity for their LPNs who currently sit at No. 8 in wages compared to other provinces yet rank No. 1 in scope of practise."

This said, the finance minister publicly stated that, "the union is demanding LPNs be paid almost the same as registered nurses (RNs) and is bargaining for salary increases of 40 to 55 per cent." The minister went on to say, "While LPNs play a critical role, a key consideration that must be considered is the fact that they do not have the same education or extensive scope of practice as RNs."

Nothing could be further from the truth.

This misleading and harmful collation of misinformation from Mr. Horner needs clarification. Firstly, LPNs earn a lot less than their counterpart RNs, and there is no established LPN-to-RN salary linkage in Alberta, meaning the salary gap between the two increases in an irregular manner; the union is looking to rectify this with parity.

Further, and in response to Mr. Horner's (extensive scope of work comment) LPNs do in fact perform similar work, and have similar comparable work scopes as RN's, a fact that is clear and evident on the units and wards, in many of our hospitals. Without the LPNs taking on more and more responsibility the ward system would regress; the facts speak for themselves - the work they do is in absolute terms "comparable".

Now, to be fair to the RN community, LPNs should not be paid the same as their counterparts simply because of the differences in qualification; however, AHS has demanded that LPNs assume more and more of the RN level roles and responsibilities, and the LPN community has accepted those demands.

These unfairly exploited LPNs must now be compensated for accepting these "over and above responsibilities" in their new contract. It is also time for Minister Horner to act in good faith and not deliberately mislead and misinform the public or to mischaracterise a serious and legitimate bargaining process. Perhaps a visit to an acute care unit will enlighten Mr. Horner and his colleagues regarding who does what and when.

This work comes alongside more than \$1.5 billion in highway upgrades and safety improvements happening across Alberta this year alone. This includes the engineering of three

interchanges over Hwy. 1 between Strathmore and Calgary: at RR 264 (de Havilland site), at Hwy. 791, and at Conrich/Garden Road. We are also planning a roundabout at the HWY 564 and HWY 9 intersection, among other major intersection upgrades across our constituency. Better roads save time, get exports to market faster, and keep families safe. Whether you're hauling grain, driving the kids to hockey practice, or just making your daily commute, investments in better roads make a real difference.

As we continue supporting innovation and economic growth, we are also investing in the community spaces that contribute to Albertans' quality of life and well-being. Our government is investing \$7 million to support sport and recreation infrastructure projects throughout the province.

The Active Communities Initiative is Alberta's first grant program solely dedicated to funding sport and recreation infrastructure. Each project reflects the unique needs of its community, and together, they are projected to serve up to a million Albertans.

Potential funding sources include the Alberta Municipal Water and Wastewater Partnership, and the ability to introduce tax levies to fund construction, upgrades, or maintenance of municipal infrastructure.

"Most of it is tied to the grants. Just because we name it a certain hamlet, if it does not meet the criteria under the MGA, it will not qualify for any funding or infrastructure if needed," said Reeve Scott Klassen. "(With) more densification, you need more services. It makes more sense. You can't have a bunch of water wells right beside each other."

Within Wheatland County, there are currently six communities which meet the definition of a hamlet under the MGA, including Carseland, Cluny, Gleichen, Lyalta, Rosebud, and Spe-

argrass.

Despite not currently meeting hamlet criteria under the MGA, Cheatle may be added later once more properties are added on suitably sized lots.

While several communities are commonly referred to as hamlets despite not meeting the formal definition, such as Nightingale and Namaka, the county is still encouraging them to be referred to as hamlets.

Administration has recommended eight bylaws be rescinded should the new consolidated hamlet bylaw be established. These include establishment, adjustment, and expansion bylaws related to the boundaries of Carseland, Nightingale, Lyalta, Namaka, and Rosebud.

The bylaw will return before council at a later date to see first reading before proceeding to a public hearing.


