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Conserving water

Following suit with the City of Calgary, the Town of Strathmore has been set under Stage 4 water use restrictions while water main pipes are repaired in Calgary.

"We got the word just like Airdrie and Chestermere that Calgary was moving to Stage 4 water restrictions, so we have done our part as far as educating, letting the community know what is going on and the response has been good so far," said Mayor Pat Fule. "In the previous water restrictions, the goal was to have 25 per cent less water usage and we are right around 24, 25 per cent the first few days. I am really happy with Strathmore residents - it should not be as long a period of time this time and kids are going back to school."

Fule explained in a social media post Aug. 31, Strathmore previously drew its treated water from the Western Irrigation District.

In the mid 2000s, this was determined to be insufficient to support growth within the town, and a water line was built to draw water from the Glenmore Reservoir, to be stored in the Wildflower and Brentwood Reservoirs for later use.

"Part of it was, there was not enough water to actually access that we could continue to treat, so it seemed ... from what I understand, the thought process was a city the size of Calgary with all of its water treatment assets would be able to treat water and deliver water a lot cheaper than a town of Strathmore's size," said Fule.



Apollo Hess, a member of the Kainai Nation who participated at the 2024 Paris Olympics, spoke to the students and community at Siksika Nation High School, Aug. 30.

Hess was joined by Steve Mesler, also an Olympian, who facilitated the session. The session made for an opportunity to share stories of the Olympics, and how Hess got there with local students.

"We were very excited for our students to get this opportunity to meet Apollo Hess, who is a part of the Blackfoot Confederacy and just being able to be in the presence of an Olympian," said Lisa Calf Robe, principal of Siksika Nation High School. "On the agenda we received, it explained how Hess was going to talk about his childhood and being from the Kainai Nation, and the ties and connections that he has with a lot of our Siksika students, most especially the athletes, and he encouraged them to continue in their athletics."

Calf Robe added, once the announcement of Hess' presentation was made to the students, a survey was conducted to determine how much of the student body was already aware of who he is.

A majority of students had reported having watched Hess during the Olympics alongside their families.

"(The students) sat and they listened, and they were just so engulfed in what he had to share with us - I think more so because they really related to him and they just loved to hear his experiences about what he went through and endured," said Calf Robe. "It was really awesome to see our students so happy and just taking in this exciting event in their school."

Tyler White, CEO of Siksika Health, explained he believes their organization to be well connected amongst sporting industries, often with athletes and organizations reaching out to Siksika Health in order to collaborate.

He explained one of the goals of setting up the session at the school was to empower youth on the Nation and showcase what is possible for them.

"I think his message to the youth, as he shared his experiences, I think all of the challenges that he had personally and professionally, but I think for him, he never gave up. He was always pushing forward through the darkest moments, through the highs and the lows, and I think that was a great message for the youth to hear that anything is possible," said White. "He encouraged the youth to keep moving forward whether it is in sports, arts, culture, whatever that may mean for them, I think he was very positive, and I think his message of empowerment and resilience was well taken by the students."

White and Calf Robe both expressed that a similar event is one they would be excited to see set up in the future for the benefit of the students.

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Library hosting monthly book club meetings in person

The Strathmore Municipal Library is resuming its Busy People Book Club in person, which will be scheduled to meet once a month.

"We actually did do a few sessions of it in person before the summer, and then they took a break through the summer because they had terrible weather all three times they went to meet and it really put the numbers down," said Laura Henderson, public services manager with the Strathmore Library. "The Busy People Book Club has been running for a number of years online, and they have a Facebook group, and it worked out well because it is online while people are busy with work, activities with kids and all those things, but this still allows you to participate in a book club."

Through feedback from participants, it was discovered that there was a desire to have in-person meetings in addition to regular online activity.

Now, the library hosts the book club on the third Tuesday of every month beginning at 7 p.m.

"I'm sure any library wants book clubs, it just seems to go hand in hand, but the way we had been working, it just did not fit in. When we tried them way in the past, there just was not the same kind of uptake," said Henderson. "By doing it on Facebook, the facilitator of the book club was able to have those conversations individually with members of the book club and she asked if she could stay later on the Tuesday evening to run it."

She added public response thus far to the operation of the book club has been very positive, with members coming out even during instances of harsh weather to participate in the in-person

An ongoing goal for the library and the club is to see more and more people coming out in person on meeting night to participate.


The club aims to read one book per month, with September's read being "Friends, Lovers and the Big Terrible Thing," the late Matthew Perry's bio-

YETI students celebrated at conclusion of summer program

Community Futures Wild Rose celebrated the achievements of their Young Entrepreneurs Training Initiative (YETI) students, Aug. 30, as the annual program concluded for 2024.

YETI is a locally focused, high speed business training program for high school students aiming to learn more about, launch, and maintain their own businesses.

Community Futures Wild Rose provides startup cash, resources and guidance to the students over the course of an eight-week program operated through the summer.

The course largely consists of sessions instructing business basics and presentations from experts in fields respective to the students' chosen businesses.

Budgeting, goal setting, business startup and planning, and networking are all aspects of presentations given to the students throughout the

"The commitment and perseverance displayed by our students throughout these eight weeks is truly inspiring. They have consistently exceeded expectations, demonstrating a strong drive for success," said Amber Link, chair of the board of directors at Community Futures Wild Rose. "We take immense pride in their accomplishments and eagerly anticipate the growth and success of their businesses."

