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Budget preparations

Annual budget discussions will soon begin taking place in Strathmore and Mayor Pat Fule is looking to see strong financial decisions made in the best interests of everyone in town.

"Council has been really impressed with the work that the administration and the senior leadership team and the finance team has done. They have been crunching numbers and working for weeks and weeks now to try to come up with some things to bring us, some things to consider that will be in the best interest of everyone in Strathmore," he said. "It is always a very serious time because you are trying to make sure that you can still move the town forward, but you also want to be aware of people in their financial situation."

Fule explained it is an immensely difficult task to have a zero per cent tax increase, as costs across the board have gone up for everybody, and the town is effectively the same as any other corporation.

Repairs to town structures, maintenance of services, and operational projects were cited among articles which require the town's attention and

Recent large scale repair projects are the roof replacements to the Strathmore Civic Centre, the Strathmore Family Centre and curling facility.

"We have worked really hard as a council to lower the town's overall debt - and that has been a huge success financially ... you are allowed a certain amount of debt and we are down to around 32 per cent of what the province allows," added Fule. "When I first got onto council, it was up at 66 per cent I think, but there (were) some major projects that previous councils had done, so they had to do some things like the water line that were really expensive."





County holds organizational meeting

Wheatland County council hosted their organizational meeting on Oct. 15 in council chambers, discussing policies, event schedules, and the reeve and deputy reeve positions, amongst other

Councillors Amber Link and Glenn Koester were nominated for the reeve position by Coun. Tom Ikert and Coun. Rick Laursen respectively. In an anonymous vote, Link won the majority vote and will serve as reeve for the remainder of the current council's term in office.

Coun. Scott Klassen and Coun. Rick Laursen were nominated for the deputy reeve position by Coun. Shannon Laprise and Coun. Glenn Koester respectively. Klassen won the majority vote, once again by secret ballot, and will also retain his station as deputy reeve for the remainder of this council's term.

A drafted 2025 event calendar was presented before council and was approved as presented without further discussion or debate. The county has scheduled 18 regular meetings of council, six committee of the whole meetings, four public presentation committee meetings, 12 municipal planning commission meetings, and four agricultural service board meetings for the upcoming 2025 year, prior to the upcoming municipal elec-

Administration had recommended that council schedule an open house in January in Division 3, and in July in Division 7.

Coun. Donna Biggar motioned for administration to instead schedule the open house in her division to take place in February. This motion was carried unanimously. Similarly, Laursen motioned for administration to schedule the Division 7 open house for June instead of July. This motion was also carried unanimously.


Also renewed were the signing authorities for Wheatland County, which were passed without debate. Reeve Link, Deputy Reeve Klassen, the Chief Administrative Officer, the General Manager of Corporate and Financial Services, and the Manager of Financial Services were listed on the document as approved authorities.


Council reviewed memberships and positions for the various municipal boards which councillors sit and participate on. Details regarding current seats are available publicly through council's Oct. 15 organizational meeting agenda.

Coun. Klassen motioned for council to approve the county's attendance at both upcoming Rural Municipalities of Alberta 2025 conventions, being in March and November 2025 respectively.

It is noted in council's agenda that attendance at an RMA convention in Edmonton is approximately \$12,620, accounting for the six councillors who participate. This includes registration, mileage, accommodations and meals. Council voted unanimously to approve the motion.

The full organizational meeting is available for public viewing via the county's YouTube channel. The agenda is visible through the county website.

Strathmore Stampede Chuckwagon Committee recognized by WPCA

The Strathmore and District Agricultural Society was recognized by the World Professional Chuckwagon Association (WPCA) with their Committee of the Year award.

Members of the WPCA, including drivers, outriders, and employees, vote for the race committee of the year, which is presented at their annual

"We were very excited when we won it. I did not even know what to say when I got up to the podium so I kind of stumbled a little bit," said Sandra Green, wagon advisor for the Strathmore Stampede. "It shows that all of the hard work that we have put into the track and the infield and the stands and the suites have paid off."

This award marks the first occasion that the Strathmore Stampede has been recognized in this way by the WPCA.

Green added any committee which hosts an event that is a part of the WPCA circuit throughout a given year is eligible to be nominated to receive the award.

"We have had a lot of feedback in the last few years of me just taking on this role that our track needed work because it has been a few years since we have put money into our track and then

we finally did have somebody to do that," she explained. "It was great to see that the drivers who were upset about the track in the past years were very happy with the track now."

Green explained there is effectively a complex formula which goes into maintaining the track for hosting chuckwagon races in order to have both quality races, and make the event safer for drivers, outriders, and the horses.

This includes keeping it wet at the proper times, dry at the proper times - rain is a factor to consider when allowing enough drainage to keep the track operational, and keeping the right equipment available to maintain the track between he-

"We try our best to never have any accidents for the horses or the drivers and back in the chuckwagon village, just trying to do a little better back there and make sure everyone is happy and on the same page and make sure there is clean and nice runs for the wagon drivers," she said. "Every year we are going to add a little more product onto the track because with wind and mother nature, you lose a little bit of that."

The Strathmore Stampede is aiming to continue their momentum and shoot to potentially continue earning recognition in this fashion from the WPCA in future years.

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

Before you hit the highways this winter, remember the

- Travel with a fully charged cell phone for emergency situations.
- Slow down and drive to conditions. You can be charged with a traffic offence for driving too fast for the conditions.

You should also consider carrying an emergency kit in your vehicle's trunk or cargo space including: a thermal blanket, extra clothing and outerwear, a candle and waterproof matches, first aid kit, a flashlight with extra batteries, booster cables, sand, road salt or kitty litter and a shovel.

Fule talks upcoming town budget season

By lowering the town's overall debt, Fule explained there would be fewer service charges and fewer payments that would equate to raising property taxes.

With large-scale developments within the vicinity of Strathmore on the horizon, including the De Havilland of Canada campus, Fule added council will have to carefully manage the upcoming growth Strathmore will soon experi-

"One of the things our CAO and his senior leadership team have been really focusing on is, we have a tax ratio of 80 per cent residential to 20 per cent non-residential as far as property taxes coming in," he said.

"We are trying to get closer to the provincial average, but you do not want to just necessarily greatly increase your taxes to businesses because you do not want to negatively impact them. That is why our finance team and our CAO and senior leadership team are working hard to attract more industry to Strathmore. We are trying to get closer to a 70/30 or in a range like that."

The town is also preparing for the shift in how RCMP are funded. Currently the federal government pays 70 per cent of RCMP costs and the town pays the remaining 30 per cent. Once the federal census comes into effect, according to Fule, likely in 2026, the federal government will pay 10 per cent and the town will be responsible for the remaining 90 per cent.

"It is a huge change but council and I and the finance department and our administration, we have been planning for this already and we have been putting money away into a reserve for that so the hit will not be as substantial," said Fule.

Among the decisions that have made budgeting for the town easier, has been the introduction of the community request night, where organizations are allowed to present before council all at once and petition for funding requests.

This has allowed council to plan in advance for how to fund as much, to as many community organizations as possible instead of delegations appearing outside of the preestablished budget.

"Strathmore is poised to hit some real solid growth. The growth has to be managed so that we keep our quality of life and our culture that is Strathmore as a caring town of people, but there are some exciting things that are about to hit for Strathmore," said Fule. "I am sure people are seeing different subdivisions that have started ground clearing and infrastructure being put in. There is going to be real growth in the next three to five years for sure."

Kings extend win streak

The Agra Risk Wheatland Kings extended their winning streak to six games with a pair of wins over Northern Division opponents Nov. 1-2.

The local Junior B team opened the weekend with a 5-2 road win versus the Airdrie Techmation Thunder on Friday night, before defeating the Ponoka Stampeders 4-2 at the Strathmore Family Centre the following night.

Head Coach Doug Raycroft explained though he was excited to see his team continue their impressive track record this season, he would like to see them bring their best to every game instead of letting their wins get to their heads.