The YETI program had originally aimed to support five students over the course of this summer. Three students had dropped out of the program. Tyson Sailer and Meleah Parker remained to see their programs to completion and were recognized for their achievements.

Through the program, students are supplied with \$500 at the beginning to act as injection of startup funds, and then must provide Community Futures Wild Rose with receipts detailing what the money was spent on to further the students' business goals.

Upon approval from a school principal, participating YETI students may also be allowed to earn three high school credits following the completion of the course.

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

He added at the time that Strathmore connected to Calgary's water, he was not on council.

"What has happened now is, our town administration and staff are looking at the water situation that occurred in the summer and what we are facing now, and based on the financial feasibility of it, they are looking into seeing if it makes sense to have another method of delivery of water as a backup."

Fule explained a potential problem that may occur with attempting to develop a backup system, is the time it takes to set up and become operational unless water is being treated continuously.

At this time, the town does not have a cost estimate for what a new local water treatment plant would look like.

While under the water restrictions experienced earlier in the summer, Strathmore's aquatic centre was closed to the public. Fule explained the town took the down time as an opportunity to complete maintenance on the facility earlier than usual, which will result in shorter regularly scheduled closures through September.

Also affected as a result of water restrictions was the town's splash park, which operates on water that is not re-

Fule said to his knowledge, Stage 4 water restrictions are likely to be in place for the next four to five weeks. More information will be made public as it becomes available.

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



















Capsule Comments

Almost 8 million Canadians are affected by high blood pressure. It is called the silent killer because there are usually no symptoms. And high blood pressure is a precursor to heart attack and stroke. Many people are unaware their blood pressure is high. Do vou know what your blood pressure is? Why not invest in a home blood pressure monitor to keep tabs on this important facet of good health. If the results are high, see your doctor.

The severity of asthma in children is based on the medications needed for control of symptoms. For example, the patient is considered uncontrolled if they need more than two doses of rescue inhaler per week, have daytime symptoms occurring more than twice per week or nighttime symptoms occurring more than once weekly. The rescue inhaler is the one that quickly opens the airways to allow easier breathing.

If you regularly take a medication to reduce stomach acid (like in the treatment of gastric reflux or heartburn), you might consider taking a good multi-vitamin/mineral preparation each day. Stomach acid plays an important role in the absorption of iron and the release of vitamin B-12 from our food. A supplement would help keep these levels up.
























Casting call out for local theatre

For the third year in a row, the Strathmore Run Club will play host to a family-oriented event as part of the annual nationwide Terry Fox Run on Sept. 15.

When asked about the possibility of any postrun activities, Baird considered the possibility of refreshments depending on how many people show up.



Library to resume regular programming

Regular programming at the Strathmore Municipal Library has officially opened for registration, including early literacy, Winging It, and Book Buddies

"Those are our regular programs that we run regularly through spring and fall sessions as well. All the details are on our website to register for them. Twinkle Babies are full, but there is still room for the other two programs," said Laura Henderson, public services manager with the Strathmore Library. "Book Buddies, we continue

to take – I would love to get more registrations for that program; it is a really great program where children read one on one with a volunteer and it is just to build a love of reading."

These annual programs are all free and operated annually for the benefit of the public. They resume following the conclusion of the summer reading program operated in the down time.

Henderson explained the early literacy programs are able to accommodate 10 families. Winging It boasts 12 slots for the tween age group, and 15 for the teens.

"They are very popular programs. That Winging It program is sort of like an improv drama

class, and we have run it for a number of years. The slots are filling up fast," said Henderson. "Book Buddies is nice because we do not have a set capacity. Because it is one-on-one reading, and it is volunteers who do all of the leg work, if I have more registrations than I have volunteers, I ask my volunteers if they have more time, or we put out a call for more volunteers and try to match the numbers."

She explained the program does not have a cap on registration as it is such a rare occurrence that volunteer ability is unable to match the number of people registered to participate.

Henderson added the library is anticipating a wave of late and last-minute registrations, as many families are not quite ready for the summer off season to come to a close.

"It is a little bit slower on the numbers right now because people are still in that summer mode, but then they get back to school and they are like, 'oh, we would really like to support our child in school with that reading journey," she said. "I usually find right up until the day we begin – and there are sessions every day so any day of the week, we can usually find a time, even right during that first week, we will still be taking registrations and matching them up because the kids are just getting back into the swing of the school year."

More information regarding the library's regular programs is available on their website or in person. Similarly, the library is always seeking more volunteers to help operate the facility and their programs.

Calgary Watermain Repair

Water Restrictions *Update*

As of August 26, 2024, Level 4 Water Restrictions are in effect as Calgary prepares for additional repairs to the Bearspaw Watermain. Stage 4 Restrictions require all outdoor water use to cease with the exception of life sustaining uses, such as livestock, or businesses which must use water to meet health standards, such as hospitals and restaurants. We're asking you to avoid things like:

- Watering Lawns, gardens, and shrubs by any means.
- Filling hot tubs, pools, or decorative features.
- Using water for grading, compaction, or dust control.
- Washing cars on driveways or streets.
- Washing exterior surfaces unless necessary for health or safety reasons.

We know it's been a long summer of restrictions, but every effort to reduce water usage really makes a difference as Calgary works to repair their pipe. Do your best and thank you for your continued efforts. Stay up to date, here: Strathmore.ca/water