"We had two wins which is always nice, but I did not really like the way we played (at home). We were a little flat - we did not really get going until the last 10 minutes of the game," he said. "We still got the win, so that is good.

"I think in Airdrie, we had a slow start but a really good second period and we played pretty well defensively. Overall, it is nice to get two wins."

The Kings will now prepare for a pair of home games against the Three Hills Thrashers and the Carstar Okotoks Bisons respectively Nov. 8-9. Both games start at 8 p.m.

At the moment, the Kings sit firmly in third in the Southern Division, boasting 10 wins and three losses over their 13 games, netting them 20 league points to date, two points behind the division-leading Bisons.

Okotoks and Medicine Hat, which have each played 14 games so far this season, each sit at 11 wins and three losses, tying them for first in the league with 22 points each.

"Ponoka is one of the lower teams in the league and I think our guys just thought it was going to be easy. I think what happened was they came in ready to go and our guys were a little bit lacklustre, or the effort was not there or what we wanted for the first couple periods," said Raycroft. "They got going in the third period. What we want from our guys is consistency. No matter who we are playing, we are playing the same game all the time. We were a little disappointed that we did not play our game."

Raycroft echoed his previous sentiments of wanting to see his team playing a full 60 minutes of hockey with their best.

He added despite being a deeper team this year, he is hoping to avoid many of the injury problems which saw many of his players consistently off the ice recovering instead of being on the ice participating.

"Last year, I have never, ever been around a team that had so many injuries. Maybe it was a little bit of an anomaly last year, but we are saying that we want to stay healthy this year. We have already had some substantial injuries this year too," said Raycroft. "We have been able to fight through them ... (but) Kyle Provencher hurt his shoulder in the first game and has not played since. He is one of our best defensemen. He



Sacred Heart Parish hosts annual auction fundraiser

The Sacred Heart Parish hosted their annual dinner and auction to raise money for the newly finished Sacred Heart Church, Nov. 2, at the Strathmore Civic Centre

"It has been happening for a number of years here already and it is one of the main fundraisers that we have ... each year to try and increase a little bit of our revenue on top of the usual contributions from our parishioners," said Father Cristino Bouvette.

"This time last year, we were aware that the building project was underway, but it still just did not seem real, like it was actually going to happen ... it is hard to believe that it actually has happened."

Bouvette explained the dinner and auction is the most impactful fundraiser of the year for the church.

He added there was no specific fundraising goal in mind, and when the time comes that the church itself is completely paid for, the dinner and auction will continue to be held for the community building that the event offers.

"I think we already have it booked for another year at least in advance. The fundraising is an important element and we are grateful for whatever we make," said Bouvette. "Ultimately, it is about getting everybody together, and then there are a lot of people here who are not regular parishioners of Sacred Heart. They are community members from here in Strathmore, and then contacts that people have from out of town. There are people from all around Wheatland County who (come) here."

Both the silent and live auctions were filled with items, articles, and contributions donated and solicited through the local community. These ranged from physical things, new-in-box donations, to services.

Bouvette himself offered to host a five-course home cooked Italian meal for up to six as an auction prize for his contribution.

"It helps us, I think, give a signal to the wider community that we are not just interested in closing in on ourselves and just doing our own thing, but that we really do want to be a part of the life of Strathmore and then hopefully be positively contributing towards it as well," he said.

Now that the physical church is open to the public, Sacred Heart continues to expand what it is able to offer to the community in addition to its regularly scheduled worships.

Bylaw #24-17

The Town of Strathmore regularly updates its Offsite Levy Bylaw to reflect new fee structures and payment of Offsite Levies in respect of land that is to be developed or subdivided. These Offsite Levies pay for the capital cost of infrastructure required to service the growth of the Town. This Bylaw currently exists as Bylaw No. 21–07 in which Bylaw No. 24–17 would replace it.

Any person or group of persons, or person acting on someone's behalf, who claims to be affected by any or all of the proposed bylaw, may present their concerns and/or suggestions by making a submission at the public hearing. Each person wishing to address Council at the Public Hearing shall complete their verbal presentation within three minutes.
